Saturday the taxpaying voters of Terrell County will be called upon to express their desire for or against the \$50,000 bond issue for the construction of a swimming pool and park facilities here in Sanderson.

The Times has made every effort possible to give this project thorough and an impartial publicity coverage so that the voters may be able to go to the polls and vote intelligently on the issue. It has been our honest endeavor to give as much information on the subject, both pro and con, as we were able to gather. The decision is yours to make on Saturday.

We realize that there are differences of opinions on the feasibility of such an issue. There are many needs in this community and some should have priority over others so it is up to you to decide which, in your opinion, should come first. We must face the facts that things must happen or we cannot sit idly by and hope for great things to happen. An effort must be made to provide those things which are necessary for the growth and development of the community. Let's all think and earnestly about what we should do and then all get together and do it. There is no room in a small community for two or more groups of civic-minded citizens pulling against each other and at the same time are hampering the development that is needed. 15 New Students Enroll Here

Fifteen children were enrolled in the Sanderson Schools this week, coming from the families who have moved to the Brown-Bassett Field where the men are employed in the new gas plant there. The students are in grades one through ten. It is possible that five more pupils will attend the local schools after mid-term.

Transportation for the students to school has been handled on a day-by-day basis this week, according to Supt. Matt F. Bader. Teachers have been driving the bus used for extra-curricular activities to and from the field each day.

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees Wednesday night, it was decided to use the new 72-passenger bus, which is expected to be delivered this week, for transporting the pupils to and from Dryden. The bus now being used to transport Dryden pupils will be stationed at the gas field for bringing the pupils to Sanderson. Only those children residing at the field and between the field and Dryden will be permitted to ride that bus as the distance of 53 miles will take longer than an hour for each trip to and from Sanderson.

Harral Ranch Leased for 99 Years To Girl Scouts

The Hat-A headquarters, southeast of Fort Stockton, is a new campsite of the Permian Basin Girl Scout Council, according to information received recently.

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur G. Harral of San Angelo and Mr. and Mrs. Arthur G. Harral Jr. of Fort Stockton conveyed to the Council a lease which runs up to 99 years for exclusive use of the picturesque ranch headquarters in the Pecos County foothills.

The Council will have additional use of the entire 40 sections of the ranch for horseback riding, hiking, and other approved Scouting activities.

The ranch buildings will be used in addition to the Mitre Peak Camp near Alpine which is nearing its efficient capacity. The only consideration in the lease is a token payment of \$1 a year and the obligation of the Council to maintain the properties and keep the watering facilities in repair to supply the premises and livestock in adjoining pastures.

Bond Election To Be Saturday

Saturday has been set as the date for a bond election for \$50,000 for a proposed swimming pool for Sanderson. The election will be in all four precinct and all eligible property tax paying voters may vote on the issue.

The election is the result of the efforts of a group of local citizens who passed a petition for signatures which was presented to the Commissioners' Court last summer. The Commissioners voted to call the election to ascertain the will of the eligible voters in the election.

It is understood that the American Legion has made property for the pool available.

The details of operation of the pool, pending passage of the proposal at the election, will be in the hand of the Commissioners who will also be responsible for working out all details of construction, location, size, price of admission, and all other details, according to information available.

Bonds will be sold in a sufficient quantity to pay for the cost of construction of the pool, and purchase of land, if any, and will bear interest at the rate of not more than three and one-half per cent per annum. The bonds shall not run for longer than 15 years.

The Commissioners Court will also be allowed to levy a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem the bonds at maturity.

Election judges and polling places will be: John W. Byrd, precinct 1, courthouse; R. A. Gatlin, precinct 2, Dryden school; G. K. Mitchell, precinct 3, Harkins ranch; E. A. Rogers, precinct 4, Independence Creek road camp.

Polls will be open Saturday at 8:00 a.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m.

Alien Registration Due By January 31

Richard C. Haberstroh, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, this week stated that all aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited diplomats; (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations; and (3) Those admitted temporarily as agricultural workers.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any post office or Immigration office during the month of January.

Mr. Haberstroh said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

Austin — By the time Austin sweeps up the last of the holiday tinsel, it will be time to prepare for another round of festivities.

Committees already are meeting to plan details of the inaugural events that will attract thousands of visitors to the Texas capital, come January 17.

Gov. Price Daniel will take the oath of office for his third term. Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey for his sixth term. If weather permits an inaugural parade, these two officials will ride at the head of it up Congress Avenue, to the Capitol grounds where the swearing-in ceremony will take place.

A reception and a half-dozen balls will fill out the day. For his past two inaugurations, Governor Daniel has held a prayer breakfast beforehand for state officials. No Special Session

Haggling and suspense over who will be Speaker of the House for the 57th Legislature will continue until January 19.

That is the first day of the regular session when House members, by secret ballot, will elect the speaker from the membership.

Rep. James Cotten of Weatherford asked Governor Daniel to call lawmakers together this month. New members could be sworn in and a speaker elected in a one-day session, he said. This would give the speaker time to organize committees and be ready to go to work in January.

But Gov. Daniel said that any legislature meeting this year would be the 56th Legislature, which could not elect a speaker for the 57th Legislature.

Reps. Wade Spilman of McAllen and James Turman of Gober are candidates for speaker. Both, reportedly, are "ahead."

Spilman, in a recent letter to House members, announced addition of two more pledges to him. He said, "A majority of the members have committed their vote to me for Speaker." Turner

says the same thing. So, the big question is: How will the members vote?

Safety Drive Launched

This year's campaign for careful driving during the holidays will be launched on "Safety Sunday," December 11.

Many organizations, including the Texas Press Association, will help in the annual drive to cut the Christmas-through-New Year accident toll.

"Safety Sunday," said the governor in his proclamation of the special day, is "to awaken the conscience of every driver to the understanding that negligence at the wheel is a transgression of God's own command, 'Thou Shalt Not Kill!'"

In past years, the governor noted, the all-out campaigns have resulted in the death toll's falling below Public Safety predictions.

Last year the DPS predicted 111 deaths. When the holiday season ended only 91 had died, for a total of 20 lives saved.

Program for Aged

Enactment of medical care for the aged and an increase in state pensions are among recommendations of a joint legislative committee to study problems of the aging.

Committee announced it would work for a constitutional amendment to raise by \$10,000,000 a year the ceiling on old age assistance

It also urged that the next Legislature pass laws to put into effect a program to provide state help for the medical expenses of needy oldsters.

Transfer of senile, but not mentally ill patients, from the mental hospitals to nursing home care was recommended. Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, is chairman of the committee, and Rep. Howard Green of Fort Worth is vice-chairman.

Vet Bond Sale Canceled

Veterans Land Board has set aside plans to hold a bond sale this month because of criticism from Land Commissioner-elect Jerry Sadler.

Board announced its decision "with regret," declaring that the veterans waiting to buy land would be the losers.

No bonds have been sold since June, 1958, because the state ceiling on interest was too low to attract buyers. Board said it felt the people were expressing their desire to get the program in full operation again when they approved a constitutional amendment in November to raise the interest ceiling.

Sadler protested the sale. He said he felt the bonds could be sold at a more favorable rate next year after a change in the national administration.

Parr Loses Out

Texas Supreme Court refused to review a lower court ruling that blocked George Parr's fight to become Duval County's Democratic Party Chairman.

Parr won a district court order for a re-count, but the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals overturned the decision. Supreme Court refused to step in, noting that the Election Code said it had no jurisdiction to review election contests.

It was another setback for the Duke of Duval, once credited with the power to decide how

any political race in the county would go.

Short Snorts

State's general revenue fund is going deeper into the hole, sinking to a deficit of \$76,724,738 on the state treasurer's last report. Deficit increased \$10,000,000 in three weeks.

On the plus side, the state received a check for \$636,547.92 as

its share of income from the sale of 119,400,000 board feet of lumber and other uses of the Texas national forests. Money will be divided among the 11 East Texas counties in which the forests are located.

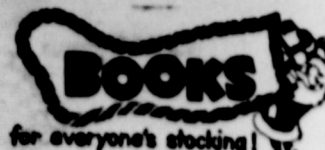

The Highsmiths, Samuel and Malciah
The Rangers' Father-and-Son Team

Samuel Highsmith had a tintype made for his 11-year-old son, Malciah. The date was April 22, 1836, the day after the battle of San Jacinto. Sam was pictured wearing a Mexican uniform which he had recently removed from a prisoner, General López de Santa Anna.

But, at peaceful pursuits Sam wasn't so successful. A hog raising venture in Jackson County did not prosper, mostly because the volunteer army of the New Republic camped near the ranch, and the army liked fresh pork. So, 1840 found Highsmith a Texas Ranger, and a good one. From that time on, he was a soldier or Ranger, in one service or the other, whichever promised better and faster action. In the meantime, young Malciah was impatiently getting some schooling and counting his birthdays. At 17 years and to no one's surprise, he joined the Ranger company captained by his father, and the Highsmiths enjoyed numerous Indian and Mexican border campaigns, a fighting team born to be and trained to be just what they were — frontier lawmen.

Samuel Highsmith was short lived. At 45 years he was buried in the first Protestant burying ground in San Antonio. Malciah went on to serve faithfully and well through the Civil War and to live to a ripe age of 66.

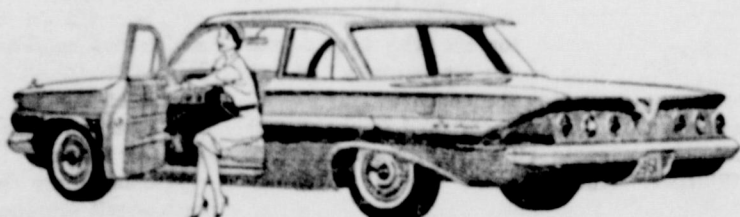

Farm Figures From 1959 Census Are Released

The 1959 Census of Agriculture conducted in Terrell County last fall, counted 98 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Total land in farms was 1,340,177 acres. The average size of farm was 13,675.3 acres. The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$226,452, according to the report.

Of the county's farm operators, 26 owned their farms, 25 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 47 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators was 50.2 years. There were 18 farm operators 65 years or more years of age.

Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics for 1954.

Letters from Readers

Dear Reader and Taxpayer: I enjoyed your article last week very much but would like to point out a few differences of operation that we will have in Terrell County. The pool in Fort Stockton cost \$100,000.00 whereas our pool can be completed for \$32,200.00. Their yearly interest rate is \$2,785.00. Our yearly interest rate will be \$1,225.00 on \$35,000.00, a saving of \$1,560.00 in interest alone. I do not know what the pool supplies and expenses figures consists of in your article so cannot say whether or not the figure could be reduced on our pool. We believe with our filtering system our utility bill will be less than those shown for Fort Stockton. The salary expense should be about the same.

Our figures for Terrell County have allowed for the smaller trade area and population. We have eliminated the family pass and used a straight charge of 50c per person. We estimate an average of 100 users a day at 50c each for 135 days a year. This would bring in \$6,750.00. Allowing \$3,538.00 for the bond sinking fund each year we will have \$3,192.00 for operating the pool.

We use the 100 persons a day average because we believe we can easily get that much usage. There are 680 students registered in our schools. If they average one swim a week we will then need only 20 non-school swimmers a week to maintain this average. The 163 average paid admissions to the Fort Stockton pool does not take into account the 245 season family tickets that are sold. This will account for quite a number of users each day.

There will also be a big savings for the school by using our own facilities for spring picnics and swim parties and not having the expense and danger of running our school buses to Fort Stockton as we have done in the past. In addition to that, the money spent for the use of our pool will stay in Terrell County and not enrich the Pecos County businesses.

In closing, I would like to ask the taxpaying voters of Terrell County to think over the advantages we have tried to point out to them over the past months of having our own park and swimming pool and then vote as they think right.

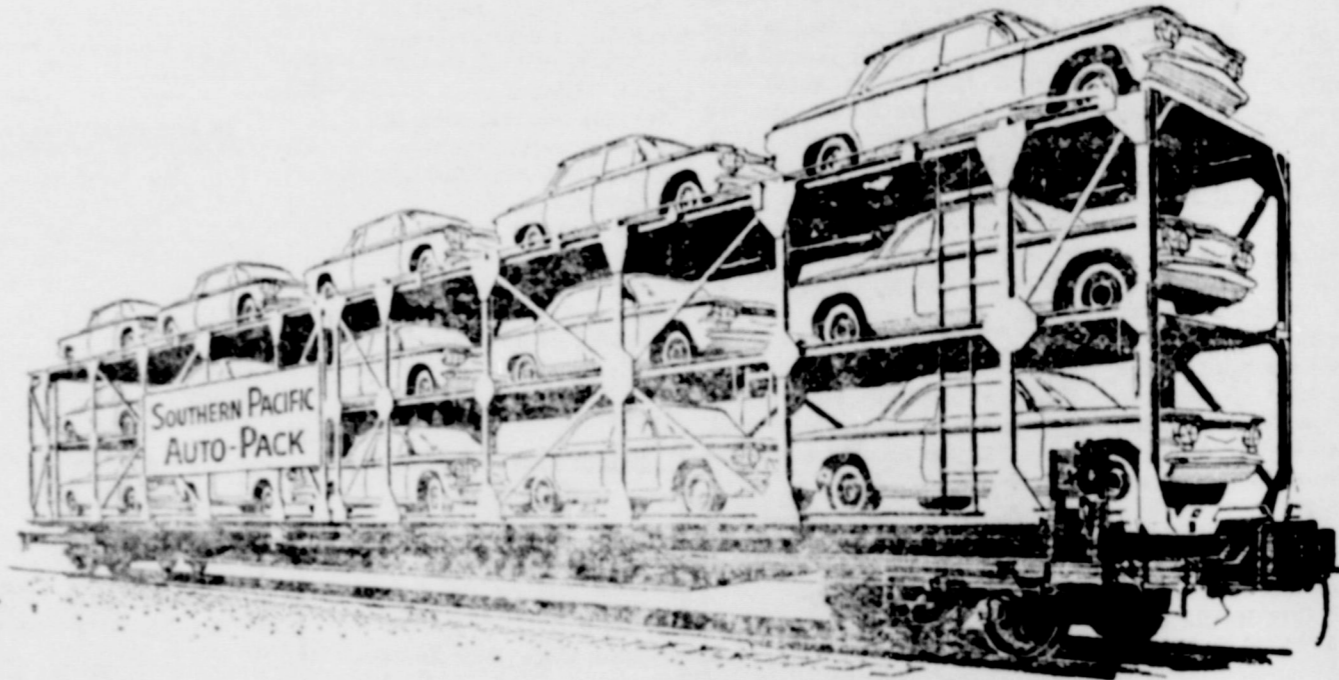

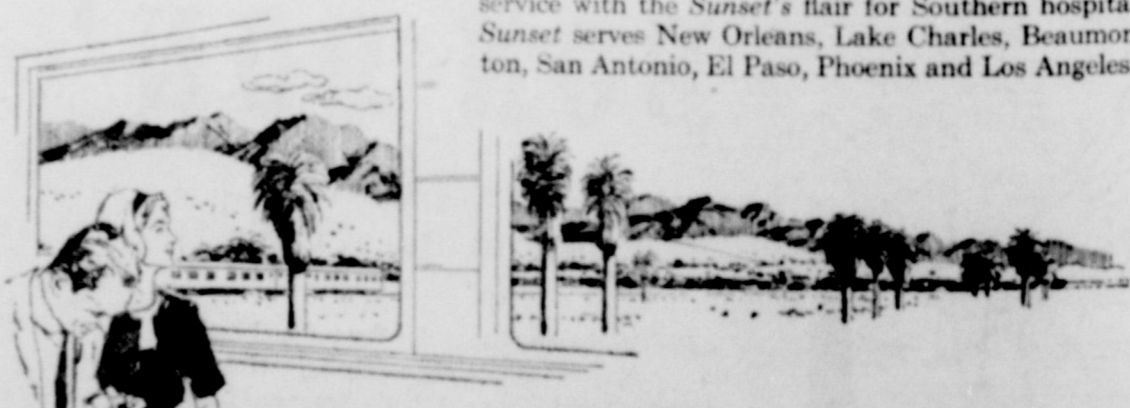
