### More 'Yield' Signs Being Installed

More "Yield Right of Way" signs are being installed by county employees at more intersections in Sanderson and drivers are asked to familiarize themselves with the location of the signs.

The Times was asked to publish the law concerning the "Yield Right of Way" signs and it is as follows:

"Art. 827e-1 Traffic signs at highway and street intersections Vehicle Entering Intersection of Roadway Controlled By Yield Right-of-Way Sign.

Sec. 2 (a) The driver of a ve hicle or the motorman of a streetcar approaching a yield right-of-way sign shall in obedience to such sign slow down to a speed reasonable for the existing conditions, or shall stop if necessary, and shall yield the right-ofway to any pedestrian legally crossing the roadway on which he is driving and to any vehicle in the intersection or approaching on another highway so closely as to constitute an immediate haz-

(b) Said driver after so yielding shall not proceed into the inter section or highway guarded by the yield right-of-way signs until the way is clear on the guardea intersection or highway and until said yielding driver may safely enter without interference or collision with traffic moving on the guarded intersection or high-

(c) A driver involved in a collision or interference with other traffic after passing through a vield right-of-way sign is presumed not to have yielded the right-of-way as required by this


