Efforts will begin in the near future to organize ranchmen of Terrell County to participate in the screw worm fly eradication program planned for this section of the United States. Further details wil lbe released when they are available

Some ranchmen of the county have attended meeting in other counties and have been in contact with other county representatives in connection with the planned program and consider it vital and essential that local participation be obtained so that a thorough and complete job will be accomplished if and when

such a program is begun. It thas been pointed out that the program, to have the best opportunity to get cooperation of certain federal agencies, and to have maximum benefits once it is undertaken, must have the cooperation of practically all stock men of the nation.

To obtain maximum strength for seeking federal government cooperation, appeal is being made to poultry raisers, dairy farmers swine raisers, sheep, goat, and

cattle raisers, and horse breeders As soon as is possible and feasable, all ranchmen of the county will be asked to attend a meeting to hear an explanation of the proposed program, its method of financing, its plan of trust deposits, and all other related informa-

Ranchmen are asked to watch their mail closely for notification of the time, date, and place of such a meeting, and The Times will carry such information if it is at all possible and also will pass on any related information as it becomes available.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas crop and livestock reporting service releases, newspaper, farm magazines, radio, and television.

"This annual survey has been a joint undertaking of the post office and the Agriculture Departments since 1924," concludes Mr. Harkins.



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

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
