LISTEN TO LUKE

Last fall during the great de-
bates, we heard then-candidate
J. F. Kennedy solemnly promise
that he would not, if elec-
ted, go to the summit until the
ground work had been laid for
serious talks by ambassadors.
There had to be some reason
to believe that plans had reached
the stage where some agreements
were possible on the vast differ-
ences of the leaders of the two
nations. We find that he has al-
ready violated those two prom-
ises.

We only hope that the ex-
change of positions and ideals
has not cost us some additional
measure of prestige in the eyes of
the world.

What we read of the trip was
the indication of a European dis-
taste for Jacqueline's charms.
Maybe that's what American
diplomacy has been needing for
a long time!

We see where the "bulldozers"
deal has been put
back again by Castro. We are
sorry to know that he thinks or
feels his deal will be accepted.
We got a newsletter last week
with one paragraph condemning
Castro for proposing such a deal
and then two additional pages of
whittling those who would take
it up on the proposition.
International blackmail will
be attempted unless both
sides participate.

If something is worthy of the
participation by all Americans
in America itself, it would seem
we should not separate ourselv-
es, nor permit ourselves to be
separated from our government
which has stood for so many
grand and glorious things for so
long to so many people. A cause
is worth fighting for as
long as it is worth America
fighting for.

It has been said by some that
the gift of money to buy bull-
dozers to be traded for prisoners
is not being a party to black-
mail. And lots of people feel that
the payment of money causes
the turning of eyes. And to a lot
of people it doesn't!

Principles are not bought and
neither is righteousness.
What label would be put on a
group of United States soldiers
who came home during a war
and asked the people to buy
freedom with bulldozers?
What kind of label would be
put on our government if we

thirty pieces of silver once
bought a Savior's life. History
has condemned only the sell-
er, but has the buyer been ex-
cused?

Another piece of mail we got
last week had Jim Wright's name
on the bottom, and we
don't know which Jim Wright it
is or if any Jim Wright wrote
it. But it had a sentence
that the two legal size mimeo-
graph sheets that we thought
were picking out. Little of in-
terest was said in the rest of the
letter.

This sentence said: "It (doe-
sire Republicanism) emerges
a new force to be seriously
studied with from now on."
"Republican" a word that is
anonymous with "Communism"
ism" or "Facism", or "Bund-
" or "Maf-ism" or something
that? Maybe it is in certain
literary circles.

Most All Local Streets Now Are Black-Topped

Sanderson probably can boast
of more black-topped streets or
blocks proportionately than any
other town in West Texas or pos-
sibly in Texas. There are only
about four or five blocks of un-
topped streets in Sanderson, ac-
cording to County Judge R. S.
Wilkinson, and he said these
untopped blocks do not have any
houses on them.

Recent work by the County

Commissioners in black-topping
local streets completed nearly all
portions of local streets.

Examples of the unpaved sec-
tions include the street from 1st
Street and Downie south to the
home of Judge Wilkinson and the
two or three residences in that
area; and also east from that cor-
ner on Downie Street to the San-
derison Canyon; and one or two
blocks east of the bridge where
there are no houses.

Electric Sub-Station Built By C.P.S. Doubles Capacity

A new electric sub-station be-
ing constructed by the Commu-
nity Public Service Co. here will
double the present capacity out-
put of electricity, according to
James Caroline, local manager
for the company, and Woody Ivy,
district engineer, of Pecos.

The new sub-station incorpo-
rates many new facilities and in-
novations that were not possible
with the old system and is ex-
pected to be a boon to local elec-
tricity users in that there will not
be a near-approach to electrical
output for a good many years or
unless phenomenal growth is
seen in Sanderson.

It was stated that the electrical
demands of Sanderson have
grown by almost 25 per cent dur-
ing the last three years, and that
the increase has been steady dur-
ing the past several years, indic-
ating a growth in the town and a
solid growth as reflected by the
steadiness of the increase.

The utility officials pointed out
that all improvements possibly
foreseen were being made to
take care of projected future de-
mands of the people in the area
the company serves.

The new sub-station was said
to cost between \$50,000 and \$75,-
000.

A gasoline-powered air com-
pressor has also been installed
at the local power station to use
when emergency demands the
starting of local power genera-
tors. This, they said, should mini-
mize chances of Sanderson being
without power for critical
industry and business.

The sub-station is being built
on the company's property in
Sanderson near the wool house
and will be on the south of the
present sub-station.

Two Men Charged With Indecent Exposure in Public

fine of \$25 by Justice of Peace
J. A. Gilbreath. Court costs for
the trial of \$19.50 was also as-
sessed the defendant.

This was the second conviction
of the same offense for the boy.

Rainfall First of Week Total Inch In Sanderson

Rain fell in Sanderson Sun-
day afternoon, accompanied by
some light hail, and put 2-inch
of moisture in local gauges.

Again Monday night early a
steady straight downpour, which
lasted approximately 30 minutes
left 4-inch of rain locally.

Heavy lightning and thunder
accompanied both showers.

Heavy hail damage was report-
ed from the W. R. Stumberg

ranch west of Sanderson in
Brewster County and south of
Sanderson on the J. D. Nichols
ranch and the R. A. Gatlin ranch
on Sunday night.

Mr. Gatlin stated that window
panes in the ranch house were
shattered by the hailstones "as
big as guinea eggs", and some
visitors there from Del Rio had
some damage to their airplane
by the hailstones, but they were
able to fly back to Del Rio.

Some heavy gusts of wind ac-
companied the rains Sunday.

There was no report of hail or
high winds with the rain Monday.
Late Wednesday evening a rain
cloud distributed about 3-inch of
moisture in this immediate area
in two separate showers. Heavy
lightning and thunder accompa-
nied the rain.

Area ranchmen who have been
recipients of the beneficial mois-
ture, stated that it could not have
come at a better time. The ef-
fects of the rain are already vis-
ible on surrounding hills.

Hail was reported to have done
some damage to the range at the
W. R. Stumberg ranch Sunday af-
ternoon, and some damage was
also reported to the house.

Hail accompanying the rain on
Tuesday afternoon late, was re-
ported to have torn screens and
broken window panes at the
Stumberg ranch house causing
considerable damage.

High winds and about three
inches of rain was reported at
Longfellow Tuesday night. Water
was said to have got up over the
highway there, causing traffic to
be delayed for some time.

Austin - From now until July 10 will be a period of testing how representative democracy in Texas works.

Legislature is to re-convene July 10 to make a fresh stab at writing a tax bill to raise some \$350,000,000 for the next two years.

Governor Daniel is strongly opposed to the adoption of any sales tax plan designed to raise the major portion of this needed revenue.

Now it's the lobbyists who are riled.

Gov. Daniel has announced that he will name a new citizens' committee to study the state's fiscal problems and make recommendations before the special session begins.

Grand Gesture

Before adjourning, the Senate gave approval to a \$2,600,000,000 general appropriations bill for the two years beginning September 1.

But without passage of a money-raising bill to back it up, appropriations had no meaning.

Senate adopted the appropriations conference committee report - a plan that called for spending \$385,500,000 from the general revenue, compared to the present \$320,000,000 general revenue appropriation.

Some also passed an equally ineffective \$810 a year raise for school teachers before adjourning.

All was for naught, however, when the tax bill failed to pass.

Amendments Proposed

Texas voters can get ready for a bumper crop of 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be on the November ballot in 1962.

Some of the amendments are of major importance; some are only local in effect and application. Among them are proposals to:

- 1. Increase maximum possible yearly payments to the permanently disabled from \$1,500,000 to \$2,500,000.
2. Allow the state water development board to purchase water storage space in reservoirs constructed by other units of government, such as the federal government.
3. Permit the Veterans Land Board to sell forfeited land to non-veteran buyers to liquidate land the state is "stuck with".
4. Authorize the Legislature to provide for "trial de novo" (trial anew) in appeals from decisions of state agencies.
5. Allow the Legislature to name successors to officials knocked out by a major catastrophe such as enemy attack.
6. Raise the present \$47,000,000 a year ceiling on public welfare payments to \$52,000,000.
7. Allow the Legislature to set up hospital districts without a special constitutional amendment for each one.
8. Allow the Legislature to delegate to local government control of traffic, parking and sanitation on public beaches.

New Power for Probers

Future witnesses before legislative committees can be compelled to tell the truth or face perjury penalties under a measure that passed both houses.

Last year the perjury conviction of former Insurance Commissioner J. Byron Saunders was voided by the courts on grounds the anti-perjury statute did not cover statements to legislative committees.

This bill spells out the right of legislative committees to make investigations and makes it a penal offense (two to ten years) to lie deliberately to such a committee.

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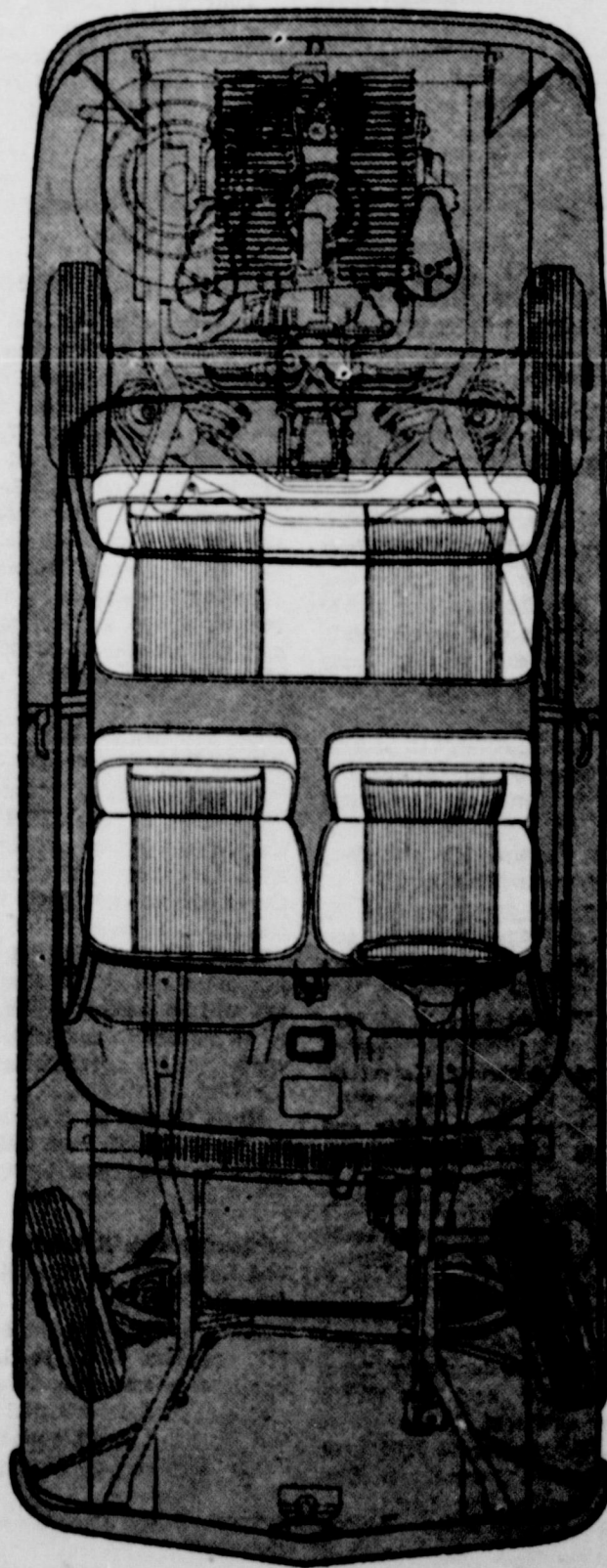

2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 cup butter, melted
3 tablespoons light cream or hot water

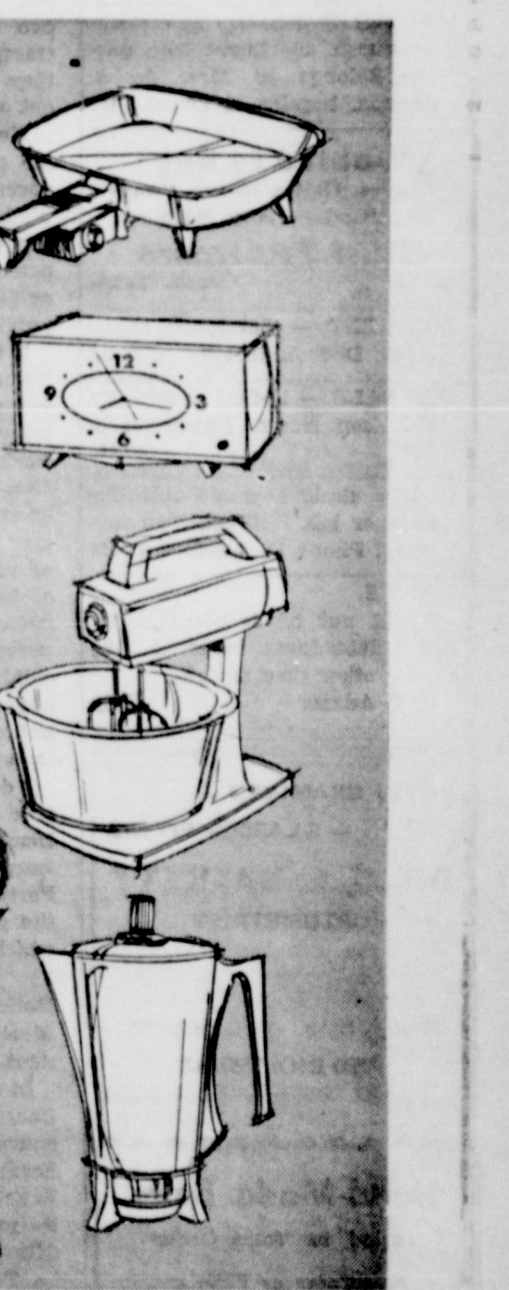

that Republicanism was a new force to be seriously reckoned with from now on.

Our folks always told us to be scared of snakes with cat eyes, dogs that didn't bark, graveyards at night, black cats crossing our paths, and lots of other things like that, but we don't remember them telling us to be afraid of a Republican and what he might do to this country or to an area.

We were always brought up to believe that a Republican was a kind of "bourgeois" American or something like that, who wore white collars and clean clothes and lived in nice houses instead of on the farm like we did. We were told that they had different political views from us Democrats and that we always seemed to be for different candidates but were weren't told about them being a menace to society.

One thing that we have noticed about the Republicans and that is in winning an election they haven't stooped to electioneering. Sometimes they have to win two or three times before they emerge the declared victors, but they don't get all the skeletons out of the closet to do it.

We still, as always, believe in the principles of a democratic government. But we still cannot pledge unwavering devotion to any political party or condemn a person because he happens to be or not to be a Democrat or a Republican.

If the Republican Party, or the Democratic Party or any other group by any other name can bring to this nation and to the world a life of harmonious freedom through God-given privileges of men and if in the result we may enjoy some of the luxuries of prosperity which is the fruit of honest labor and private initiative without the controls of government or men, and rear our children in the knowledge and understanding of freedom in the richest significance of the word, then I'm for that party.

I do not feel that such an attitude is that of a traitor to the Democratic Party, but that a contrary attitude by the Democratic Party, if one exists, is traitor to the principles of the government which sanctions its existence.
