Among other things, this column is often called upon to define the meaning of words: the word this week is "extremist". After giving it considerable thought, there is only one definition that we can come up with: "One who disagrees with you". In a speech at Los Angeles the other day, President Kennedy urged Americans to shun "discordant voices of extremism" from those who think the greatest danger is from within.

His attack was obviously directed to groups such as the John Birch Society, which has been outspoken on the weakness of leadership in some of the homefront departments of government in failing to recognize the danger of Communism.

In the same daily newspaper which quoted the President on this subject, an adjoining story under the head. "Flexible Berlin Policy JFK Aim", an Associated Press writer says that the President plans to urge German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer to approve a flexible Western policy for negotiations with the Soviet Union on a Berlin settlement. Even though U.S. officials were vague as to details of the precise concessions, it was evident that plans for concessions were in the making.

Is it extremism for the American citizen to demand that no concessions be made which would weaken the treaty now existing on the freedom of West Berlin? In all public speeches both the President and Vice-President have, on many occasions, stated that no concessions whatever

Governor Urges **Observance** Of 'Safety Sunday' Sunday, December 10, has been designated by Governor Price

Daniel as "Safety Sunday" to mark the opening of the annual statewide Christmas-New Year's traffic safety campaign.

In a special proclamation, the Governor said that "experience indicates that the solution to the traffic problem lies in the hands of the individual driver." and urged all citizens to "join in a united effort to awaken the conscience of every driver."

The Governor urged pastors of all Texas chuches to "remind their members of their personal and moral responsibility to drive carefully, obey the traffic laws. and to protect the sanctity of human life in our state."

"Safety Sunday" has been observed by a steadily increasing number of Texas churches and church organizations since it was first proclaimed by Governor Daniel in 1958.

The Governor's Highway Safety Commission will make a statewide effort to secure the cooperation of as many Texas churches and ministers as possible. Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS

director, has announced an intensified law enforcement campaign throughout the state in an effort to hold down the expected traffic toll during the last two months of the year.

Cool Front Brings Moisture

A cool front which blew in late Monday afternoon had some moisture in the clouds which hung heavily Monday afternoon. night and Tuesday morning.

Care For Aged **Guaranteed By** State-U.S. Funds

Austin, Nov. 15 - Once aagin the great State of Texas makes history - this time in health care for the aged. The Board of the State Department of Public Welfare in its regular monthly meeting, with Chairman Burton G Hackney, Brownfield; Will Bond Hillsboro, and W. Kendall Baker, Houston, in attendance, authorized the signing of an agreement between the State Department of Public Welfare and Blue Cross of Texas here today. Texas became the first state in the nation to insure a vast new program of health care for old age assistance recipients, with an independent health care underwriter. In excess of 220,000 old age assistance recipients will become eligible for hospital care, physicians' services in the hospital Marta. and nursing home care, effective January 1, 1962. We believe our choice of Blue Cross to insure this vast program especially advantageous the needy aged on our rolls," said Mr Hackney, board chairman. The assured co-operation of hospitals and doctors of Texas enables Blue Cross to guarantee that the maximum hospital and medical care benefits will he provided at the towest possible cost To this, Walter R. McBee, ex ecutive director of Texas Blut Cross, added. "The vast knowhow of Blue Cross, with nearly 60-million members enrolled, of whom hundreds of thousands are 65 years of age and over, made it possible for us to insure this risk upon a sound factuarial basis This large group will stand on its own feet, and in no wise be aided or subsidized by other Blue ross income. Blue Cross typically makes no cash payments to patients, but makes available the actual services of the hospital, within certain limitations, rather than limited sum of money which all too often is wholly inadequate This will, of course, also be the procedure in this case. Senator Crawford C. Martin of Hillsboro, author of the enabling act passed during the regular session of the 1961 Legislature. commented that since this is in fact an insured program, the independence and dignity of our senior citizens for whom benefits are provided, is preserved. The enabling act was sponsored in the House of Representa tives by Bill Hollowell of Grand Saline and James Markgraf of Scurry. The initial program runs for 20 months - January 1, 1962. through August 31, 1963. The program has been arranged in its entirety by the State Department of Public Welfare. subject to federal approval under the Kerr-Mills Bill John H Winters, Commissioner of the Department, said, "The operation of the program is to be one hundred per cent state controlled." The Department was given free choice of whether to operate the entire program itself, or delegate portions of it.

Deer Hunters To Begin Trek During Next Week

Deer hunters of Texas and possibly other states will begin their westward trek next week in preparation for the season which begins December 1 in the Trans-Pecos area of Texas.

Probably Thursday of next week will be the heaviest day of the exodus of the hunters, since most of the hunters plan no more than one evening in camp prior to the opening day.

Harvest of the antlered animals is expected to be light this year unless cold weather is constant between now and the opening day. Ranchmen report the bucks are not yet "running" and are laying up most of the time when not feeding and will have to be kicked out.

The quantity of the bucks and the general quality of the animals is said to be best in several years, but weather conditions possibly could make one of the most difficult hunting seasons in several years.

The warm weather, if it persists, or is unsettled, will also cause some difficulty or inconvenience to those hunters who have to bring their kill to an ice house for preservation until the party is ready to depart for home. Plans are being made to provide an ice house here by a local individual, but there is no assurance that such can be done





They have it on hand - if we don't spend it someone else will, and if we do, then the amount will be increased next time so we will have much more to worry about how to get rid of it next time


