Gas-Condensate Discovery Sure In Yucca Butte Field

A discovery of Connell gascondensate was assured in Terrell County with the flowing of 81 barrels of condensate and 20 barrels of acid water in 24 hours. plus gas at the daily rate of 4.9 millioin cubic feet at Shell Oil Co. No. 1 Noekle in section 2 of Elock A2 in the TCRR Survey. three miles south of Sheffield southeast of the Devonian gas pay opener in the Yucca Butte multipay field in the north part of Terrell County.

Flow was through a 20 64thinch choke and perforations between 10,044-47 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons. The strike was shut in to wait for potential test.

It is 31/2 miles southeast of the Shell Oil Co. and Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 Blackstone-Slaughter, the Connell, Ellenburger and Pennsylvanian detrital opener of the Pecos County portion of the Yucca Butte gasdistillate field.

Previously washed with 2,000 gallons of mud acid through perforations at 10,004-57 feet, it gauged a maximum of 2 million cubic feet of gas daily and 18.5 barrels of 60 gravity condensate in nine hours through choke of unreported size.

Shell Completes **Fusselman Well** In B-B Field

Shell Oil Co. has completed a 3-mile northwest extension to Fusselman gas production in the Brown-Bassett area of Terrell County at the No. 1 Shell-Sinclair Scott and State, 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of section 10, Block R. TC Survey. It rated a calculated open flow of 3,950,000 cubic feet of gas daily through perforations at 13,-280-290 feet. The Ellenburger had been tested through open hole at 4,640 to 155,100 feet, after being fractured with 17,000 gallons.

AUSTIN - With nearly 40 per cent of the state's population over 65 years old, the State Welfare Department's tandem medical care program for Old Age Assistance recipients will be a significant solution to the problem of providing nursing service and medical treatment for all ailing oldsters.

Welfare Department institutes its program of nursing home care for OAA recipients January 1. Program will affect every old rerson who has to rely on hursing home care, whether he be indigent or financially self sufficient. Rating of nursing homes which apply for payments under the plan should result in a general upgracing o. nursing home standar¹s.

Despite efforts of nursing home operators' associations and the Health Department officials to define this difference, there has been some public confusion about the difference between nursing care and custodial care. Relatives seeking homes for old folks are not always able to determine whether nursing care offered is sufficient for their kin's needs.

Introduction of state and federal money - about \$8,000,000 a year - is certain to result in more and better homes for the aged.

The \$23,000,00 Blue Cross policy for Texas' 220,000 OAA recipients-also effective January 1may pave the way for more thor ough medical protection for old folk

Policy sets a precident, as 140 other insurance company has ever provided such extensive coverage for people over 65. If it does not prove too costly, other companies may offer similar coverage for elderly people on an individual basis.

ing escheat laws that emphasis in his fight to include banks "has been in the wrong place."

He said that instead of battling to get banks to turn over money in dormant accounts, emphasis should be on passing legislation to help find unknown heirs of missing depositors.






