# ISTEN TO LUKE

The meeting here last week of two men with local citizens inerested in flood control projects in the Sanderson Canyon and 3-Mile watersheds was interesting. in more ways than one. It was ineresting to find out that there were local citizens interested in what seems like a worthwhile roject, and that there were state and federal agency representatives who were also interested. People sometimes laugh when lood control is mentioned in Sanderson. People in Ozona used to laugh at the thought, too. And other people in other places laughed until they found themselves swimming out of their living rooms.

There has been a lot of damge in the past by soil erosion to the ranches of the watersheds. There has been a lot of damage to the railroad property and to the highway on those watersheds. There has been a lot of damage to private property and to business property in Sanderson n the past due to high water. And there stands a chance to be even more damage in Sanderson in the future from high water ince there has been some buildng in areas which were at one ime under water at flood stage The fact that there is a great probability that the local water wells, or at least some of them could benefit greatly by such a project does not make it any less ateresting. And re-charging the wells, possibly in or adjajcent to the canyon, would not do any harm, in our opinion.

# **Encouragement** Given Area For Possible Control Dams

Some encouragement was given in the consideration of the possibility of flood control dams on the watersheds of Sanderson Canyon and Three-Mile Draw.

The encouragement was given by members of the State Water Commission and the State Soil Conservation Service representatives

Don Allison, SCS representative of Pecos, met Friday afternoon with Bill Hance, local SCS specialist, Joe N. Brown, local SCD directors' chairman, and J. A. Gilbreath, secretary-manager of the Terell County Chamber of Commerce. Allison went over the procedure for making application for flood control facilities within the state, explained the procedure, the circumstances considered, etc., and showed films of similar work near El Paso and in Oklahoma.

It was explained that such a program, if feasible and plausible, would be done by the State Soil Consevration Service at no direct expense to local citizens. It was explained, however, that the expense of maintaining the dams and the main channel of the watershed was to be borne by some subordinate government with the power to tax, to assure the continued benefits of the projects.

Public Law 566, passed by the U. S. Congress in1953 and amended in 1954, provides for the construction of such facilities for flood control and their maintenance, etc. An amount of \$300.00 per structure and \$37.00 per mile of main channel of the water shed per year must be available by the responsible organization

Mr. Allison stated that on no project in this part of the country was the maintenance close to the required amount, and that very litle if any was ever necessary for channel maintenance Such a project, if approved would also serve as a soil conservation project in preventing erosion in the main tributaries of the main channel of the watershed. They would also serve as a re-charging effect to water wells in and near the main channel or below the dams. It was also pointed out that

dams, if built, would hold no more than 200 acre-feet of water. would not interfere with existing facilities, such as highways, railroads, etc., and seldom would be put on the main channel, since it was usually more feasible to stop water on feeding tributaries.

The design of the dams was such as to make possible the immediate distribution of flood waters into underground reservoirs, rather than running off to eventually wind up in the Rio Grande. This redistribution of water underground is to occur by letting off flood waters slowly so that the water can seep back into the ground as soon as possible.

On Saturday, Mr. Luscomb of the Texas Water Commission met with the local group, which included the aforementioned men and Edward Ker,r representing the board of directors of the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1. to go over the two watersheds

the ranches where the dams were cated, as far as we know. There is even a remote possibility that evaporation from such projects would help us rain-wise o! - Remote, but possible! The size of the reservoirs -200 acre-feet, offers little hope for a water sports area for the ratersheds except for dove inting, and possibly tad-poling But there are great possibilities in WATER SAVED, in propty saved, in maybe even lives saved.

Let's all give it some serious thought, and if the local Soil Conservation District decides to try to sponsor the projects, then we will all have our minds made up about how we feel about such proposal.

We have little property involved, too old and blind to do much dove hunting, to slow for tad-poling, but we have friends who like to have some assurance of a sufficient amount of water to bathe in in 1965, and some other friends who own property who would not like to see it going down the canyon on a big wave, and some other friends who are interested in the overall benefits of the pro-

Frankly, it's difficult for us to see any draw backs to such a move, but we will be open-minded and listen to any.

Several people besides Jimmy Caroline, manager of the local water works, have been interested in what the water level is on the local storage tank every morning. There are other people who don't seem to care.

Water is a precious commodity for living - particularly when there is a possibility that the supply might be running low.

Recent trouble with pumps, nothing that isn't expected, but something that is always hoped will not happen - has caused the supply of the storage to dip pretty low and there was a possibility that there might be some surtailment in the use of it for watering home lawns.

There was some curtailment in the watering of the football field which has caused some damage -Continued to Page 4

and see the possibilities of the flood control project and the need for such a plan. Mr. Luscomb was also taken over town to see the high-water marks of previous floods, such as the one of 1935 and 1942, and he saw the building that had taken place since then, so that some idea of future potential flood damage might be realized.

There was a preliminary, unofficial, and sight-estimated need of at least 12 dams on the watershed, two of which were indicat ed on Three-Mile Draw, and the other three on Sanderson Canvon, only one of which was indicated in Terrell County, with the possibility of three in Pecos County and three in Brewster County.

Mr. Luscomb pointed out that the feasibility and possibility of such a flood control project on the two watersheds, or either of them, would depend entirely on a history of past dollars and cents flood damage, both to local property, fences, stock, and soil erosion, as compared with the cost of erecting sufficient flood preventive measures.

The Soil Conservation District supervisors will receive all the necessary information concernthe site survey last weekend, the plans, procedure, and all other vital information available and will proceed with the project to whatever extent and with whatever energy is determined by the interest of the people concerned.
