## Shorthorns Romp Eagles 32-14 In Last Conference Game

The Marfa Shorthorns took the final football game of the season last Friday night against the Sanderson Eagles. The score was 32-14.

The Shorthorns celebrated their homecoming festivities with the win and were, according to fans of that city, higher than they had seen them in several games. There was a steady drizzle of

rain, turning colder as the game wore on, hampering the activities of both teams probably.

A muffed punt, giving Marfa possession of the ball, and a pass interception by Marfa which resulted in a touchdown, probably were the two most decisive factors of the game.

George Roman scored for the Shorthorns in the first period with a ditto by Felix Valles. Both made the extra points on the conversion.

In the second period Roman intercepted the Eagle pass and ran 65 yards for their second TD. Valles tied it up again in the third quarter, neither team scoring extra points on the second touchdowns.

In the final frame Marfa scored 18 points, 12 of which were in the last two minutes of play. The Eagles wound up the district competition and season with a conference record of one win — against Fabens — and two losses, to Iraan and Marfa. During the regular season they lost games to Ozona and Rankin, winning from Grandfalls, San Felipe, Rocksprings, Brackettville, and Van Horn.

## Christmas Seal Days Have Begun

Governor Price Daniel proclaimed Christmas Seal Days in Texas as he visited with a small recovered tuberculosis patient Leonard Alcala of Austin, pictured above. Said Gov. Daniel in his proclamation, "For hundred years man has battled against disease. For more than 50 years his battle against tuberculosis has been hard and rewarding. Today, tuberculosis as a killer is being curtailed in this country by modern drugs and improved patient care and rehabilitation facilities. But tuberculosis as a communicable, widely prevalent expensive and long-lasting illness is still to be reckoned with.

New cases in Texas the first nine months of this year were 3,375, and health authorities estimate there are more cases not reported than reported.

The Christmas Seal sale is one of the annual appeals of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and affiliated local associations for funds to make possible year round efforts to curb this need less waste of human life and resources.

"Therefore, I do hereby designate the period from November 16 to December 24, 1959 as Christmas Seal Days in Texas and urge all citizens to make a sound investment in their own and their fellow citizens' health by buying and using Christmas Seals during the holiday season."

Leonard Alcala, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Paul Alcala spent part of his babyhood in a tuberculosis hospital, in company with his parents. All are now recovered.

## Deer Hides Asked For Hospitals

Game and Fish Commission announced that deer hides will be sought again this year for patients in mental hospitals and in special schools. Hides in previous years have gone to tubercular hospitals.

Hides west of the Pecos should be routed to Russell Williams Frozen Food Locker on N. Grand Street in Odessa. They will be sent from there to Austin and on to tanneries and then to the hospitals for use of patients in handicraft.

The entire operation is on a cost-free basis, under direction of the Board of Hospitals and Special Schools.

Tags with the Odessa address which are placed on the hides should also have marked plainly "Charity" so that they may be shipped without charge.

## Tree 'Salesmen' Begin Canvass

Members of six local organizations have begun a canvass of all residences of Sanderson in an effort to sell 250 pecan trees. The project is sponsored by the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce.

Organizations aiding in the house-to-house canvass are: Rotary Club, Lions Club, American Legion, V.F.W., Legion Auxiliary and Ranch Club.

The purpose of the project is to promote the planting of 250 pecan trees in Sanderson or in this area. The Chamber is making the deal possible by a bulk order from the nursery at about half the retail price to local planters. It is a non-profit venture for the Chamber.

Details of the hole preparation and planting instructions will be published soon and care of the trees after planting will also be published.

People who are not contacted this week and who are interested in purchasing pecan trees at the reduced price are asked to contact J. A. Gilbreath at the Times or Clyde Griffith at the postoffice.

Orders for the trees will be relayed to the nursery about December 1 and shipment will be in January.

## Winter Comes For Second Time in One Week

After a few days respite when the weather was almost spring-like, winter again descended upon this area Friday afternoon. Saturday morning found a coating of sleet, snow and ice on the ground and temperatures in the low 20s. Rain fell locally Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning after temperatures began to rise.

All ranchmen contacted reported about one-half inch of rainfall and about one-half inch of ice on all their country.

Monday was again a very pleasant day with bright sunshine but a norther blew in late in the afternoon and temperatures again rapidly skidded into the low 20s Monday night. Tuesday and Wednesday were clear with a considerable rise in temperatures noted.

Highway 285 was closed to traffic most of Saturday and some icy spots were on US 90 west on Saturday morning. The icy condition of other highways to the west and north made for heavy traffic of trucks of all kinds through here Saturday.

There was an accident on the overpass Saturday morning and it was reported that several trucks were stalled on US 285 on hills because of the icy condition of the roads.

## TB Association's 1959 Seal Sale Now In Progress

Christmas Seals went into the mails last week to inaugurate the 1959 Christmas Seal Sale which is sponsored annually by the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association.

Two pages of seals were in each letter but anyone desiring more seals or anyone failing to receive seals may obtain them by phoning Mrs. M. W. Duncan at DI 5-2373. Every local resident is asked to cooperate by buying and using the seals.

Eighty-two cents of every dollar contributed toward the purchase of the seals remains in Terrell County to be used in education, location of and treatment of tuberculosis. An extensive follow-up work among persons having had tuberculosis and suspected cases has been a project of the local group this year, also the giving of the skin test to all pupils in two grades of the local schools.

Deer are said to be plentiful on all area ranches where deer normally range and they appear to be in top condition, according to ranchmen.

A great host of hunters is expected to begin invading the area west of Sanderson next week end, since Tuesday is the opening day of the season and a great economic boost to this area of Texas always results from the desire of nimrods to bag one of the big West Texas bucks.

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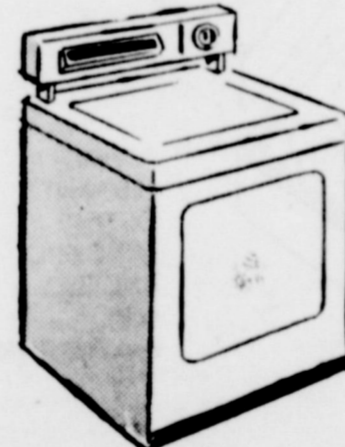
