Heirs Get Ranch **College Refunded**

Nephews and nieces of the late William M. Edwards, Terrell and Pecos County ranchman were awarded title and possesion of the ranch lands in a judgment rendered Friday of last week by Judge C. E. Patterson of the 83rd District. The judgment set aside contracts and a deed dated Dec. 15, 1956, under which Abilene Christian College held title to the land.

The judgment held that the college should recover the principal sum of \$209,727.32, plus interest at 55 per cent, a total of \$242,901. which it had advanced to Mr. Edwards to make payments on indebtedness against the land. This award carried a lien against the land to secure the payment of the advances.

One of the worst tragedies of this area occurred on the west side of Dryden Saturday morning at about 7:30 o'clock when a 1955 Ford and a Braswell truck crashed, killing all five occupants of the car. The driver of the truck escaped with omy minor injuries.

The people in the car were identified by the parents of one of the victims who were traveling in another car close behind. They were: Mrs. Juan Salinas, 17. her son, Juan Jr., 2-weeks; Carlos Castillo, 27, driver and owner of the car: his brother, Pedro Castillo, 16; Gustavo Medina, 20, ali of Brownsville.

The passenger car, traveling east, failed to negotiate a curve to the right and the right front wheel struck the right front of the Braswell truck which was going west. The impact knocked the front wheels and steering mechanism out from under the truck tractor and ripped the top and right side of the body of the car completely off the chassis, leaving only the left doors, part of the deck lid, and part of the left front fender. A part of the truck's frame was imbedded in the engine of the car.

Castillo, the driver, was thrown from the car and the vehicle apparently passed over his body in the careening slide following the impact. The body of the baby was also outside of the car when found. All of the occupants died instantly as a result of the crash, according to a ruling by Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath. who was called to the scene of the crash.

The driver of the truck, Raymond Hoyle Edwards, received lacerations about the head and abrasions of the body when he was throwns from the truck's cab. He was unconscious immediately after the accident, but later was able to be on his feet prior to being taken to a Fort Stockton hospital for examination and treatment.

Mr. and Mrs. Mireles, parents of Mrs. Salinas, and their young son who were traveling in a station wagon behind the car

in the accident, stated that they were not close enough to see the accident, but saw the dust result ing from the accident, and did not stop but went immediately on into Dryden to phone Sanderson for ambulance service and of ficers. The accident happened just

west of the Baroid mud warehouse in Dryden.

Texas Highway Patrolman Carl L. Davis and Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg investigated the accident.

A near tragic ending to such a catastrope was averted when a second Braswell truck driver, behind the truck involved in the accident, extinguished a fire in the accident car and also a fire in the truck, both or either of which might have ignited the diesel oil which covered the entire highway for a distance of approximately 100 feet.

Lewis Cash and Glynn Babb. both Dryden residents, stationed themselves on either side of the wreckage to flag down oncoming traffic and thus possibly avert further tragedy.

The bodies of the victims were brought to Sanderson to the Lawrence Janes Funeral Home and were later taken by a Brownsville mortician to that city for burial.

Judy Denson Is SAC Twirler Word was received here this week that Miss Judy Denson has been named twirler for the San Angelo College band. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J Denson and is a sophomore student at SAC.

The judgment specified that a sum of \$26,007 collected as grabing lease payments and held in trust by the court should be paid to the heirs. The ruling also set aside leases on the land which had been made by Roy Landers as guardian of the estate of Mr. Edwards to J. H. Lanning Jr.

The judgment provides that in event the plaintiff should later become entitled to title and to possession of the land through action of the higher courts that the college should be entitled to collect lease from the heirs at the rate of \$31,368.55 per year (75 cents per acre) from the time of Mr. Edward's death in 1959 to the date of such outcome

The suit was styled Abilene Christian College vs. Roy H Landers and others. By the action the college sought to recover possession of the land, as specified in its contracts with Mr. Edwards worked out in 1954, nearly 5 years before his death.

A mistrial was declared after the suit was heard in January and February of this year in Fort Stockton.

When the suit was retried in August and the first part of September, the jury found Mr. Edwards was of sound mind at the time of signing a contract with and deed to the college, as contended by the plaintiffs. But the jury ruled for the defendants on questions involving undue influence by college officials on Mr. Edwards causing him to reach such a decision.

Maurice R. Bullock of Fort Stockton, member of the counsel for the plaintiff, said last week that the college would file a motion for a new trial, and that if it were denied, they then would appeal the decision to the 8th District Court of Appeals in El Paso

Final legal details were bulldozed from the path of the biggest state water project in Texas history. Reason - to pave the way for ground-breaking ceremonies Thursday near the site of Toledo Bend Reservoir on the Sabine River.

State Board of Water Engineers. Texas Water Development Board and the Attorney General's office worked overtime in order to approve the project - from engineering. fiscal and legal standpoints.

Sabine River Authorities in both Texas and Louisiana are 50-50 partners in the Toledo Bend Dam to be constructed near Newton, Texas. It may cost as much as \$60,000,000. Original estimate, in 1957, was \$54,000,000.

No federal aid was sought.

Louisiana put up \$1.55,000,000 fa tax money. Texas is lending the SRA of Texas \$15,000,000. The balance will be borrowed from private investors.

This giant thydroelectric project will provide power for utility companies in Texas and Louisiana to market. It will supply Calcasieu Parish, La., and Orange County, Texas, with water for domestic and municipal use, irrigation and industries. Lost Land?
