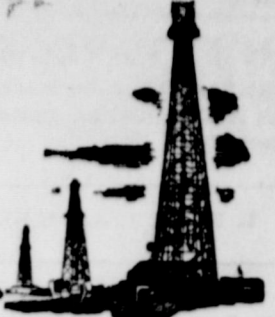

Kerr Mercantile Designated As Fallout Shelter

The Kerr Mercantile Co. Bldg has been designated as an official fallout shelter for Sanderson by the Civil Defense Agency. It is the only such designation locally at this time.

A sign has been affixed to the front door of the building to indicate the designation and it also specifies that no more than 545 persons are supposed to use the building in case there is danger from fallout.

The basement of the building has been designated as the area to be used in case of fallout danger, and neither of the other three floors are considered unsafe from fallout.

Edward Kerr, manager of The Kerr Mercantile Co., stated that he was told by the Civil Defense Agency officials that water and food supplies and other necessities with which fallout shelters were provided would be forthcoming within four to six months.

Oil, Railroad Properties Accept Increased Valuation For County's School Taxes

All oil properties, the gas plant, and pipe line, and all railroad properties accepted an increase in valuation for school tax purposes at the meeting of the board of equalization for the school district on Wednesday.

The increase will net about \$800,000.00 in valuations of properties for school taxing purposes. This increase in valuations was accepted by the large property owners to prevent the increase in all the property in the county for taxing purposes. It was felt by the tax representatives that an increase in all property in the county might throw a burden on other taxpayers and would cause an increase in the economic index of the county the basis for state aid to school districts.

Oil properties, gas plants and pipe lines and all railroad properties were taxed last year on a valuation which was 115 per cent of all other properties, and this year were increased to 125 per cent of all other properties. Dry leases, which were valued for taxes last year at 50c per acre this year will be 60c per acre, an increase of 20 per cent.

It was pointed out that there was an increase in demands on local funds for the operation of the schools because of an increase in the economic index. This increase was brought about by the increase in valuations of school taxing property during the last several years.

This decrease in state funds as was pointed out, causes the need for increased local funds for the operation of the schools.

It was pointed out that the new budget for the school was not appreciably different from last year, but included \$10,000.00 for necessary repairs which amount would not have been included in the budget had not the need for the repairs been so pressing. The repairs include the replacing of the steam pipes to the high school building, the replacing of some furniture in the junior high school building, the remodeling of the gym and installation of new-type seating.

A part of the increase in total valuation of property in the county for school taxes was partly due to the addition of new properties, such as complete wells, etc.

In county tax property, there was an increase in the valuations of oil and gas properties due to new completions, etc., in the amount of \$670,810.00, according to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson. This is expected to be offset, however, by the decrease in the number of livestock in the county on January 1, 1963.

Otherwise the county tax picture remained the same.

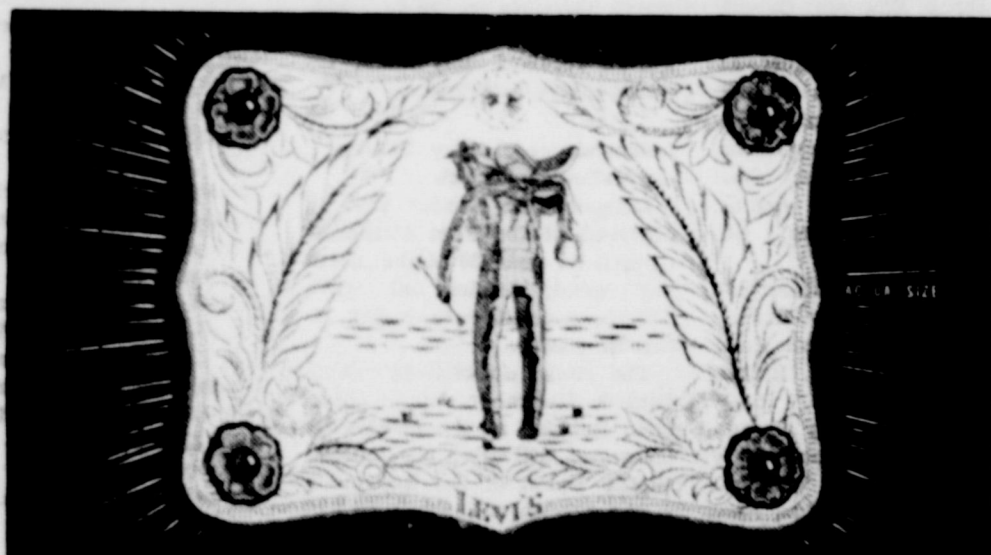
