Although handicapped by not having a means of communication which would aid in creating enthusiasm needed for an all-out response, people began bringing in foodstuffs and clothing and a crew of workers stayed on duty all day Monday and Tuesday to receive the donations at the courthouse. *

Tuesday evening the donations were loaded on trucks and taken to Odessa where gifts from all over this area were assembled and loaded on large trucks for delivery to the stricken area. C G. Riggins, John Huey, and L. E. Muller drove the trucks to Odes-

More than \$400 in cash was donated plus about \$800 worth of groceries and many large bundles of wearable clothes for all ages. The cash donations were turned over to a local grocer who wired his wholesaler to deliver that amount of groceries to the relief agency which is distributing to the stricken people on the coast.

The people of Sanderson were eager to participate in this great movement and the workers were diligent and unselfish in their efforts. All of the workers asked The Times to express their sincere thanks for the big-hearted support given to them to make the drive a success.

The volunteers stated that additional food stuffs, money and bedding or cots, etc., could still be used and would be accepted and turned over to the proper authorities.

Highway Commission Boosts Program For Farm-Market Roads

The Texas Highway Commission, in its meeting on Tuesday. August 29, expressed a belief and hope that the Texas Legislature would see fit to reinstate the 1962 Farm to Market appropriation, together with the urgently needed flexibility in the use of Farm to Market Road funds to cope with the increasing problem of maintenance as recommended by Governor Price Daniel.

The Commission expressed the hope that this action would be taken at the forthcoming special session of the Legislature, and stated that it is vital that this appropriation be reinstated and that adequate maintenance be authorized in the second half of this biennium if the Texas Highway Department is to continue the Farm to Market Road Program at the current pace.

The Commission pointed out that the problem now is the adequate maintenance, improvement, and reconstruction of the 34,000 miles of Farm to Market Roads that have already been built, and that the Department has now reached the point where a portion of the total Farm to Market Road earmarked funds must be spent for maintenance.

Two Ranchmen Plan Soil Conservation Practices

J. M. Corder is installing some net wire diversions on his ranch in order to slow down the velocity of the runoff water and also spread the runoff water over a wider area. He is also doing some critical area shaping on a severely eroded area in order to slow down the water and not let it "cut back" up the draw.
