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## LISTEN TO LUKE

On Wednesday of this week the Terrell County Boards of Equalization met for the purpose of equalizing taxes on school and county lands and properties for the purpose of taxes. We do not envy them their responsibility.

We understand that there have been some reductions in the value of certain holdings of certain taxpayers here, namely the railroad company and mineral lease holders, which could affect the total valuation in the county.

If the total monetary needs of the county or school are as high as or above those for last year, and the total taxable property of the county or school district is lower than it was last year, then something's got to give. Either taxes go up by raising the rate of valuation, or the budget of either or both of the bodies must be cut to fit the income on the present tax rate. It doesn't take an exceptionally brilliant person to figure that one out.

And if the growth of the school plant and facilities, or a big bond issue by the school or county were to depend upon the continued growth of the gas industry in the county, and the gas industry fails to grow to those expectations, then who is going to pay the bill? It's not difficult to figure that one out, either?

Presently, the bulk of the taxes are paid by the gas industry and its associated industry, by the railroad company, by the ranchmen, and by the utility company. A drop in the value of any or all of them increases the burden of taxpaying upon what's left, and if the needs are not cut to fit the income, then the burden of taxes is only increased.

There is no assurance that the railroad company will continue to have its present valuation in this county, since we have already seen a decrease in their facilities, such as section houses, roundhouse, gravel pit operation, etc. There may be other cuts made.

Neither do we know that the gas industry will hold up, increase, or decrease. There are fewer drilling rigs in the county now than last year; fewer exploration crews this summer than ever since interest began; fewer leases now than at their peak.

The ranch land, because of the drought, because of a slowdown in ranch speculative investments by certain people, and because of productivity, has seen some decrease in value, and if the trend in government spending doesn't stop, and a recession or depression results, then ranch land stands to decrease even more in value, along with everything else.

Then the burden of taxes is a little bigger load on what's left to bear the taxes. There are those who say, "Put the tax where the money is and they can't pay it, let them get out." That's a good idea, but if they do get out, then we won't need taxes to support a school and very little to support a county.

We believe that facts will show that the oil and gas industry and related activity account for almost half the total valuation of county and school district properties for taxes. Take that out and what happens? Tax the railroad to death, or the utility company, or the ranchmen, and who will need a school?

If the gas activity were not in Terrell County and the needs of the county and school were not decreased, then all present taxpayers would be paying almost double what they are presently paying. You say that isn't much and you are right if you are only paying about \$4.00 a year for your car, or only about \$30.00 a

## Ranch Worker Charged With Statutory Rape

A Mexican ranch worker, Adolfo Bonilla, was charged with statutory rape Monday of this week and Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath set bond of \$1,000.00 after the defendant had waived the examining trial.

A 13-year old girl was the injured party, according to Sheriff Bill Cooksey.

The alleged crime was reported to have taken place at the Hugh Rose ranch during the absence of Mr. and Mrs. Rose.

Sheriff Cooksey states that he has information that two other females and the victim had spent the day at the ranch and that at about 10:30 Sunday night, the 13-year-old girl telephoned to the ranch and asked the accused to come in and get her, which, according to Cooksey, he did.

County Attorney Jack Hayre advised Gilbreath that the penalty for such a crime is from five years in the penitentiary to the death sentence when asked for information to govern the amount of the bond.

## Rock Trim Adds To Appearance Of Local Buildings

## Standard Hole Is Slated in 38-Y

Standard Oil Co. of Texas will drill a 17,500-foot wildcat in Terrell County 15 miles south of the Brown-Bassett multipay field. It will be the No. 1-2 Bassett Mineral Trust.

Location is on an 8,320-acre lease, and is 2,438 feet from the north and 1,198 feet from the east lines of section 38, Block Y TCRH Survey.

The hole will be 1 3/8 miles west southwest of Great Western Drilling Co., Blue Danube Oil Co. No. 1 Chapman Estate, a 12,584-foot failure abandoned June 15, 1959.

In that effort, at 2,052 elevation, Wolfcamp was picked up at 5,660 feet; and detrital at 10,900 feet.

## Valuations For Taxes Raised Over \$1 Million

The board of equalization for Terrell County, comprised of the County Commissioners, completed their deliberations Wednesday morning and it was noted that the total valuation of the county was increased by just over \$1,000,000.00. With the present 77c tax rate, this means an increase of \$7,000.00 to the county per year from this source.

The increase was the result of the completion of producing gas wells in the county since last year. There was a decrease in the dry leases in the county, by \$72,320.00, but the increase in the number of new producers made up that loss by the \$1-million increase in the total overall value.

The county board of equalization met only with oil and gas company representatives Wednesday morning and it is possible that there will be a further increase or decrease from the present figure when other property owners turn in their renditions.

All of the gas companies with producing property in Terrell County had representatives here for the board of equalization meeting.

The initial proposal of the value of Ellenburger producers was decreased by the county's board by 10 per cent because of the cost of producing and marketing the gas from that strata, it was noted.

Thos. Y. Pickett & Sons are the tax consultants and advisors retained by Terrell County to assist them particularly in the evaluations on oil and gas property in the county.

The Independent School District board of equalization, composed of John T. Williams, Roy Deaton, and Lee Dudley, met Wednesday afternoon with tax representatives of the various companies with holdings in the county to consider valuations of oil and gas industry properties and railroad properties.

The tax representatives asked for a lowering of the index figure which was customarily used by the school district for computing their valuations. This figure, was 150 over the county's valuation (or 150 percent) in 1958, and was lowered to the figure 120 this year. The tax representatives asked that their valuations be reduced to the same figure as that of other property valuations as set by the county and not put an additional increase on the oil and gas properties without putting it on all the taxable property.

The school board of equalization agreed to lowering the figure to 115 on all oil and gas properties in the district and on the railroad property in the district, lowered the dry lease valuations from 75c to 60c, and left all other property at the same valuations as last year. This is a total increase of approximately \$1,000,000.00 for the school over last year's valuations. This means an increase of approximately \$15,000.00 for local maintenance of the school system.

The same thing causing the increase in the county's valuations — new producing wells — is the reason for the increase in the school's valuations.

The tax representatives agreed to the new valuations, but expressed hope that the oil companies' valuations might be lowered next year to the same valuations as the county had placed on them and not use a plus index for the oil companies and leave all other properties at the county's level.

In pointing out the need for additional income for the schools, attention was directed to the fact that the local system had lost two teachers for next year, one because of average daily attendance being lower, and the other for the change in the economic index, and the fact that the needs of the local system had not been diminished simply because of those two changes.

The tax representatives pointed out that the budget of the school had almost doubled in the past four years while the number of scholastics had increased only slightly. The increase of the curriculum, the thinning of the scholastics-per-section, and the increase in overall operational expenses of the schools accounted for the increase, according to the school officials.

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Austin — Texas' crime situation looks a little better.

FBI reports covering the first three months of 1962, based on statistics from the 12 largest cities show major crimes down 6.7 per cent.

Across the U.S. in cities of comparable size, major crime rates rose one per cent.

Texas' crime rate actually is down in number of crimes reported from 1961, despite a population growth during the year of some 200,000.

Out of Jobs  
Finding a job in Texas is a little easier these days.

Texas Employment Commission reports April unemployment at 4.3 per cent of the labor force as compared to 5.4 per cent a year ago.

Average factory wages rose from \$91.21 a week last year to \$96.19 this April. Range was wide, however, depending on the industry.

Leatherwork was the lowest paid, an average of \$32.13 a week. Oil workers got the most, an average of \$32.07 weekly.

Number of Texans working outside agriculture now has passed the 3,000,000 mark. Houston had 19,800 unemployed, Dallas had 16,000.

Too Many Colleges?

Dr. Ralph Green of the Texas Commission on Higher Education thinks the Legislature should quit creating four-year, state-supported colleges.

He told a House Committee on Saving Taxes that 20 state colleges are about enough.

Legislators have extended this state support to four new colleges in the last four years. Biggest of the new ones, the University of Houston, will enter the state system this fall. This will substantially increase the state's higher education bill.

U. of H. now ranks second in size to the University of Texas.

Water Supply  
Texas enters the summer with its major reservoirs 76 per cent full.

Texas Water Commission reports that May rains couldn't keep up with the use and evaporation, so the water supplies shrank by 291,500 acre feet.

As June opened, supplies were 76 per cent of capacity, compared with 81 per cent a year ago.

**Livestock Rules Amended**

The Texas Animal Health Commission, after hearing pleas of livestock market operators, relaxed rules designed to speed up the eradication or at least control of brucellosis (undulant fever).

Commission action amending the rules came just before they were to go into effect June 15.

Before the change, the rules would have required testing for brucellosis before cattle could be moved from one market to another.

As amended, the rule says the cattle may move from one approved market to another approved market without having to take the test. This was put on a trial basis.

Restriction of movement was opposed by representatives of the big stockyards at San Antonio, Fort Worth, and Houston. Auction markets also had an ardent champion present.

James D. Sartwell, president of Houston's Port City Stockyards, said the economic effect of the proposed rule could be "dangerous", particularly so in view of the "predicted downturn in cattle prices now beginning".

Sartwell said Texas' cattle inventory includes many so-called "two-way" cattle, entirely dependent on market conditions, which are sold as either stocker or slaughter animals.

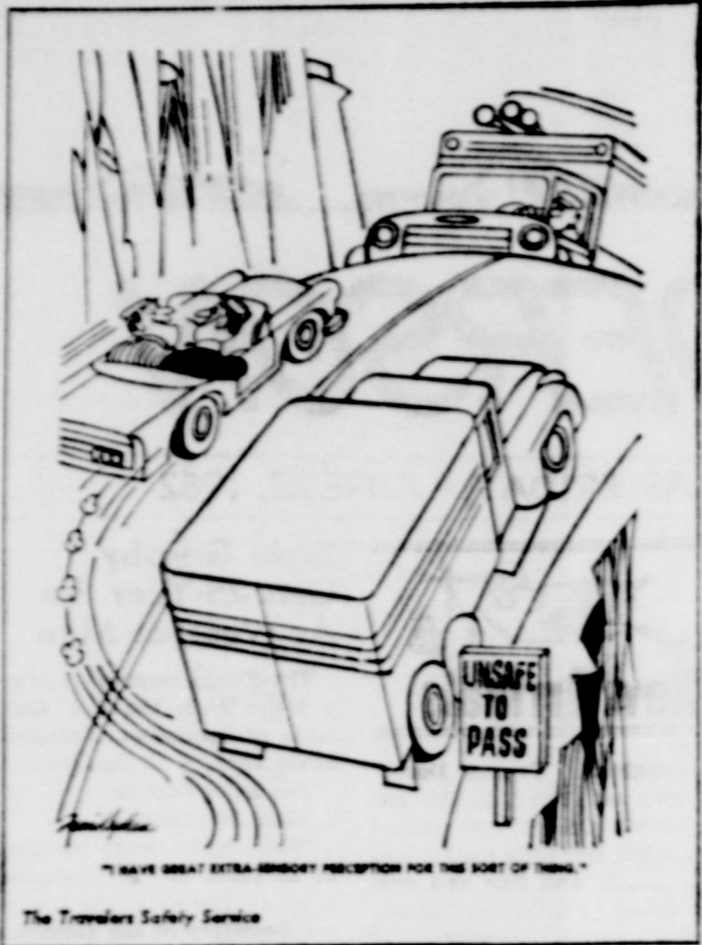
Most of these two-way cattle, he said, also are "trader" cattle, and loom large as a volume moving from interior markets, purchased by a trader and consigned to the terminals for resale. He saw danger to this cattle movement in the proposed regulation.

G. C. Hagelstein of San Antonio's Union Stockyards felt livestock leaving any market should meet the requirements of its destination. But he said he was interested in protecting the industry and didn't believe the regulation did that.

John M. Lewis, general manager of the Fort Worth Stockyards, thought the Commission proposal would "strangle" the price-making terminal markets.

Charles Davis, operator of the auction markets at Wichita Falls and Mineral Wells, suggested that animals should be tested when going "to the country" but

not from market to market. He called the rule unnecessary and a waste of time and money.

Norman Moser, commission member from DeKalb, said he didn't want to impose anything on the industry that would be harmful.

Dr. R. G. Garrett, the Commission's executive director, didn't oppose the amendment but believed it would delay the testing program.

Gov. Price Daniel urged Texas drivers to help hold down the traffic death list during the July 4th holidays.

"Slow down and live" is the theme of the traffic safety campaign by which Texas traffic people hope to hold down the death rate below the statisticians' predictions.

July 4th comes on Wednesday this year, so fewer Texans will kill themselves on the highway than when the holiday falls near a weekend.

Tedious job of checking suspected oil wells in East Texas continues.

Railroad Commission and Attorney General's Department spokesmen say it will take several months to finish the job.

Four more oil operators were enjoined from interfering with Commission checks of their wells. In two weeks, only 23 wells have been checked out of "several hundred" that Atty. Gen. Will Wilson thinks will have to be investigated before they can write an end to the East Texas investigation.

Wilson has obtained donations from major oil companies to finance the surveys to see if holes were diverted so as to reach oil under someone else's lease. So he has taken over direction of the surveying from the Railroad Commission.

**Firing Resumes**

There was only a brief respite from campaigning after Democratic primaries.

John Connally, the Democratic nominee for governor, and Jack Cox, the Republican nominee, both had their chance to talk at meetings of their respective state executive committee Saturday, convening to canvass the returns.

Campaigns will start in earnest September 18th, when both parties have their state conventions.

But the two young gubernatorial candidates both have state campaign headquarters in operation in Austin. They sound like they plan an all-out campaign in the summer and fall.

Sen. John Tower will be a major campaigner for the Republicans. Vice-President Lyndon B. Johnson and Sen. Ralph Yarbor

ough will take to the stump for the Democrats.

They are beginning to make this look like a two-party state. Whether the label sticks depends on what the voters say on November 6th.

**Safe Driving Plan**

The State Board of Insurance will hold a hearing June 29th on automobile insurance rates a rules.

High on the agenda will be proposals to revise drastically the "safe driving insurance plan" by which those with accidents or traffic law violations pay more while those without them pay less.

Statisticians say the plan has cut rates for 78 per cent, raised them for 22 per cent. But the complaints about the plan being

received by legislators indicates that even those who save aren't too happy with the possibility that one slip might run up their rates.

Drastic revision is possible. Without revision of the plan, a rate cut is in the cards. But if penalty provisions are reduced

it may wipe out the chance of a rate cut.

Board members and the insurance industry are divided as to what to do. Largest of the insurance agents' associations is taking a poll of its members to see what they — and their customers — think about it.

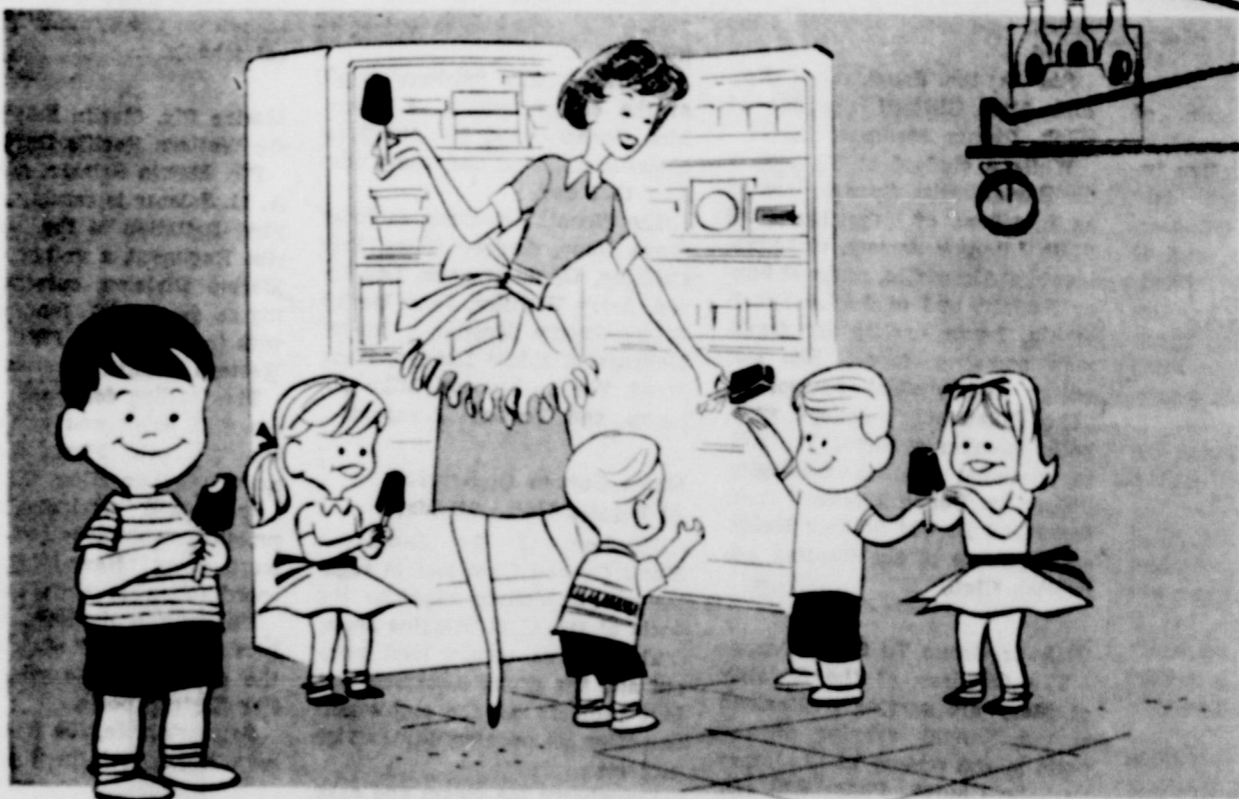
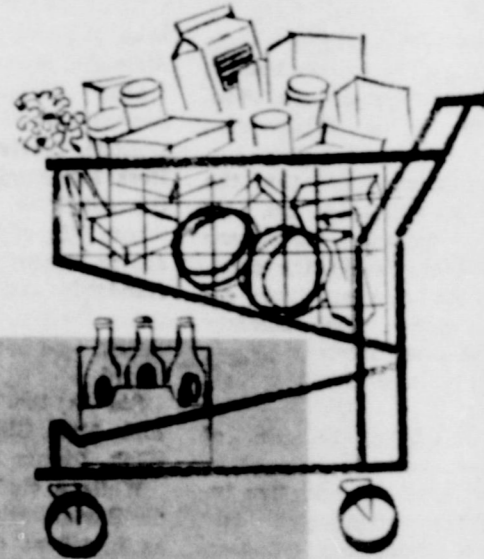

year for your house. But what if you were paying several thousand dollars, as some presently are?

Yes, we feel that there is a grave responsibility on the board of equalization and on the county commissioners and the school board in trying to figure out a way to get along with what we have, try to expand with the needs and stay within the means of probabilities.

We have all sympathy for those with the responsibility and hope that they can keep things in balance.

There are those who have little or no taxes to pay who are interested in first-class spending and all sorts of projects.

We don't want to be misunderstood as being against any or all progress in our schools and county. We are not opposed to progress by any means. Our definition of progress maybe just differs with other definitions.

We hear few people advocating the expansion of facilities for teaching more courses in the high school, or giving possibly broader classroom work in some fields in the lower grades, such as public school music, or teachers to work specifically with retarded or advanced pupils, or increased lab facilities, or such related needs or wishes.

If the county is willing to furnish land for the school to use at no cost to the school, with no strings tied in any way, then we can see nothing wrong with an arrangement like that. It looks like a good deal for both parties in our way of thinking. The county has improvements on the land which might otherwise be a constant worry to keep neat and tidy, the school can use it for almost anything they want, and we do not have to pay for a new or different facility.

**Park Traffic and Facilities Boosted**

Travel into the Big Bend National Park is increasing, the concessionaire is adding some \$290,000 worth of motel and dining facilities, hiking trails are being extended, and roads are being added.

Thus did Coleman C. Newman, assistant superintendent of the park, describe the tourist appeal of the national playgrounds beside the Rio Grande.

A total of 7,619 visitors in May was a 13 per cent increase in patrons over April; and the 90,655 last year should be up to 150,000 this year if the 14.6 per cent gain for the first five months this year is maintained, Newman said.

A paved road from Castalon to St. Elena Canyon is in the works for this year, but visitors will still have to travel over 13 miles of dirt road to get to the improvement. The 13 miles ultimately will be paved.

The new administration building, a quarter million dollar facility, is practically complete, he said. There are 150 miles of hiking trails in the park, good winter camping is appealing to more and more persons, and there are 186 areas of interest in the limits of the playground.

No hunting is permitted in the park area, but a petition is in Washington at this time to open the canyon and river areas to fishermen, thus adding much to the appeal of the park, he said.

Mountain lions in the park number 10 to 12, there may be as many as 4,000 deer, and javelinas and quail are plentiful. Wildlife adds much to public interest, particularly if the animals are tame enough to submit to photographers.
