Area Wool Sold Up To 54 1-2c Pound To Be Sunday Here Last Friday

Prices ranged from 48 1-8 to 51 1-2 cents per pound on 352,253 pounds of 8-months and 12months wool which was offered for sale to wool buyers of the nation last week. The sealed-bid sale was at the warehouse of the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. here last Friday. John T. Williams, owner of the

wool warehouse, stated that his firm offered 460,000 pounds of wool and bids were received on every lot offered.

The average price was estimated to be about 52 cents per pound for the wool bought.

Of the wool sold, 148,200 pounds were of 12-months wool and 204,-323 pounds were 8-months wool.

"May we continue to solicit your cooperation in this endeavor, and when each individual driver accepts his responsibility of reducing traffic accidents, a reduction will come," Butler concluded.

SS Law Changes Ups Allowed Wage

Starting with this year, a person can earn more money and still be paid some social security benefits, according to H. P. Thomas, district manager of the Odessa Social Security Office.

There is no change in the part of the law allowing a person to receive all 12 of his monthly benefits if he earns \$1200 or less during that year. The change in the law has to do with earnings over \$1200 a year. For the first \$300 of earnings over \$1200 the total family benefits for the year are reduced by \$1 for each \$2 of earnings. For every \$1 of earnings over \$1500 for the year, the total family benefits for the year are reduced by \$1. However, regardless of the total earnings during the year, benefits are payable for any month in which the earnings are no more than \$100 in wages or salary or in which the person does not render substantial services as a self-employed person. Also, the full monthly benefits

are payable starting with the month in which the wage earner or self-employed person is age 72, regardless of earnings.

An example might illustrate the new provision. A man under 72 and his wife are eligible for \$165 per month old-age insurance benefits or a yearly total of \$1980. The man works 8 months during 1961 for \$250 per month. for total earnings during the year of \$2000. For the first \$300 of earnings over \$1200, benefits to the man and wife of \$150 would not be payable. For the earnings over \$1500, another \$500 in benefits would not be payable. Therefore, even though the man earned \$2000 during the year, he and his wife would still be eligible for \$1330 in social security benefits. Under the law in effect before \$1961, only \$660 in benefits would have been payable in this case.


