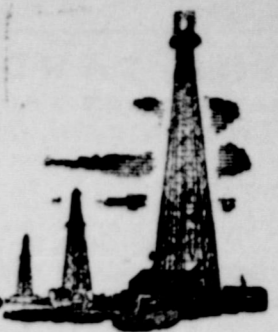

## LISTEN TO LUKE

Maybe you didn't notice: The story in last week's daily papers about the elaborate and extravagant building that is being constructed in Washington, D.C. as an office building for members of Congress. The building is scheduled to have three gymnasiums, we believe, and at the last report three swimming pools. The best we could figure out, one of the pools was for men and the other for women Congressmen, and the other for employees of the Congressmen and Congresswomen. Fraternization must not be allowed between the male and female members, nor between the members and employees, but it is alright among the employees.

The cost of the building is set now at only \$70-million. We will wager it exceeds that before it is complete.

This is real economy in government, isn't it?

Some would say those people are entitled to that, they are the leaders of our nation! But let's not give it to them with taxpayer's money! Remember reading about the glory that was Rome! Remember the stories about the luxury in which the high-archy lived?

We think that such an expenditure is disgraceful to the nation and makes living liars of all who support economy in government and the building of the new building.

Have you wondered:

Who is paying for the the summer vacation of the first family females in Italy? We have!

And who is paying for the good-will trip to foreign lands by LBJ? We think we know!

And about how the administration has so effectively muzzled LBJ recently and relegated him to the roll of publicity man for the United States, rather than a national deputy leader!

And surely you have wondered what happened to our intelligence department, or to the liaison man, or why the President didn't know about the build-up of Russian arms and men in Cuba? Only about three days after his news conference when he stated that there was no such thing, appeared the story that there was such a thing!

And does anyone else wonder how long Russia is going to be allowed to bring men and material into Cuba before something is done about it? Or is there any question about why such things are being done?

Maybe we spend too much time wondering about those kinds of things. We can't help it, though, and wonder if we are by ourselves in pondering over these misgivings?

The tragedy of this age, it would seem to me, is the complete lack of active participation on the part of the people of this nation in campaigns to prevent the usurping of our freedom by the leaders of our government.

It has happened in both Democratic and Republican administrations. There seems to be no stopping it.

The elected officials on a national scale are no longer servants of the people — rather the nation has become a servant of theirs. They move millions of dollars and control millions of lives as much or more so than we control our own movements.

Because of political expediency they can bring economic success or ruin to an area; can dole out or deny privileges to communities, direct the destinies of families of the nation, all in the raising of a hand in voting, or in the voicing of a whispered bit of influence to a puppet, a pawn, or an agency or committee.

Our concern is not for myself. Time will erase my concern long

The Sanderson Eagles will open the current grid season in Marfa Friday night of this week against the Marfa Shorthorns. It is a non-conference game.

The Eagle coaching staff has been working since the first day of practice in trying to get the boys ready for their opening game, and they stated that even though the boys were eager and full of spirit, they were a "green" team that would ripen only in competition. They stated they were proud of the advancement made by the boys, and felt that experience would help to make

them a much better balanced unit. They have the size, and the zeal, the coaches state, to go with a winning combination.

The Eagles went to Fort Stockton Monday morning to scrimmage with the Panthers' first string and took a sound drubbing, Coach Paul Hatem stated.

## Body Found On Barrett Ranch Last Thursday

A completely decomposed body of a man of undetermined age and color was found on the Fred Barrett ranch northeast of Dryden last Thursday afternoon.

The body was found by employees of Barrett as they were riding in the pasture.

Local officers were notified and Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, H. P. Boyd, special agent for the T&N Railroad, and Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath went to the scene.

The body was found north of the railroad tracks in Barrett's pasture, about six or seven miles east of Dryden. It was about 30 feet north of the bluff of the canyon through which the railroad runs, and about 250 yards north of the railroad.

The body was clothed in good work shoes, army-fatigue-type pants, a light-colored shirt, and heavy woolen socks. There was no identification on the body or clothing, and due to the condition of the body it was impossible for the investigators to determine many pertinent facts.

There were no visible or recognizable signs of violence or foul play.

The body was brought to Sanderson by the Sanderson Funeral Home.

Sheriff Cooksey and Texas Ranger F. G. Hardin returned to the scene Friday to look for possible clues that might aid in the identification of the person or might give an idea of the reason for his death, but nothing could be found.

The body was taken to Austin Monday by Hardin for possible revelation of facts by examination of the remains and clothing by experts.

Peace Justice Gilbreath withheld a verdict on the cause of death pending outcome of the investigation by the Department of Public Safety lab men.

## New MVI Stickers Are Available

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced this week a new-type motor vehicle inspection sticker is now available for the new inspection year beginning September 1.

"The only thing new about the inspection this year is the sticker itself," he said. "This new sticker is a dry mount decal we believe will adhere regardless of weather conditions and one that has been very successful in other states."

More than five million vehicles registered in the state are required by law to be inspected at one of the 5,000 official inspection stations between this date and April 16, 1963. Owners of vehicles not displaying the current inspection sticker after that date will be in violation of the law.

Garrison urged motorists to get their vehicles inspected as early as possible, and pointed out:

"With hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked in preparation for the winter months."

The Department director stated that the Vehicle Inspection Program in Texas has proved itself to be a valuable tool in reducing accidents on Texas highways and streets.

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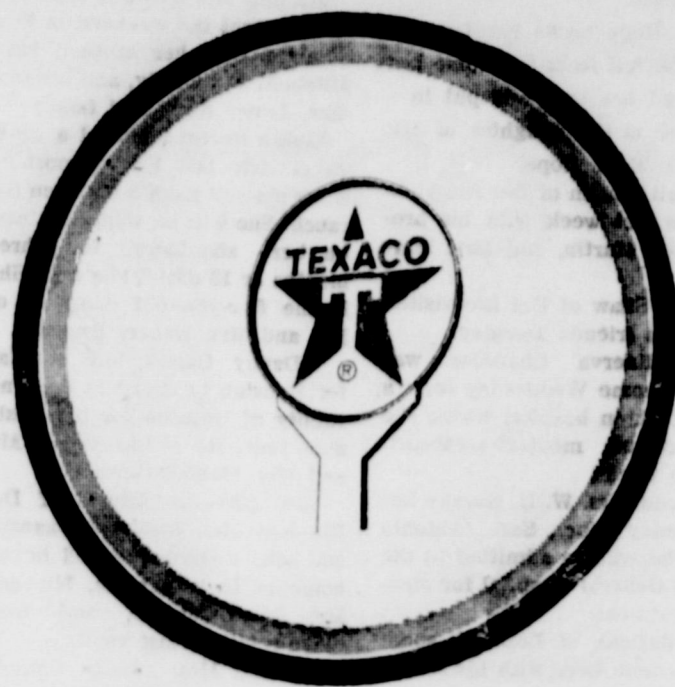
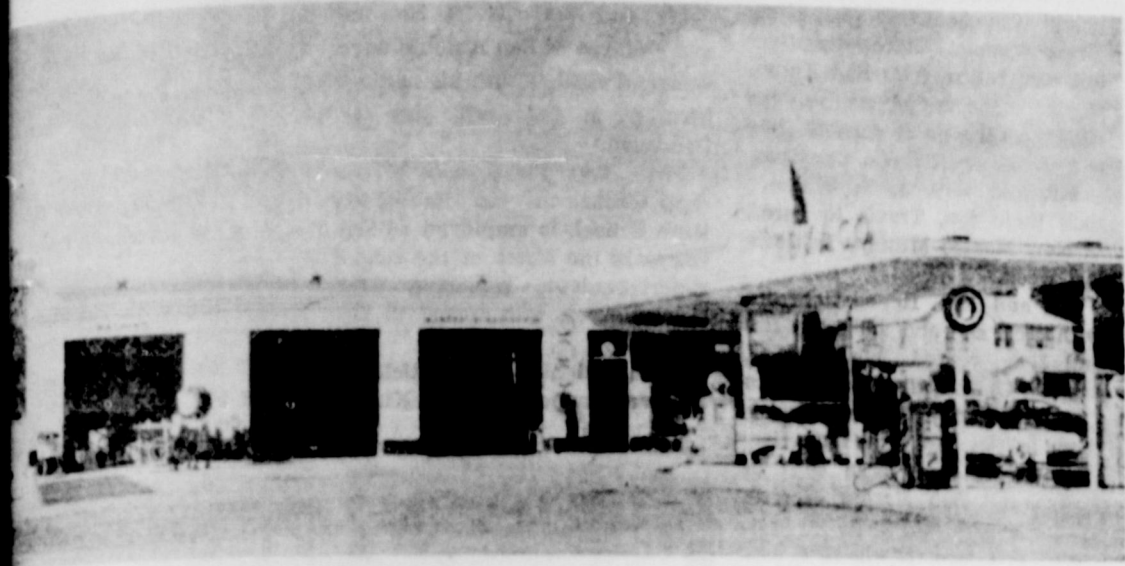

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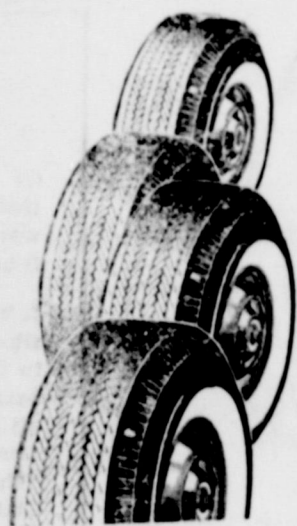

**DENIALS OF THE SCRIPTURES**

Last week this paper carried an article entitled DENIALS OF SOUL COMPETENCY. Truth mixed with error - like a little poison in a nourishing meal - is a dangerous thing. It was with such a concoction the devil deceived Eve. Get your Bible and last week's paper and let us do a little comparing.

1. Where in the scriptures do you find a LAITY and CLERGY situation? Such division of Christians into classes was unknown to the church in the first century. All Christians are brethren because they are the children of God (Gal. 3:26,27). They are all priests because Christians compose a royal priesthood with Christ as the great high priest (1 Pet. 2:5, 9). The clergy is the "The body of men set apart, by due ordination, to the service of God, in the Christian church, in distinction to the laity" (Webster). But are not all Christians set apart to the service of God?

All Christians compose the clergy of God, and there is no laity.

2. Baptism does require the assistance of a man. Faith demands the same assistance. The unaided needed a man's help in order to believe and obey the will of God (Acts 8:26-29). "For who soever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not heard? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? how shall they hear without a preacher?" "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." (Rom. 10:13,14,17). A person must confess Christ, but confession depends upon faith in him, and faith depends upon hearing the word of truth, and that teaching depends upon a teacher. Find your teacher in a living man voicing the truth OR in the inspired men who first penned it, but any sinner is still dependent upon a man. He is no more dependent in baptism than in faith.

The real question is, "Is baptism a command of God to the penitent believer in order to the forgiveness of sins?" There can be no real doubt that it is. Christ commanded it. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved . . ." (Mark 16:16). "For ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost" (Mat. 28:19). Peter commanded those who believed his sermon on Pentecost "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38). Since baptism - the faith and repentance - is a command of God pointing to the forgiveness of sins, CAN A PERSON BE SAVED WITHOUT OBEYING THAT COMMAND OF GOD TO HIM? Who will affirm it?

3. What is the church? The word church means the separated called out. The church is made up of those who have been called out of the world and separated from sin. A man can be in only one of two places, the church or the world. The church does not offer salvation - does not save, but it is composed of the saved. If a man is saved, God has placed him in the church (Acts 2:47). Who will affirm that a person is saved out of and apart from the church that Christ purchased with His blood?

Space does not permit full discussion in articles such as this. Both teachings considered can not be the truth, and the soul is too precious to risk losing. A full and public discussion would be the best way to investigate, test, and arrive at the truth. I await my friend's suggestions as to time and place for such a discussion.
