An upper Wolfcamp discovery has been assured in the southeast portion of the Brown-Bassett multipay field of Terrell County with the flowing of gas at the daily rate of 2,215,000 cubic feet daily at Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., Western Natural Gas Co., Midland, No. 1 Banner Unit. in section 331 of Block 2, TW&NG Survey, 29 miles northeast of

Flow was through a 1-4-inch choke and perforations between 3,906-36 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons. Testing continued.

The project, scheduled as a one-mile southeast and southwest outpost to Ellenburger production, was drilled to 14,522 feet in barren Ellenburger.

It is 12 miles southeast of Sinclair Oil & Gas No. 1 Alma Poulter. Wolfcamp opener and lone producer from that pay in the northwestern portion of the field and was finaled June 25 for 4.85 million cubic feet of gas per day, through perforations between 6,-221-272 feet.

SP To Buy 3,000 **New Freight Cars**

Southern Pacific has announced it will acquire this year 3,000 new freight cars, plus other railroad and highway rolling equipment, costing \$69-million - a 35 per cent increase over large expenditures last year

D. J. Russell, SP president, declared that the new cars can be loaded and unloaded more quick ly and are capable of carrying heavier loads, helping to hold down rates and, in some cases,

providing rate reductions. More than half of the cars will be wide-door and double-door box cars, many with hydra-cushion underframes and various built-in load divider and load bracing devices to give added protection to shipments.

Other freight cars being received are 500 open hopper cars. 290 covered hopper units, 108 gondola cars, 77 piggy-back flatdars, 40 hydra-cushion flatcars, and 75 multi-level racks used to adapt flatcars for transport of stacked rows of automobiles.

In addition to the freight cars SP will receive 100 mail and express passenger cars, add 64 die :el-electric locomotives, and add 1.081 trucks, tractors, and trailers to its highway subsidiary operations.

A progress review of soil su .veys in Terrell County is being conducted this week by officials of the Soil Conservation Service. To date, soil maps have been made on 458,450 acres of land on ranches of cooperators with the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District. The maps are being inspected for accuracy of mapping and soil classification. Robert E. Fox, soil scientist of Pecos, is in charge of the soils

work in this county. Terrell County is one of the key areas selected, for early pub lication, as a part of the National Cooperative Soil Survey. Work uled for completion in 1965. This county is a pilot area for low intensity surveys in the western

part of the Edwards Plateau. Soil maps or aerial photographs indicate the kind of soil, the slope of the land and the amount of erosion that has occurred. The information is used mainly for planning soil and water conservation on rangelands. It is also useful in highway construction, location of septic tanks and in determining suitability of land for a specific use, such as cultivation or grassland.




