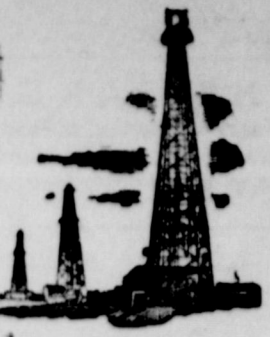

LISTEN TO LUKE

Edmund Burke once said: "All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is for good people to do nothing."

That is a good saying if we ever heard one, or read one!

We wish we could say or think of something like that!

There are two moves on that will be accomplished if good people do nothing — one is to increase the House Rules Committee, which would be a blow to conservative government, and the other is a move to bring on more and increased federal aid to education.

One of the first things being talked about in "One Man's Family" is to increase the Rules Committee, the birthplace or burial ground for so many proposed pieces of legislation. Certainly the plans for the increase are to pack the committee with "friends of the family" to help get their legislation through. The rules committee was recently increased in an effort to "pack" it and the move would have been successful had there not been a net increase of Republican members in the House.

A letter to your Congressmen would help to prevent this "packing".

The move to more federal aid to education has been underwritten by the executive secretary of the National Education Agency, according to information we have.

They are encouraging the outpouring of 813,000 letters, telegrams, or telephone calls which William G. Carr stated "would virtually assure that federal aid to education — the paramount domestic issue facing this great nation — would receive prompt attention by the Congress."

If 813,000 letters will assure such action by Congress, then let's send twice that number to Congressmen urging them to act always in opposition to any more federal aid to education.

Federal aid has always meant federal control. Federal control has always meant more "government," and more government has always meant more taxes.

We have a story in this week's paper about the condition of the Texas Permanent School Fund.

We have information available to all of us about the financial condition of our own schools. We know what we have and what we need in our local plant, plus a few things we would like to have. We know that we can furnish from local financing our needs more adequately and less expensively than can the federal government.

Let's retain the management and control of our own schools on a local basis by urging all opposition to federal aid to education.

Border Patrolman, Barnes Retired At Stockton Dinner

Shelly Barnes, senior patrol inspector and in charge of the Fort Stockton office of the Border Patrol, retired on December 31 after a 40-year record of service.

Permanent Fund For Texas Schools Continues Growth

The Texans who created a permanent school fund more than 100 years ago left a memorial every Texas tax payer can understand and appreciate today.

In size of the fund and money earned, no other state in the nation has a comparable source of non-tax funds dedicated solely to public education.

The fund provided more than 21 million dollars of non-tax money for use in public schools in 1962, a sharp increase of about three million dollars more than in 1961.

The increase in revenue is attributed to investment in corporate securities, the refunding of certain treasury bonds, and normal growth of the investment account.

Investments in the Texas Permanent School Fund totaled more than 477 million dollars at the end of November, 1962, and the current rate of return from the fund has been increased from 3.38 per cent to 3.51 per cent.

In the past 25 years, the fund has earned in interest more than \$162,000,000, not including money transferred from the principal.

In the next 10 years, interest earned should exceed 200 million dollars if the current rate of growth and returns continues.

For this period this sum would represent a tax savings of more than 40 per cent of the current total valuation of 477 million dollars.

The money will be needed as the scholastic population of the State is increasing rapidly, about 65,000 to 70,000 children each year.

The problem of financing public education is not new as the rapid increase in the number of school children was the object as far back as 1856 when Gov. H. R. Runnels addressed the Seventh Legislature.

Runnels said, "As each year passes, there will be more (children). In the wise provisions of God, to whom He grants no riches, He grants children in abundance."

The permanent school fund has proved to be a rich and profitable legacy from the early Texans, but it is doubtful if even they could have dreamed that by 1972 Texas will have an estimated three million school children to share in the benefits of men who planned to make certain "equal educational opportunities for all".

Conservative estimates reveal that approximately 11,000,000 radios are behind the iron curtain listening to news from Radio Free Europe, every hour on the hour scooping the news media of the Communist countries.

School Census Is Underway

The parents of all scholastics are urged to have their children included in the census. All children who will be six years old before September 1 and who will not be 18 before that date should be included in the census. This also includes any who for any reason are not attending school.

If anyone is missed by the enumerator, it is urged that Mr. Weyerts or Supt. H. L. Richardson be notified some time during the month of January.

Poll Tax Payers Show Interest Lag

With 1963 considered an "off-election year", Terrell County residents have been slow to get a poll tax receipt which will give them the privilege of voting in elections which may come up this year.

An election slated for April is the election of school board members.

The office of tax assessor and collector reported Tuesday that only 168 poll tax receipts had been issued to date. In Texas a poll tax receipt is required of everyone between the ages of 21 and 60 desiring to vote in any election. Exemption certificates are not necessary in this county, with less than 10,000 voters. Anyone having reached their 21st birthday before any election may obtain an exemption certificate 30 days before the election which will entitle them to a free vote.

Poll taxes will not be issued after January 31.

'A' Roadrunners Win Tourney Here

Odessa Man Named To New Position By Cong. Foreman

Newly-installed Congressman Ed Foreman will offer West Texas constituents something different in Congressional representation — the services of a special assistant living in the district. R. F. "Rudy" Juedeman of Odessa has been named to the new position.

"This appointment has been made to give West Texans closer representation in their government," said Foreman. "No new funds or appropriations are necessary to maintain the new office. We are merely streamlining our services."

Juedeman, long an advocate of sound, conservative government, moved to Odessa five years ago from Montana where he engaged extensively in farming and ranching. He served several sessions in the Montana legislative assembly in a position of leadership from which he withdrew to become active in the search for and the production of oil in West Texas. With his background of farming, ranching, legislative experience, and now with oil in West Texas, I believe Mr. Juedeman to be singularly qualified to aid in the intelligent solution of any basic problem which may arise," Foreman stated.

Juedeman will travel through the 19-county district, discussing people's problems and needs first hand. We will keep the regular Congressional office in the Federal Building in El Paso, in addition to Juedeman's business office in Odessa, where people may call at any time," Foreman concluded.

The Odessa office will be in Room 512, American Bank of Commerce Building.

Alien Registration Required in January

All aliens in the United States except a few diplomats, accredited members of certain international organizations, and those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers, must report their addresses to the government each January.

Forms for this purpose are available at any post office or office of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service. The forms may be filled out in those offices and returned to the clerk from whom received. Parents or guardians are required to submit reports for alien children under 14 years of age.

Galvan died of a heart attack according to relatives, in an Alpine hospital Tuesday afternoon. He had been hospitalized since January 2.

Frank Arredondo, R. M. Arredondo, and P. M. Arredondo, their sister, Mrs. Santiago Barera and her daughter, Elida, attended funeral services in Plainview last week for their cousin, Alfredo Arredondo, Sr., a former Sanderson resident. Mr. and Mrs. Rodolfo Alvarado also attended the funeral.

Arredondo, 59, was fatally injured in a knife and club wielding affray in that city a few minutes after the new year came in, according to reports. He died about two hours later. Several men and two women have been arrested in connection with the affray which began when the father went to the aid of his son, who lived next door, when he heard them kicking and attempting to knock the door down, is the story related. The son is hospitalized with several cuts, but is in satisfactory condition, relatives report.

Survivors include his wife, seven children, four sisters, and a brother.

MVI Stickers Are Due By April 15

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, this week urged Texas automobile owners to "do their shopping early" this year to reduce the last-minute rush for inspection stickers.

All vehicles coming under the provisions of the Texas Vehicle Inspection Act must secure the 1963 inspection sticker by April 15, 1963. After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and the operators of those vehicles will be subject to arrest, Garrison said.

He reported that approximately half of the inspection period has expired and about one-fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

Weather Woes Cut Production

Weather played havoc with almost every major crop in the state in 1962 and caused crop production to hit its lowest point since 1957.

U.S. Department of Agriculture reports that the 1962 crop index fell nine per cent below the 1961 level to 127.0. All-time high of 145.0 was set in 1939, and the 1961 level was second highest.

Crops hit hardest were: wheat, down to 43,700,000 bushels or 49 per cent below 1961; citrus, down to about six per cent of the 1961 production; sorghum, down 12 per cent; cotton, down 106,000 bales — to 4,680 bales or 49 per cent below 1961.

Production of corn, peanuts, soybeans, and rice was down. Speaker-elect Byron Tunnell of Tyler said he's going to restore dignity to the House, where legislation frequently resembles a trading boom at the New York Stock Exchange.

He warned legislators that they can no longer have secretaries work at their desks, and relatives will not be allowed to sit with them, except on very special occasions.

Worm Eradication Funds Short

The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program — which succeeded in cutting screwworm cases by 75 to 90 per cent in less than a year — will be halted March 31 unless livestock producers raise another \$1,000,000 by that date.

Charlie Scruggs, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, made that announcement on behalf of the SWAHRF board of trustees.

The three-year eradication program, initiated last January, cost an estimated \$12,000,000. The federal government was to pay \$6,000,000, the livestock producers, \$3,000,000, and the state \$3,000,000.

But so far the farmers and ranchers have donated only \$2,000,000. Scruggs said, "The plan was based on 100 per cent participation, and this has not been the case, although there have been commendable contributions in some counties."

Economic Health Texas Bank Deposits are continuing to set records almost everywhere.

A survey of major cities was made after the state banking commissioner and the U. S. Comptroller ordered condition reports as of December 28.

The December 28 date caught many banks by surprise. They were anticipating the call date to be December 31.

Some banks said the difference in dates prevented them from reporting even higher figures. Last day of the year usually is a high mark for bank deposits.

Target for New Attorney-General Texas' new attorney general has pledged a positive campaign against juvenile delinquency as one of his major projects.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr addressed an overflow crowd at his swearing-in ceremonies in the Courts Building. He said that delinquency is neither normal nor universal among our juveniles. "On the contrary, a respect for the law is far more common among young people than is disrespect," Carr stated.

Carr also pledged to "continue vigorously" investigations begun by his predecessor, Will Wilson, into the East Texas slant-hole well scandal and the Billie Sol Estes case. Although pledging no encroachment on local responsibility, Carr warned that in any instance where local officials "fan in their trust to this state," he will not hesitate to step in "to correct the situation within the boundaries of power and authority."

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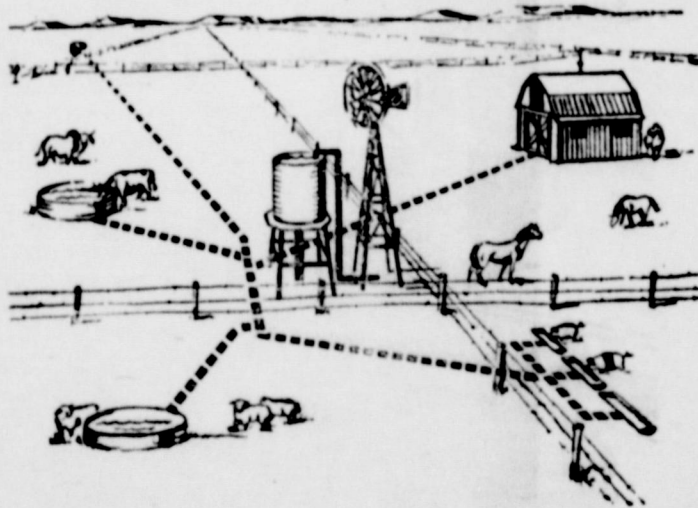
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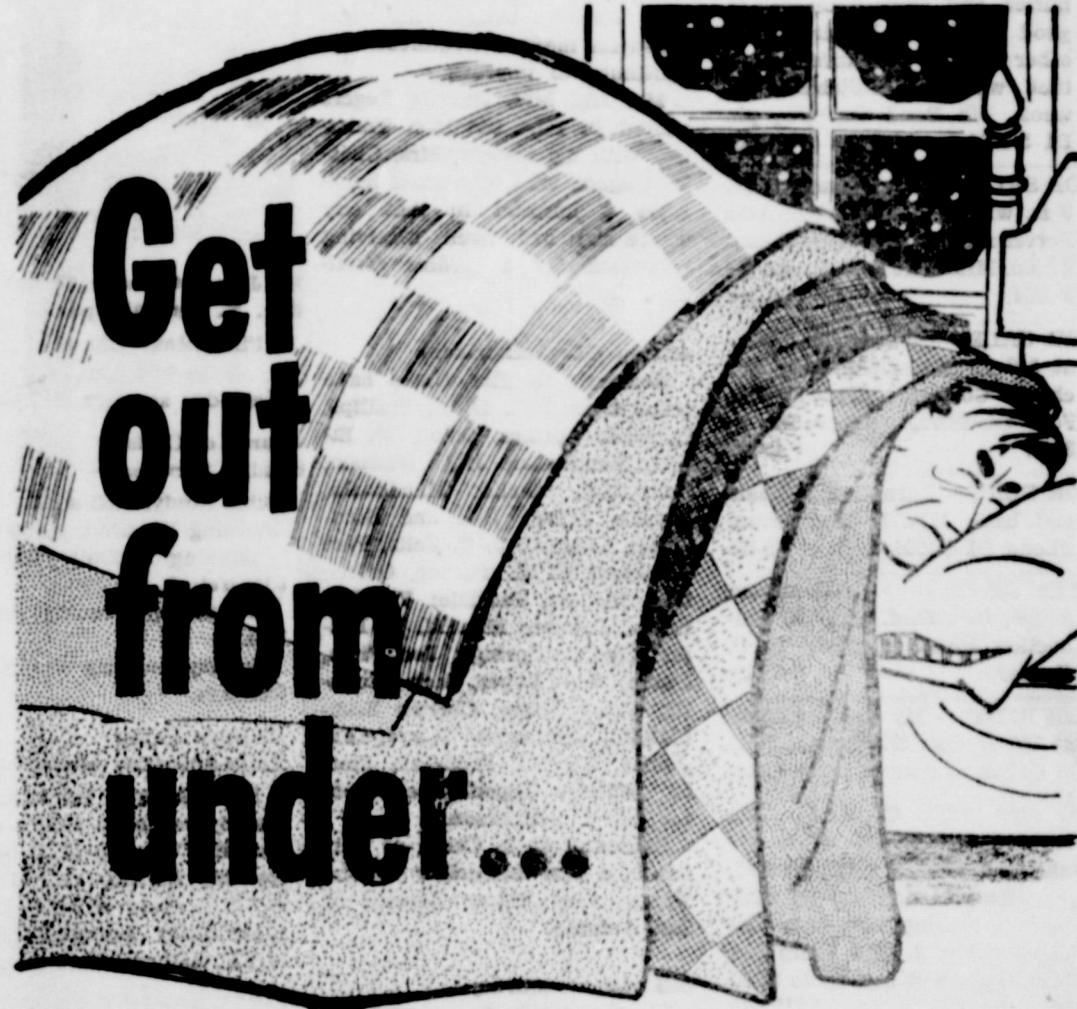

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Saved Like the Thief ???

We are told, "Every sinner that has ever been saved, was saved the same way that the penitent thief was saved" and "He simply believed on and trusted in the atonement of Jesus Christ for the salvation of his soul." (See Times, Dec. 28) Consider. Was Abraham saved? Did he believe in Jesus as the Son of God? Was Moses saved? Was he required to believe that Jesus is the Son of God? WHY NOT? It is obvious that neither Abraham or Moses lived at a time when this was required. This had not been revealed or commanded at that time. Likewise, the law of Moses was in effect until Christ died and nailed it to the cross (Col. 2:14), and the thief lived and received his promise before it ended. We are not under the same law. We do not observe the same commandments or worship in the same way. We CANNOT be saved like the thief because we cannot duplicate his situation. We live in a different age and under law to Christ (1 Cor. 9:21).

"For where a testament is, there must also of necessity be the death of the testator. For a testament is of force after men are dead: otherwise it is of no strength at all while the testator liveth." (Heb. 9:16, 17). A will becomes effective at the death of the testator. The new will (testament) of Christ became effective at the death of Christ (the testator). Now a man may make a will with terms and instructions for the disposal of all his possessions, but while he lives he is at liberty to dispense anything he owns without regard to the terms of the will. However, when he dies, the will becomes effective and the ONLY way a man may receive anything is according to the terms of the will. The thief received his promise before the death of Christ and before the will was in force. We are under the will and must meet its terms to have its blessings.

The book of Acts is a catalog of examples of people who were saved AFTER the will of Christ became effective. We live in the same age as they. Read the book to see how to be saved. Below is an outline of the conversions recorded.

Scientists Cause Mixup of Sexes

March of Dimes-supported scientists have found that if they dip an egg into the right kind of hormone solution, they can change the sex of the unhatched chick from what it started out to be.

This, of course, is of concern to a chick which is supposed to be a rooster and hatches out with most of the features of a hen, or vice versa.

The research also is of direct concern to people, because the scientists believe they are on the track of what may cause some human beings to be born with mixed-up sex characteristics.

A few cases of sex changes in people have become world famous. But according to Dr. Virginia Apgar, director of the birth defects division of The National Foundation-March of Dimes, "It is a more common and important problem than most people realize. More and more infants and children are being found who are somewhere between pure male and pure female sex."

Such "intersex" is a biologic contradiction and a major mystery. How does it come about? Perhaps if we had the explanation, doctors could devise ways to prevent it or treat it to straighten things out again.

That's why March of Dimes funds have been awarded to support investigations by Dr. Gregory Pincus, an internationally recognized authority on hormones and research director of the Worcester Foundation for Experimental Biology, Shrewsbury, Mass.

It is known that heredity factors can lead to sex abnormalities. But Dr. Pincus points out, "obviously heredity isn't the whole story." Hormones are undoubtedly involved, too.

Scientists speculate that certain hormones or other substances in a pregnant mother's body may reach the cells of her unborn baby during the critical early days of growth and completely change the direction of the baby's sex development.

Though their project is still in its early stages, Dr. Pincus and his associate, Dr. Alan Erickson, have found that this theory holds water.

If an egg containing a four-day-old chick embryo is dipped for just ten seconds into a solution containing a female sex hormone, a budding rooster can be "feminized."

If such birds are allowed to hatch and mature without any

For the hormone that "masculinized" female chick embryos was progesterone. This isn't a male sex hormone by a long shot. In fact, it is mostly connected with female ovaries and its primary function is to keep things going smoothly during the course of pregnancy.

Just why a "pregnancy hormone" should have such drastic effect on the sex of a female chick is another puzzling element in the birth development riddle that Dr. Pincus and his colleagues are trying to decipher.

Their long-range study, they believe, will help explain some of the mysteries surrounding the earliest stages of human development. Their results have already pinned down one important point beyond contention: heredity is by no means the only factor that determines sex. Whatever comes in contact with embryonic cells may alter them, or even destroy them.

"Certainly the possible influence of hormones needs further investigation," Dr. Apgar states. "We already know, for instance, that excessive hormone treatment of a pregnant woman sometimes 'feminizes' her baby if it is a male, producing changes parallel to those observed by Dr. Pincus in his experiments."

further hormone treatment, most of them eventually revert to the maleness that nature had intended for them. They grow combs and wattles and crow like any self-respecting rooster. Internally, too, matters are corrected and organs usually appear to be normal.

But once in a while there's an exception. The bird doesn't revert to male, but stays somewhere in-between. As a potential rooster, the bird is sterile. As a potential hen, it does not lay eggs.

When they came to trying the reverse egg-dipping experiment, changing the sex of a female chick to male, the Worcester Foundation researchers ran into a baffling obstacle.

The obvious procedure — dipping the egg into a solution of male hormone — didn't work.

So they checked a variety of other hormones. When they finally found a hormone that did the trick, it went against all textbook expectations.

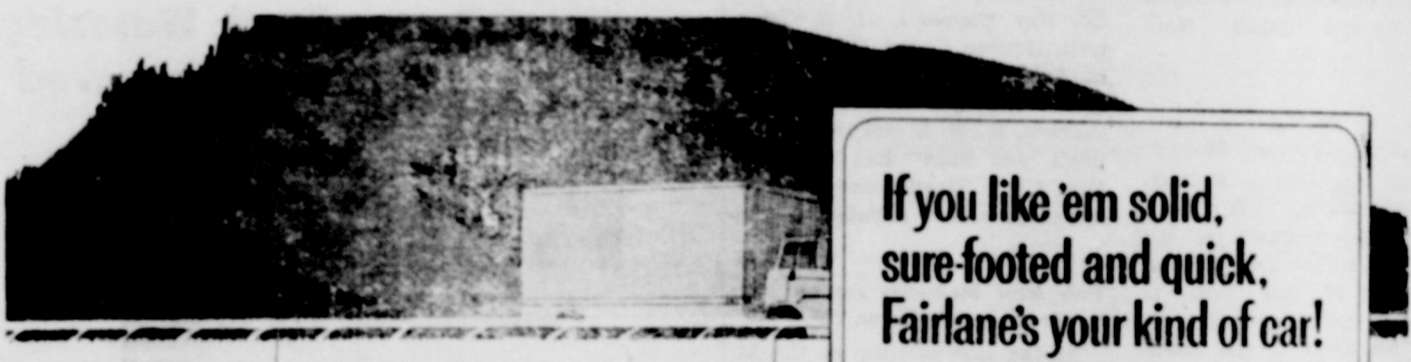
