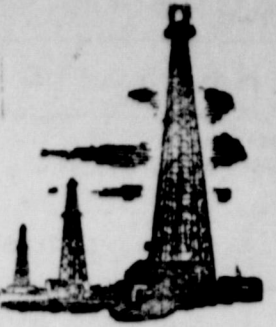

## LISTEN TO LUKE

Well, all of the resolutions for the new year have been made, and we are reasonably certain, that some of them have already been broken.

Come next Tuesday there is going to be an election of two directors for the local water district's board. We strongly urge everyone in town who is a qualified voter to be sure and vote.

It has been shown in Terrell County — and we are not voicing an opinion against it or for it — that a write-in vote can elect people who are not on the ballot. It is a valid and bona fide act on the part of people to vote for the candidate of their choice, whether or not he is on the ballot, so we have to go along with that action as being "right". We also have to say that it is very effective!

We are saying that to say this — BE SURE AND VOTE!

If you like the two incumbents and trust their actions as board members and want them to continue in that position as much as most anyone that could be mentioned, then vote for them. If there is a write-in effort by anyone, then your failure to vote for one of the incumbents is a vote for someone else!

As we stated before, we think the incumbents are honest and honorable men and know of no one offhand who would do better in the job or work more conscientiously for the good of the district.

The two incumbents — Edward Kerr and Don Anderson, while competitors in business, are working together with the other directors for the benefit of the entire district.

We know of nothing more we could ask of the board members. There has been some feeling by some people here that some magic wand could be waived and economic and business trend will be vitalized or increased to a great degree. We wish this were so!

People are not going to move to Sanderson or to any other place if they can get out of it — unless they can benefit themselves by the move. This is selfishness in some way — but we, being people, can't help being selfish about some things.

A large number of mansions available for \$50 a month would not enhance an influx of people, nor would a double-sized water potential, anymore than a double electrical potential output.

Now, if someone can think of a way to get several large houses built in Sanderson, that might bring in some workmen for a few months.

And we would be for that! The same reasoning is true in reverse. There are many people who moved to Sanderson and have lived or are living in dwellings not up to their liking, but they stay here because here is where their vocation or business is. The shortage of excellent rent units and shortage of an abundance of water has not caused many, if any people to leave here.

Yes, one will mention drilling crews that have moved to Ozona or Sheffield or Langtry or Fort Stockton because they couldn't find housing here. That has been true to some small degree in a few isolated instances, but there was always traveling distances and other factors that decided the people to move to other cities, and not the lack of housing here alone. And never did we hear "water" brought into it.

I can curse the weather all day and blame rheumatic aches on the humidity or barometric pressure, but the cause of the aches is the rheumatism which is the result of old age or other biological or chemical imbalances, rather than the weather.

## Second Dose Of Sabin Vaccine Due This Week End

Everyone in Terrell County is urged to take the second dose of the Sabin oral polio vaccine to be available Friday and Sunday.

The procedure for making the vaccine available will follow the general plan used for the giving Type I of the first of the series 6 weeks ago. The American Legion is sponsoring the project.

Friday afternoon from 1:15 to 5:00 p.m. the vaccine will be given at the high school building. Since the vaccine will be given the pupils at the Lamar Ward and elementary schools, pupils in the junior high school and high school and all adults will come to the high school for the second dose of the vaccine. Sunday afternoon the vaccine will be given at the high school from noon to 5:00 p.m. Everyone is requested to bring their registration card given at the time of the previous dose.

Anyone who missed the first dose may go ahead and take the second dose and make up the one missed at a later date. However, it is urged that everyone who took the first dose take advantage of the second dose which will also be given on a cube of sugar. Everyone over six months of age may take the vaccine and it is being requested that everyone who can make a contribution of 25c for each dose.

## Gas Strike Confirmed In G. K. Mitchell Well

Socony - Mobil Oil Co. Inc., Midland, No. 1 George K. Mitchell, in section 11, Block 1 of the CCSD&RGNG Survey in Terrell County has been confirmed as a potential gas producer after tests last week.

The well flowed gas at the estimated daily rate of 5 to 7 million cubic feet, decreasing after nine hours to 1.3 million cubic feet.

The well is on the Keith Mitchell ranch and is 12 miles west-northwest of the Brown-Bassett multipay field.

The project was last reported bottomed at 10,102 feet on a 16-200-foot Ellenburger contract. It encountered gas earlier while drilling between 8,895-992 feet.

The formation producing the gas was not publicly identified.

## Officers Qualify For County Posts

Tuesday at 10:00 a.m. was the time and date set for the qualification and swearing in of various officers in the county that had been elected.

The group who took the oath of office and qualified otherwise includes: County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, County Clerk Ruel Adams, County Treasurer Mrs. Ethel Harrell, Roy Deaton and Charlie Turk, Commissioners of Precincts 2 and 4 respectively; Mrs. Jimmy Merritt and N. M. Mitchell Jr., Justices of Peace of Precincts 2 and 3 respectively. Their tenure of office began immediately upon qualification.

## New Postal Rates Effective Jan. 7

If what this country needs is a good nickle rate for first class letters, it'll have that beginning January 7, a rate schedule table giving new postal rates shows.

The new rate table lists 43 increases in rates and two decreases. The decreases are under the third class mail non-profit classification. Non-profit circulars will go from 16 cents a pound to nine cents, and non-profit books, catalogues, etc., will go from 10 cents per pound to six cents per pound.

The post office will not accept pieces of mail odd sizes, such as animal cards, triangle, or circular shapes, after January 1. A minimum size of three inches by four and one-fourth inches will be in effect on January 1 also.

First class charges will be five cents a letter, as aforementioned and four cents for cards and drop letters. Airmail letters will be eight cents per ounce, an increase from seven cents. Air cards will increase from five cents to six cents.

Second class rates will increase for newspapers under that classification, as is The Sanderson Times, to zones to the tune of four cents except for zones seven and nine. No change is scheduled for those zones.

Third class rate increases include a two-cent per pound on circulars or an increase of an eighth-cent per piece, in one of the categories affecting a lot of businesses.

Fourth class rates (educational and library materials) will be affected in one bracket. The first pounds of educational materials will be charged nine and one-half cents a pound with additional pounds to remain at five cents each. Library materials will continue to go at four cents a pound and one cent for each additional pound.

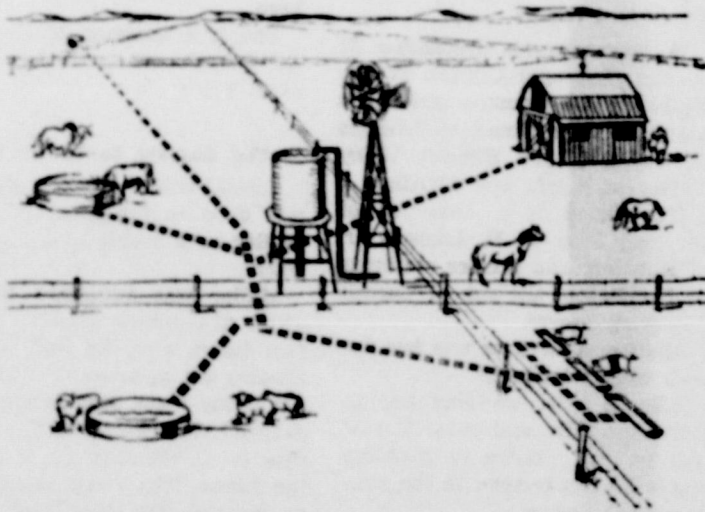

# March of Dimes Helps Save Boy



Here's Johnny at age one after first operation . . . and today, leading a normal life at age four.

At his fourth birthday party, Johnny Wilson's big blue eyes sparkled as his mother carried in the most magnificent cake he had ever seen.

It was shaped like a huge boat plowing its way through mountainous waves of whipped cream and icing. Johnny's winsome smile beamed at friends and he gave out kisses all around.

It was a happy affair. Yet at one time, Johnny's parents had little hope he would live to celebrate even his first birthday. For he was born with the often fatal birth defect of water on the brain, or hydrocephalus.

Surgical treatment saved Johnny's life when he was three months old. At that time, doctors performed what is known as a shunt operation. They inserted in Johnny's head a plastic tube which allowed excess fluid from the brain to be harmlessly absorbed by the youngster's body.

Without the operation, fluid within the brain is prevented from taking its normal course,

and causes the head to swell enormously. This is what had happened to Johnny. (If shunt surgery is not performed in time, mental retardation and blindness may ensue, even death, in certain cases.)

Since 1935, doctors have performed two other shunt operations and have treated Johnny for gastroenteritis and septemia.

Today, Johnny leads a relatively healthy, happy and care-free life. Like any other little boy who lives on a farm, he loves to hug lambs, chase cows and tease chicks on the family's 100 acres near Columbus, Ohio.

He is a good example of thousands of afflicted children being helped to live nearly normal lives through a unique medical care program financed by The National Foundation-March of Dimes.

Babies with birth defects are born every other minute in the United States, 250,000 of them each year, almost 700 each day.

Johnny goes regularly to a Special Birth Defects Clinical Study Center at Children's Hospital, Columbus, supported by March of Dimes funds.

It is one of more than 30 similar centers across the nation

set up for the study and treatment of birth defects.

At the center, trained specialists work together to help children with many kinds of birth defects. They include a neurosurgeon, orthopedic surgeon, internist, psychiatrist, physical therapist and medical social worker. They have put their skilled hands and minds to work on Johnny's behalf.

Every four months, Johnny's mother drives him to the center for his check-up. A doctor always measures his head to make sure there is no change in size. Since 1959, his head size has remained relatively constant.

Johnny is growing up to be an impish, energetic and friendly little boy who likes to do everything and go everywhere. Especially, he likes to wheedle rides on a pony at the next farm.

He'll settle, though, for a tour on the tractor with his mother or father, Julia and John Wilson.

Like Johnny, other afflicted children who receive proper treatment may live to enjoy shooting cap pistols, watching television, singing songs or playing a toy banjo—with the best of four-year-olds.

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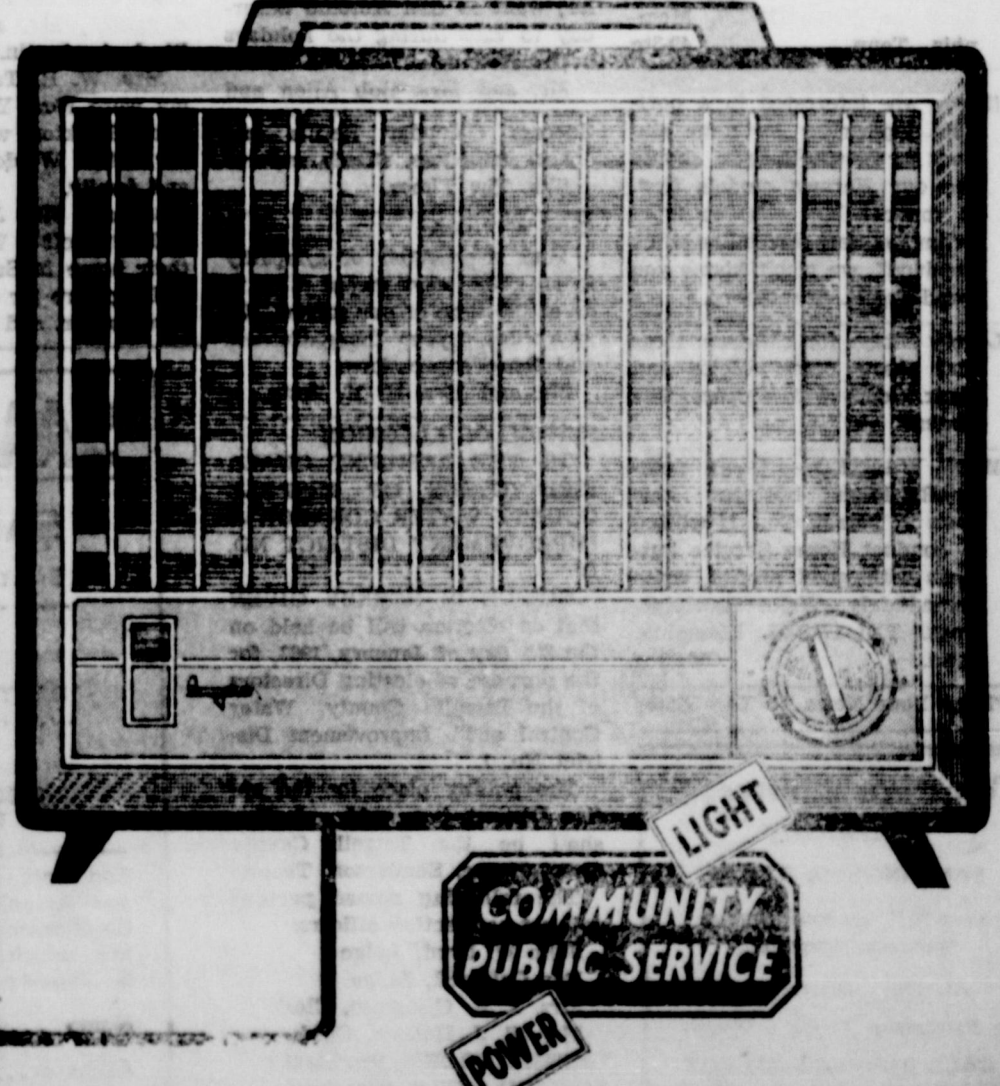
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**Teen-Agers Add Lively Lift To New March of Dimes Drive**

Slave auctions in this Civil War Centennial Year? It can—and does—happen here, with the flower of American youth on the block.

But in this century, there's a difference. Now it's all in a good cause. Members of the New March of Dimes Teen Age Program (TAP) auction their services to the highest bidder among local merchants. The money goes to support The National Foundation's March of Dimes attack on birth defects, arthritis and polio.

It's all part of TAP members' lively approach to volunteer community service. They also sponsor walkathons (shades of the Thirties!) in which teams from rival schools move toward the finish line as dimes are contributed. They dance for dimes at casual sock hops and formal balls, man concessions at school sports events, and hold community car washes.

Through such ingenious fun-for-funds projects, TAPs raised nearly three-quarters of a million dollars during the 1961 March of Dimes.

For the 1962 New March of Dimes in January, tens of thousands of the youthful volunteers are literally "on TAP." In more than 75 per cent of The National Foundation's 3,100 local county chapters, active TAP committees are determined to hit new highs in fun as well as funds.

Adult advisors who work with TAPs point out that underlying the outward frivolity of the teenagers' projects is a deep awareness of the need for increased research and progress in the fight against crippling birth defects—arthritis and polio. During the year, many youngsters assist in local patient services by reading to disabled children, writing letters for severely crippled arthritics or working as hospital aides.

A prime year-round responsibility of TAP members is distribution of information about National Foundation Health Scholarships to students in high schools and colleges. Each year, more than 500 four-year scholarships with a full value of \$2,000 apiece are offered for study in medicine, nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy and medical social work. TAP members know the desperate need to reduce the shortage of manpower in the health professions by encour-

aging students to undertake careers in these fields.

Leader of the Teen Age Program for the 1962 New March of Dimes is national chairman Katherine Anne Keith, 18, of Columbia, Mo. Blonde, brainy and born to be busy, Katie will handle her major responsibilities as top TAP while she pursues an ambitious freshman schedule at the University of Missouri.

On the basis of past performance, juggling scholarship and volunteer service won't intimidate Katie. She was 1961 Missouri state TAP chairman during her strenuous senior year in high school. Under her leadership, Missouri TAPs showed record gains in membership, services to chapters and funds raised for the March of Dimes.

At the same time, Katie maintained grades that ranked her third in her graduating class of almost 300 students. She was a National Merit Scholarship finalist and received the Kiwanis Good Citizenship

award. She was business manager—and occasional sports-writer—for the school paper, treasurer of the National Honor Society, queen of the major social function of the school year, had a lead role in the school play, "Teahouse of the August Moon," and actively participated in math, history, English and French clubs.

She also teaches a Sunday School class at Missouri Methodist Church in Columbia. After a summer in Europe, including study at the Sorbonne in Paris, the energetic Katie began to plan for a banner year of TAP activity for the March of Dimes.

"Teenagers who are looking for a sense of satisfaction along with fun and friendship are missing a bet if they don't check TAP activities in their local March of Dimes chapters," she said. "A TAP committee isn't just another youth organization—it's not only a club to serve your school, it gives us an opportunity to serve our community."
