Some L-D Calls Rate Reduction Is Told by SW Bell

A reduction in rates on certain long distance telephone calls in Texas will be put into effect May 20, manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, announced today.

In general, the rate reduction will apply to station-to-station and person-to-person calls of more than 19 miles, Brewer said. The reductions will range from five to 15 cents for a three-minute call.

Brewer pointed out that the reduction does not apply to calls to other states, nor to calls of short distances within the state.

Ellenburger production was extended 1 1/4 miles southwest in the Brown-Bassett multipay field of Terrell County with completion of the Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc. No. 1-B Bassett-Brown, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 53 million cubic feet of gas per day.

Location is 2,458 feet from the north and 185.07 feet from the east lines of section 214 in Block Y of the TCRRL Survey.

Production was through perforations between 14,852 - 930 feet and open hole between 14,970 - 974 feet.

RUTHERFORD: THE RECORD OF A MAN

The measure of a man may be made in many ways. In West Texas we put a lot of stock in a man's performance. In short, we judge him on his record and accomplishments.

Two contrasting announcements of recent date furnish food for thought. One, by Congressman J. T. Rutherford, pledged that he would not desert his post of duty in Washington for political reasons while Congress is in session to consider issues vital to West Texas and the nation.

By contrast, we see Rutherford's various opponents making much of campaigning on a full time basis. In other words, Rutherford has declared himself on the side of duty while his opponents owe fidelity only to personal promotion. We grant his opponents the right to make aggressive campaigns—but we feel honor-bound to note that Rutherford whose love for campaigning has been proved in the past, is sticking to his job even though it means he will have virtually no time to politic through West Texas.

Placing duty above politics is nothing new for Congressman Rutherford. In past elections he has responsibly and with courage stayed on the job in Washington while opponents whooped through the 16th District with the usual promises, raw charges, loud cries and half-truths some candidates consider appropriate election year conduct. Rutherford admits to being a politician, and we think he is one in the highest sense of the word.

Therefore, we know it is only human for him to feel a certain amount of apprehension in knowing his opponents are free to make political medicine while he is occupied with daily work for West Texas. This, however merely makes his decision for duty all the more admirable. He can also take heart in recalling that in similar situations, West Texans approved of his dedication by a display at the polls that kept J. T. Rutherford firmly in the Congressional saddle after the political smoke-screens had disappeared into the blue.

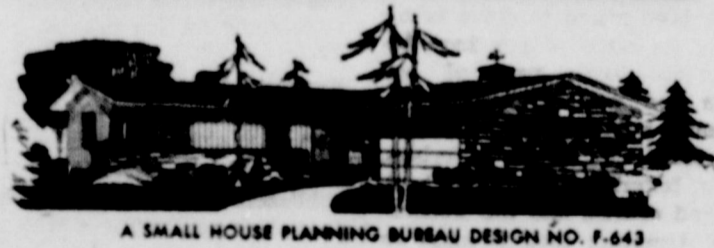

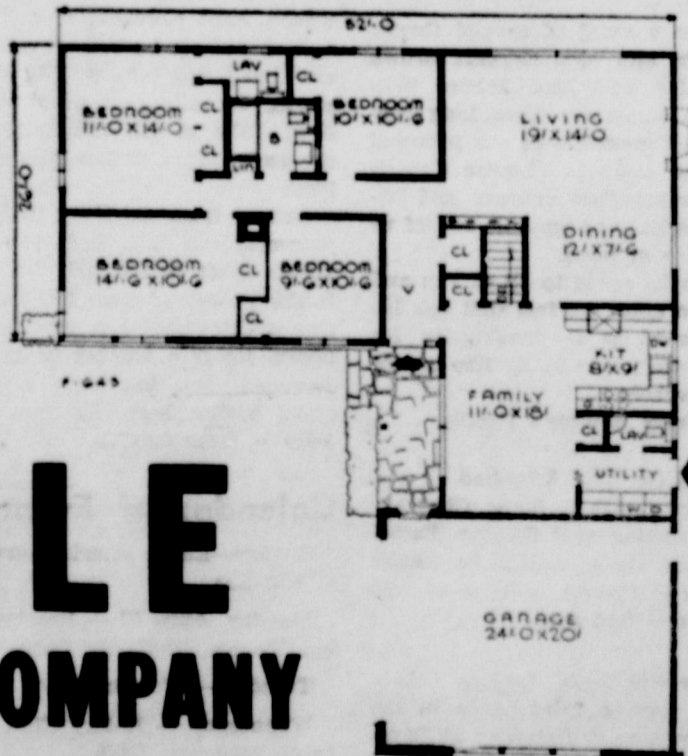
