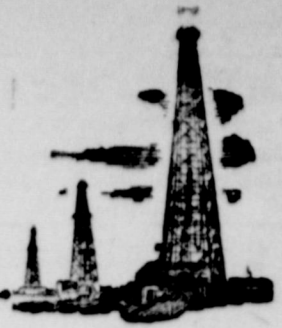

And the Texas Legislature piled out a big sum for the increase of John Connally's staff — his first request of the Legislature following a campaign on "conservatism" and a promise to cut staff expenses.

It is for fear of the welfare of this nation that we are prompted to continue to try to alert some of our readers of the dangers of the many political moves that show us plainly where the end will be.

One of the dreams of the commissioners court of Terrell County, and particularly the residents in the north central and northeast part of the county was realized this week when the final leg of RM2400 was completed and opened for traffic.

Many years of effort on the part of the commissioners resulted in the approval little by little of additional work on the highway until the last stretch some 13 miles, was okayed last year.

We have little occasion to use the road, but we can share in the jubilation of the people who did so badly need the road and have sweated out its various stages of construction up to the final completion.

Since the road's two ends were not in Terrell County, it was necessary to get the Texas 349 work completed, then prevail upon Pecos County to do something on the southwest end of the road to get a beginning. After these two obstacles, then it was a matter of time until the Texas Highway Department had funds it could allocate to further construction projects on the road.

C. H. Gregory, Pioneer Rancher, Dies Wednesday

C. H. Gregory died about 8:30 p.m. Wednesday evening in an Alpine hospital, the victim of a heart attack, according to reports. He was taken to the hospital Wednesday afternoon after suffering an attack which was reported to have been considered "slight."

Mr. Gregory was born in Beeville on November 25, 1893. He was married to Miss Mildred Shely on January 29, 1916. They have made their home in Terrell County for many years, operating a ranch just west of Sanderson.

Funeral services are planned for Friday afternoon at 2:30 in the Chapel at the Doran Funeral Home in Del Rio and interment will be in that city.

Besides the widow, survivors include one daughter, Miss Margaret Gregory, who made her home with her parents; several brothers; a sister, Mrs. Arnold Vleyle, of Buffalo, N.Y.

'Americana' Series To Feature Alamo



The eyes of nearly 50-million Americans will be turned toward one of Texas' major tourist attractions in late January and in mid-February as a major oil company unveils its 1963 Americana advertising series.

The defense of the Alamo, one of the great events in American history, is to be featured in full color as a part of a year-long advertising program. The series opener, the American Oil Co., is the nationwide marketing and refining affiliate of Pan American Petroleum Corp., pioneer Texas oil producer.

Objective of the Americana series is to stimulate greater interest in our American heritage and to encourage motorists all over the country to visit the Alamo and other points where Texas history was made.

The painting is by noted historical artist, H. Charles McBaron, consultant to the Smithsonian Institution who is widely known in artistic circles for his detailed attention to early-day military uniforms and equipment.

RM 2400 Completed Through North County

Crews this week completed black-topping of RM 2400 between US 285 and State 349. The project was for approximately 13 miles and it will be given a seal coat this summer, according to information received.

The road offers an all-paved and shorter route from Sanderson to Sheffield and points to the north or east.

On the far end of RM 2400, the course of the road was altered to go up the hill before joining Texas 349. The junction was formerly at the bottom of the hill.

Some fencing is to be done on the lane on the far end of the newly-constructed stretch, and some guard posts and other safety signs or markers are to be installed before the completion of the construction is seen.

The road joins US 285 just north of the Terrell County line in Pecos County and will cut off approximately 15 miles between Sanderson and Sheffield. It will also offer an all-paved route of highway for ranchers in that section of the county.

One of the great advantages of the new road will be a better, and faster route for stock trucks to take stock to market in San Angelo or a closer route for the stock hauled to Fort Worth.

Pre-School English In Special Program Proves Valuable

Of each 100 students who entered first grade in Texas public schools in 1961 with no knowledge of English, only 18 completed grade 1 in one year.

The 82 who remained in grade 1 for a second year cost the state around \$25,000 — figured on an annual instruction cost of approximately \$300 per student.

A pre-school instructional program, authorized by the Legislature in 1959, may prove to be a partial solution to this economic and academic problem.

The program has been in existence for the past three summers. It is administered by local school systems and is financed by the State Minimum Foundation Fund and the participating school districts.

In this pre-school program children have had opportunity to learn to speak and understand English and 76 of each 100 enrolled in the 1961 program completed the first grade in the '61-'62 school year and were promoted.

Of each 100 students with pre-school instruction, 58 more successfully completed grade 1 than did students from a similar-sized group who lacked this training.

During the past summer, almost 19,000 children enrolled in 154 schools. If 76 per cent of these students complete first grade in 1962-63 as compared with 18 per cent completions by those with no special training, this 58 per cent bonus of 19,000 (11,020 at \$300 per person) will total \$3,306,000.

The pre-school program in '62 cost the state and the participating districts \$371,748. Deducting this figure from \$3,306,000 indicates savings of almost three millions dollars on the experimental group of 19,000.

The potential saving of the program is difficult to estimate as there are no exact figures on the total number of non-English-speaking children.

Equal Rights

The perennial battle for women's rights will hit the limelight in the Texas Senate early in the 58th Legislature.

Senate Constitutional Amendments committee set public hearing for 7:00 p.m., January 30, on a proposal to give women equal legal rights. Proposed constitutional amendment was submitted by Sens. W. T. Moore of Bryan and Bill Patman of Ganado.

Vote Age Target

Rep. V. E. "Red" Berry of San Antonio wants the minimum voting age in Texas lowered to 18 years.

Berry has filed a bill which would propose a constitutional amendment allowing the Legislature to make the change.

Present law requires voters to be 21 years of age.

Cost Cutting Bill

A bill to create a commission to study ways of cutting costs of Texas' government is on file in the House of Representatives.

Rep. R. H. Cory of Victoria said his bill would create a "little Hoover" commission composed of 12 members. Three members would come from the House.

three from the Senate, and six would be appointed by Governor Connally, who also has recommended formation of the commission.

Cory said his bill has been passed by the House on five different occasions but never passed the Senate.

Stockmen Raising Funds

Texas Livestock Auction Association is sponsoring a drive to help raise the \$1,000,000 still needed to meet the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation's \$3,000,000 goal to stamp out the screwworm.

Texas' screwworm eradication program will come to a halt in March unless the million is raised.

Governor Connally recommended that the legislature determine quickly whether the screwworm eradication program is in trouble. Result was a hurriedly called hearing, attended by about 30 legislators and as many livestock producers and animal health officials.

Eradication supporters told legislators that the program reduced screwworms by 70 to 90 per cent its very first year, but the \$5,000,000 spent to date will be wasted unless the job is finished. It is viewed as a three-year program.

Three-fifths of the funds spent so far has come from federal funds, two-thirds from the livestock producers.

The \$12,000,000 program is a true, matching one: Uncle Sam will continue his payments toward the \$6,000,000 he promised, so long as the producers and the

state combined are matching his payments.

So far, the state has paid nothing into the program. But the Texas Animal Health Commission has urged an immediate appropriation of \$1,400,000.

Governor Connally has stated that he would ask for such an emergency appropriation if the legislature learns that the program is in danger.

Small-Town Boost Proposed

U. S. Congressman Wright Patman's worry that an "overwhelming percentage of the smaller towns and rural areas of East Texas are going downhill" is shared by at least two legislators.

Reps. Joe Cannon of Mexia and H. G. Wells of Tullia spread their concern over economic ills in East Texas to rural areas all over the state. And they have come up with a scheme to bolster the moral and economy of rural counties.

Under their plan, counties with less than 45,000 population would receive a two per cent refund of the sales tax collected by them. This money would go to county judges, who in turn would distribute it to city councils to be used to advertise for new industries and offer incentives to industry.

Wells estimated that 200 counties would be eligible to receive a sales tax rebate, and that \$1,000,000 would be distributed the first year.

Main object, Wells said, would be to save counties which recently had some prosperous small towns but which have suffered from being bypassed by highways or from an exodus of citizens who have moved to metropolitan areas.

Impact in Supreme Court

Waggoner Carr made his first appearance before the State Supreme Court as attorney general when the high court heard the case of the state versus the City of Impact. Impact is a satellite of "dry" Abilene which proposes to operate "wet."

Carr made a brief argument for the state, but turned the major presentation over to Tom Eplen of Abilene, and former State Senator Clint C. Small, who have worked on the case for about three years.

March Draft 404

Texas' March quota for draftees is 404 men.

"This is more than double the calls of recent months," says State Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

February quota was 173 and the January call was for 163 men.

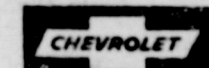

Deaths Decrease On Area Highways

Midland - "A marked reduction in rural motor vehicle traffic deaths was recorded during 1962 in the Midland Highway Patrol District," said Capt. Ray B. Butler, commanding officer of the 24 county West Texas area today. "An even 100 traffic deaths occurred in 1962, as compared to 114 being chalked up in 1961." Butler stated as he released the rural accident statistics for 1962.

"We want the motoring public of this area to know that we feel they are responsible for this reduction. We also feel the public information media of this area did their share during the year in keeping a constant reminder before the drivers of West Texas, that traffic accidents can and do happen to anyone unless they are alert to the dangers that exist while using motor vehicle transportation regardless of where it may be."

This is the third year "a succession a reduction has been occasioned in our area, and we are proud of our drivers. However, losses short of deaths, were considerably heavier than last year than in 1961, according to Butler.

In Terrell County, there was 1 fatal accident, four personal injury accidents, five property damage accidents totaling \$1280 during the last quarter of last year. Total property damage in Terrell County accident during 1962 was \$40,650.00
