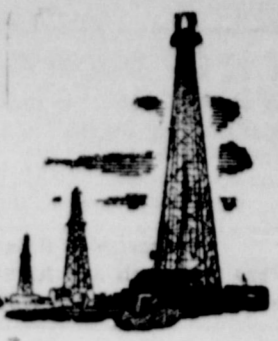

B. M. Gutierrez, Former Resident, Dies in El Paso

Braulio M. Gutierrez Sr., died in El Paso Sunday, June 3, after a long illness. The body was brought to Sanderson and funeral services were at 2:00 p.m. Wednesday from the Sanderson Church of Christ with Joe Fitch, minister of the church, officiating. Funeral plans were under the direction of the Sanderson Funeral Home.

Gutierrez was born in Del Rio March 27, 1888. He came to Sanderson in 1906 and worked for the Southern Pacific Railroad 27 years prior to retirement, and he returned to work for the railroad during the late war. He was a former employee of Charlie Rogers and also served as a deputy under former Sheriff Lee Cook.

He was married to Maria Collins in Sanderson April 22, 1909. Gutierrez is survived by his wife and seven children: Maria, Laurencia, Enrique, Braulio Jr., and Arturo; Mrs. Jose H. Olivares and Mrs. Rodolfo S. Alvarado.

Also surviving are 10 grand children and two great-grandchildren. Pallbearers were his sons-in-law, Jose H. Olivares, and R. S. Alvarado; his grandsons, Armand Gutierrez, and Juan Jose Olivares; his nephew, Natividad Arredondo; his brother-in-law, J. Lar Rodriguez.

Thunder Showers Spot This Area

Thunder showers have hit in widely scattered spots over this area in recent days, leaving some moisture to benefit the ranges.

Some ranchmen have reported an inch of rainfall in some sections of their ranch during the past week, and several have reported only traces of rain.

There have also been reports of damaging hail in some areas. Locally, several times clouds have emitted a trace of rainfall or put forth sufficient moisture to wet the sidewalks, but only once, early Tuesday night, has there been a sufficient amount of rainfall to gauge locally.

About 1.5 inch of rain fell in the shower here Tuesday night.

There has been considerable cloudiness, high humidity, and late afternoon and early evening thunderstorms with an abundance of lightning, but little moisture.

Maj. W. E. Speir Is Promoted To Asst. DPS Head

Austin — The Texas Public Safety Commission and Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today announced the appointment of DPS Regional Commander Wilson E. Speir of Midland to the post of assistant director.

Speir's promotion to second-in-command of the department, will give him the rank of lieutenant colonel, and he will assume his new duties at the state headquarters in Austin. He succeeds former Asst. Director Joe S. Fletcher, who resigned April 20 after 17 years in the post to become secretary-general manager of the Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth.

Lt. Col. Speir was born in Gilmer August 28, 1917, graduated from the Gilmer High School in 1935 as valedictorian of his class. He attended and graduated with honors from East Texas State College at Commerce, receiving a B.S. degree in 1940.

He served as principal of Hamory High School in Upshur county, resigning to enter the Texas Highway Patrol November 1, 1941. He was first stationed at Crockett, taking military leave to enter the U.S. Air Force November 21, 1942. He served as weather observer in the ETO during World War II and was honorably discharged in 1945.

Upon his discharge he was reinstated in the Highway Patrol and stationed at Henderson and remained there until April 1, 1949 when he transferred to Glade-water to open a new station.

Speir was promoted to sergeant in 1951 and stationed at Amarillo where he remained until 1954. He then transferred to Fort Worth, where he served as sergeant until his promotion to captain June 20, 1955. He served as a Patrol Captain in the Pecos District until his promotion to Commander of the Midland District with the rank of major, effective September 1, 1957.

Col. and Mrs. Speir have three children. He is a member of the First Baptist Church in Midland, a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Rotary Club.

Returns Show Only 259 Interested In State Races

Returns of the primary run-off last Saturday show that there were 259 voters interested in the outcome of the governor's race and less interest showed in the other three races on the ballot.

In voting by precincts, Don Yarborough was the favorite in the county, leading precincts 1 and 2 over John Connally, the nominee state-wide. The outcome by precincts was 555-136; 11-16; 6-4; 20-19, with Connally figures showed first.

In the race for lieutenant-governor, Preston Smith led James Turman 92-00; 19-8; 6-5; 15-4 for a total of 132-118 county-wide.

For attorney general, Waggoner Carr held a slight 4-vote lead in this county 126-122, and the vote by precincts was 91-98; 19-9; 5-5; 11-9 over his opponent, Tom Reavley.

W. W. Bean was the leader in Terrell County over Grove C. Poole by 135-115 votes and had the following precinct count: 55-34; 16-13; 8-3; 15-5.

Voting in Terrell County was in all four precincts and there was no contest in any of the district county, or precinct offices.

Equalization Boards To Meet June 20

Boards of equalization for the Terrell County Independent School District and for Terrell County will meet Wednesday, June 20, at the courthouse.

The county board, composed of the County Commissioners, will meet at 9:00 a.m. and the school's board of equalization, John T. Williams, Roy Deaton, and Lee Dudley, will meet at 2:00 p.m. at the court house.

The purpose of the boards is to determine, fix, and equalize the value of any and all taxable property in the county and school district for taxable purposes.

Persons interested or having business with either of the two boards are asked to be present at the designated time and place.

Travel Plans Asked By Highway Patrol To Aid In Emergency

The Texas Highway Patrol is asking that people planning a trip or vacation, please give them information about their trip so that the facilities of the Department of Public Safety and similar units of other states may be used in case of an emergency.

The department is asking that citizens give them all information possible about where they are going, the routes they will take, where planned stops are and on what days, telephone numbers when possible, description of the car, and their license number.

The Department of Public Safety says that they are called upon frequently, particularly in the summer time, to help in locating a traveler to give him an emergency message and that such information will be most helpful to the department. They state that it is not enough to give the information to some neighbor, since emergency messages could originate with someone not acquainted with the neighbor. The Department officials stated that they would use all of their facilities to aid the traveling public in this way if they could get the information from the travelers.

Carl L. Davis, Highway Patrolman stationed in Sanderson, stated that people should either contact him and give him the information or drop the information in a letter addressed to him and he would keep it on file.

Davis stated that publicity of this service in daily newspapers had caused local citizens to cooperate in trips already.

An object hit the yard near the ranch house of Mr. and Mrs. J. Garner late Tuesday afternoon during a severe thunderstorm and heavy overcast.

Garner stated that he was outside and had just started into the house when two loud noises which he at first thought were thunder claps, sounded. One of the noises he thought at the time was the result of lightning hitting the house and when he turned to see if it had, he noticed the metal object which had rolled up against the house.

'Youngest' Mojado Found Near Here

"The youngest mojado we ever saw," was the exclamation of the immigration officers and area ranchmen who saw a boy the immigration officers had picked up Monday on a Terrell County ranch.

The boy first told officers he was 15, but lowered his age to 11 finally and it appeared that he might be adding a couple of years too many.

The boy was picked up just after noon and other ranch employees said he had been there about an hour before the arrival of the officers. The ranch owner had been gone for two days prior to the boy's arrival.

The lad stated that he was from Sragosa, Coahuila, Mexico, and that he had been in the brush three days on the other side of the river and two days on this side before he got to the ranch where he was picked up.

He stated that his mother was dead and he did not know anything about his father, and had been living with an aunt.

He was returned Monday night to Ciudad Acuna and turned over to Mexican officials.

The boy appeared in good shape and spirits after his five-day walk, hatless, through the hot sun and was well clothed except for a small rip in the knee of his blue jeans.

A friend contributed a cap to the lad to protect him from the sun when he came back again.

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Austin — Crooked-hole well drilling is the big news at the Capitol.

More than \$3,000,000 in penalties is asked by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson in the first suit brought by the state following "crooked hole" investigations in the East Texas oil field.

Operators plugged two of them before the Texas Railroad Commission engineers could check to see if the holes were straight or crooked.

Suit asked \$1,000 a day for each day of operation of each well. Over a two-year period, this comes to \$3,442,000.

Commission engineers plan to check more than 1,000 wells.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. brought a civil suit against another group of oil operators. Humble says the operators' crooked wells ended under an Humble lease and have been draining off Humble's oil.

Safety in Age

If you live to be 100, you'll be safe from death by accidents.

State Health Department statistics reveal that not a single Texan over 100 years of age died in an accident in 1960.

Statistics also reveal that there is something to what they say about Texas weather. Deaths from extreme heat and from freezing both were reported during the year.

Biggest killer of all age groups except those under one and over 75, is the highway accident.

In the home, fire and explosion are the biggest killers. Falls are in third place.

Mental Patient Clinic

Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools is expected to act within the next week or two on whether to select a site in the lower Rio Grande Valley or in the Beaumont area for an outpatient clinic for discharged mental patients.

Dr. C. J. Rulman, state director of mental health and hos-

pitals, said the board had already chosen the Fort Worth area for one of the two clinics authorized by the last legislature.

"Second will be established in South Texas," he added. Sites are being considered at Beaumont and Brownsville-Harlingen.

Such clinics now are operating in Houston, San Antonio, and Dallas.

Dove Hunting Season

Texas will have representatives at the national dove conference in Washington on June 27 when the length and dates of the 1962 hunting seasons will be discussed.

H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the State Game and Fish Commission, reports the outlook favorable for a good dove crop in Texas — both mourning and whitewing doves.

Smokers Pay

Cigarette smokers are chipping in more than \$7,000,000 a month to the State Treasury under the 8-cent sales tax on each package.

Treasurer Jesse James reported income from that source to be \$7,700,588 in May.

Screwworm Control

Fight against the screwworm fly has been extended northward. Reason is because truck-hauled livestock, infected with screwworms, crossed the control line which was being maintained by aerial distribution of sterile male flies.

A new distribution point was established at Conroe after outbreaks of screwworms were reported in East Texas.

Program is a bold effort to control this \$40,000,000-a-year pest. It is financed by the federal and state governments and by contributions from livestock owners. Most of the money is federal.

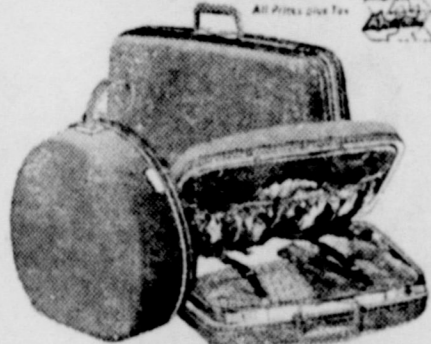

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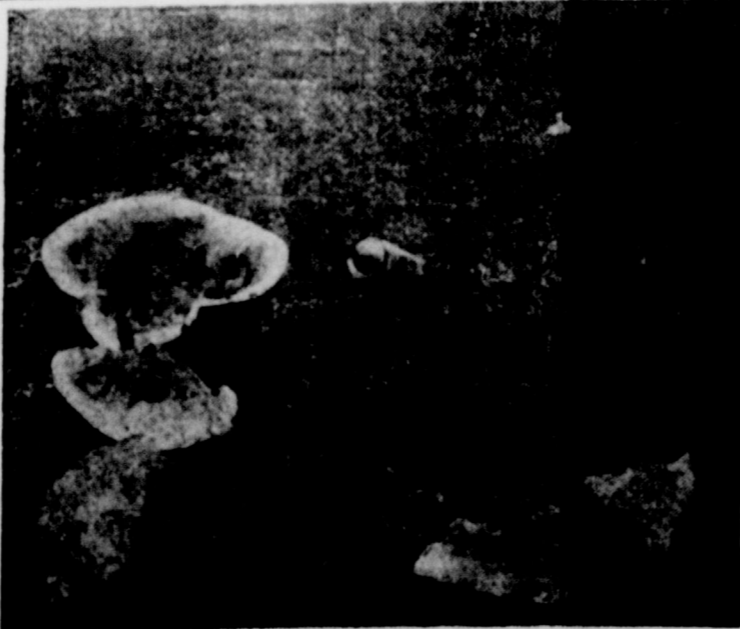

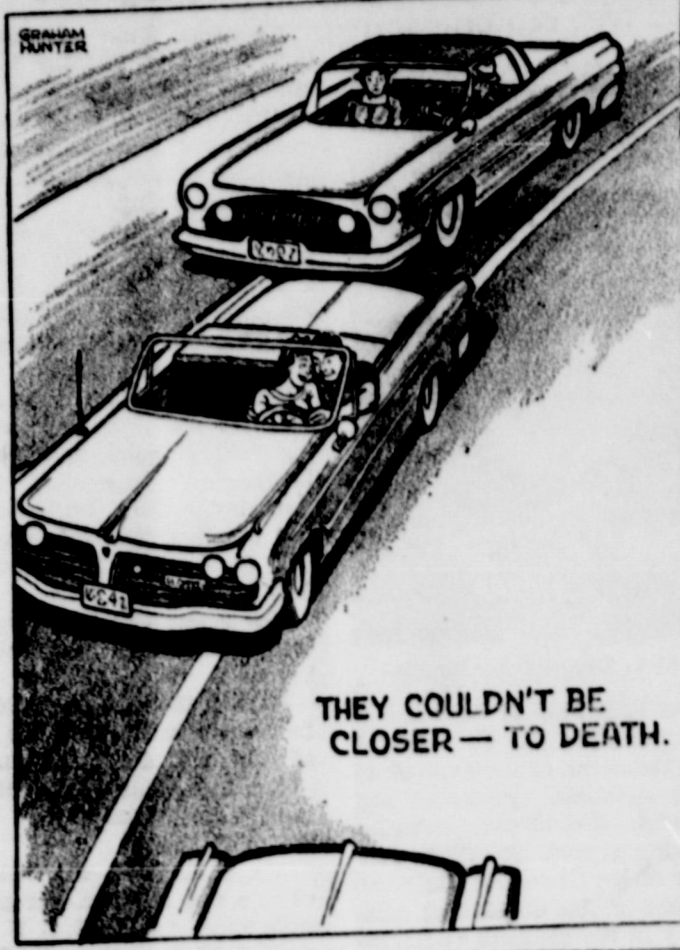
