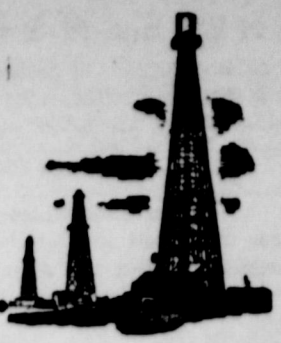

LISTEN TO LUKE

We continue to notice the construction of new and modern homes as well as many other improvements in town. This is most encouraging after the long period of waiting for more homes in Sanderson.

There is still a shortage of adequate available rent property. It is hoped that soon there will be many more houses available for newcomers here.

The opening this week of the new motel in the western part of town will add greatly to providing lodgings for tourists who come this way. Then with more eating places promised there should be more inducement for the overnight travelers to spend the night here.

Speaking of travelers through Sanderson, there is a move afoot to re-organize the Old Spanish Trail Association so boost travel along U.S. 90. We hope that this can be done successfully, as it will benefit all towns along the route.

The lead in the re-organization plans will have to be taken by those business men who deal directly with tourist traffic. They will be the ball carriers if such an organization develops.

There will be a meeting of these business men here next week and all are expected to be present to hear of the organization plans and give either their approval or disapproval by their actions in organizing a local branch of that organization.

Tourist traffic can mean much to a town and to the individual business men of that town. Sanderson nor San Diego should attempt the job alone. It will take a unified effort on the part of all businesses in all towns up and down the route.

The County's Chamber of Commerce cannot do the job for the local business men who deal in tourist trade directly — but it can work with a local organization, and it can help to get the local organization going. The Chamber is concerned with all phases of business in the county and will do what it can to help anything that can help the county, but it has to have the support of the businesses involved.

The "clean-up drive" in Sanderson is not taking hold the way we hoped it would, even though a lot has been done to make very noticeable improvements.

If you haven't spruced up a bit around your own house, step out in the yard and look at the growth of weeds and try to decide to cut them or get them cut. There is no high-pressureing to be done in such a campaign as this, only pleading and persuasion and example.

Pride in the appearance of your house should be one of the determining factors. There is also a certain amount of pride each resident should have in the appearance of his town.

If you doubt the civic usefulness of the local Lions Club, just take a look at the sign pointing to the postoffice. The sign reads: "U. S. Postoffice, and an arrow pointing in the proper direction." Donated by Lions Club. We feel that there should be more such signs. It is indeed a civic-minded club which will be so thoughtful to donate a U. S. Postoffice to the community. This is not a dig at the club, for they are constantly doing something for the community. We just couldn't pass that one.

Since the club most likely donated the sign, too, we think the citizens should express their appreciation for the fine thought and the most helpful guide post for the traveling public.

School Building Work Progresses

Work on the building projects for the local school is progressing on schedule and much improvement is being noted especially at the site of the new elementary building.

The rest rooms have been completed at the Lamar Ward School and the shop building has been completed with the exception of the installation of the windows and doors and some finish work which is awaiting the arrival of those items.

The brick walls are going up rapidly at the new elementary school site and the building is taking shape to give an idea of the appearance after completion.

Sewing Contest Is Sponsored By Nat'l Wool Growers

Highlighting the bi-centennial the 14th annual "Make It Yourself With Wool" contest, sponsored by the American Wool Council and the Women's Auxiliary to the National Wool Growers' Association opens officially this month.

Girls between the ages of 13 and 22, in 21 states, are invited to enter one of 250 district competitions from which winners will be selected for state contests to be conducted next fall.

A designer's tour to the fashion centers of the world will be given to the top junior and top senior winners at the national contest. In addition, five college scholarships, several U. S. Savings Bonds, and many merchandise prizes will be awarded.

All garments must be entirely the work of the contestant, and must be fashioned from American loomed wool.

Official information forms and entry blanks may be obtained from the American Wool Council at 520 Railway Exchange Bldg., Denver 2, Colo.

An adult class for women 22 years of age or older will be conducted in several of the contest states, including Texas.

Newberry Annex Added to Townsite

O. T. Sudduth petitioned the County Commissioners' Court to add 12 lots to the townsite of Sanderson, to be known as the Newberry Annex. The Court approved the addition as outlined in a platte which proposed the location of the lots and their situation.

The annex includes 20.24 acres of land in Survey 9 of Block 151 in the EL&RR Railroad Survey of Terrell County and lies east of the Newberry Addition and blocks 8 and 9 of that addition.

Four of the lots are 110 by 80 feet and eight of the lots are 100 by 80 feet. They are located in three sections to be known as blocks 12, 14 and 15 in the Newberry Annex.

The Fluor Corporation announced last Thursday at its Los Angeles headquarters that it has received a contract "in excess of \$3,000,000" from El Paso Natural Gas Company for a plant to purify natural gas of carbon dioxide, according to an article in The Midland Reporter-Telegram.

Construction on the new facility in Terrell County will start in May and is scheduled for completion in December.

Special Training Offered Grads By U. S. Army

SFC Richard W. Sims, your local Army Recruiter, announced that the Army has a special school program which is being offered to high school seniors.

SFC Sims explained that high school seniors can take advantage of a special "early choice" option which allows them to choose from the wide range of available courses. Seniors can apply for the program sixty days prior to graduation — before classes for the most popular courses are filled. The chosen course is reserved for the student until after his graduation from high school.

To apply for the "early choice" option, it is necessary to obtain a letter from the high school principal stating that the student will graduate. The letter should be taken to the local Army Recruiting Station. The Recruiting Sergeant will give an initial qualification examination to the student based on his abilities and desires, and help him select a school of his choice.

When the application is accepted, he will receive a written guarantee that a place in the school he has selected has been reserved for him. He does not enlist until after graduation from high school.

Desert Air Motel To Open This Week

A new motel will be opened in Sanderson this week. Construction has been completed by O. J. Cresswell, contractor, on the 13-unit motel for W. E. Grigsby.

The ten units on the south side are of split level construction, in keeping with the terrain in the area. Across the back of the lot and facing west in a three-unit building, the rooms are on the same level. In the future another 10-unit building will be constructed on the north side to match the one on the south side. The office is the first unit of the south side.

A decor of rose and blue is noted in the buildings and furnishings. Wall-to-wall carpeting is on the floors, foam rubber mattresses on the beds and other items for the convenience and comfort of the traveling public include telephones, and a television set in each room, panel-ra/ heat and an individual refrigerated air conditioner.

The parking area around the motel has been black-topped. In about the center of the area a large space has been reserved for landscaping.

The motel is on Highway 90 near the junction for US285 and has been named "Desert Air Motel".











TEXAS LAWYERS
Federal Judge Duval West
"He serves best who serves twice"

Two kinds of lawmen have helped to build Texas — the peace officer and the judge. Duval West was both, and as both served his country well. Born in Austin, 1861, he graduated from the Texas Military Institute there in 1879. Like most young Texans of his day, he adventured for a couple of carefree cowboy years. U. S. District Attorney there, Adjutant U. S. Volunteers, 1st Texas Cavalry, in the Spanish-American War, personal envoy of President Wilson to Mexico's revolutionary leaders in 1914. In 1916 he was appointed U. S. District Judge of the Western Texas District and served with distinction until shortly before his death in 1949 at 87 — a Texan whom Texans will always remember with pride.

THE UNFAIR LUXURY TAX

On June 30th of this year, Federal Excise Tax on local telephone service will be removed. This tax, called a Luxury Tax, initially imposed as a war-time measure is at present the only tax that is paid for any utility service.

The removal of the Luxury Tax will mean a reduction in the amount that you pay for local service — the top line on your bill — of 10%.

I want to congratulate you folks in Sanderson for the wonderful support and interest you have shown in bringing about the removal of the tax. Of course, without your help in letting your representatives know how you felt it could never have been done.

Under the terms of a bill passed by Congress in 1959 the Excise Tax on local service is supposed to end June 30, 1960. In the 1960 session however, attempts may be made to retain this tax. So, it is important to keep your representatives informed of your feelings to insure this does not happen.

While removal of the Excise Tax on local service will be a step in the right direction, it will still leave you folks paying a 10% Excise Tax on long distance service. Again it will be up to you to bring about the removal of this, too. Your words and correspondence are the main guiding point for your Congressmen.

SPIRIT OF SERVICE IN ACTION
