Traffic through Sanderson has held up exceptionally well during the summer from where we sit and travel into the state has been better this year than in the past several years, according to information we have received.

The traveling public has its impact in areas which draw them and bids constantly are going out to try to maintain, or build up the tourist trade in all sections of the country.

We have read recently of the naming of Padre Island as a national park, and we live on the edge of the Big Bend National Park. Just to the north of us is the Sand Hills State Park, near Monahans, and there are other such places over the state that draw travelers to certain areas.

One thing we have noticed concerning some of the state and national parks is that the land is of little use otherwise. We do not say this in a derisive manner or to talk about someone's property.

But what else is a pile of sand near Monahans good for, except a state park? Or a pile of sand along the sea? Or anywhere else for that matter?

And our Big Bend National Park was a huge hunk of ranch land at one time that was not considered the best piece of real estate in the nation until the nation wanted it for a park!

We have some of the same kind of country all over this area — as rugged, as dry, as wide, as hot, as bare, and as full of wildlife as is the park area. And some of it has almost as many predators on it, too.

We can't have all of the sorry country in the world in state or national parks, though. That's for sure.

We admire, though, the ability of a man who owns such a chunk of real estate and can peddle it off to the authorities for its "preservation for posterity" as a park. It helps a man to get rid of some country to the government at a big price and in a manner that is better than giving it to the government and at a cheaper price.

Old Tax Rate Kept By County

The old tax rate of 77c per hundred dollars valuation was retained by the Terrell County Commissioners Court at their regular meeting Monday. The tax rate has been the same for the past several years.

Following a review of the tax picture of the county and proposed expenditures, the commissioners felt that the slight increase in valuations by additional properties within the county would take care of the increased cost of county government and operation by retaining the same rate as the old basis for taxation.

Other routine matters were disposed of by the court before the morning's session ended.

Efforts Made To Tie 2400 to US 290

An effort is being made to tie RM2400, between US 285 and State 349, to US 290 between Bakersfield and Fort Stockton. The effort has been initiated by the Terrell County Commissioners and will have assistance from Pecos County Commissioners, following a meeting with that group Monday morning.

The Terrell County Commissioners have an appointment with Texas Highway Department District Engineer Archie J. Sherrod in Odessa later this month.

Since some of the land to be used for right-of-way is in Pecos County, the assistance of the Commissioners of that county were sought.

Garrison Warns Of New Speed Law

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety warned motorists today "not to take the new, higher speed limits too literally" when they go into effect Aug. 23.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. reminded that "there are a multitude of circumstances and situations under which the old limits were too fast for safety."

"With more than two-thirds of the Texas highway system under a 70-mile-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars and 65 miles per hour at night, we wish to appeal to all Texans to exercise keen judgment and drive reasonably and prudently regardless of what the signs say.

The law prohibits driving a vehicle too fast for existing conditions, regardless of what the signs say.

"The Department of Public Safety believes that the objective of speed legislation is to contribute to the efficient movement of traffic on highways. We feel the new law will help to accomplish this, and our objective of enforcement is to secure substantial compliance with the speed law by all users of the rural highways. The prima facie speed limits fixed by the Legislature or established by zoning authorities will be construed to be the maximum permissible speeds under normal conditions and speeds in excess of such limits will be considered illegal.

"Our enforcement personnel will stop and initiate appropriate enforcement action against all persons observed by them to be committing clear-cut and substantial violations of the speed law."

Garrison urged motorists to be particularly cautious in assuming the higher night speed limit of 65 miles per hour. He said research by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads shows that increasing night speeds from 55 MPH to 70 MPH doubles the accident involvement rate, and that severity of accidents increases rapidly at speeds over 70 MPH.

"We repeat that serious problems may develop with the new speed laws unless the driving public accepts and applies them with a high degree of responsibility to themselves and their families and others," he said.

"And we would like to emphasize that the traffic deaths are running far ahead of last year already, with an increase of about 100 deaths. Unless we can hold the line against this trend, we will wind up with an all-time high traffic death toll in 1963."

ASCS Committee To Be Named By Mail Ballot

The election of the Terrell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committeemen will be conducted by mail ballot again this year. Those to be elected are chairman, vice-chairman, regular member, and two alternates.

Ballots will be mailed to all known eligible voters on August 30. Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked not later than midnight September 12, 1963. Six or more eligible voters may sign a petition nominating persons for membership on the committee. This petition must be filed with the Terrell County ASCS County Committee by August 23, 1963. Names of persons nominated by petition will be included in the slate of nominees if the persons are found willing to serve and are eligible.

Persons eligible to vote in the county election who do not receive ballots may obtain them at the county office.

FAR, FAR-OUT FEDERAL EXTRAVAGANCE

If you believe that you have heard all the "far-out" wasteful expenditures of taxpayers' money by the federal government then consider these new examples of appropriations for studies which were cited recently by Rep. Homer F. Abele (Rep.-Ohio):

- \$17,500 for modification of alcohol preference in rats.
- \$15,200 for a study of society and demography in ancient Babylonia.
- \$36,800 for social behavior of ants.
- \$2,100 for behavior patterns of the barren-ground caribou.
- \$16,800 for social behavior of termites.
- \$20,600 for communication signals in birds.
- \$16,900 for revision of the classification of earthworms.
- \$13,700 for social structure in Madagascar.
- \$29,300 for mammal fauna of the highlands of Ethiopia.
- \$65,400 for behavior and ecology of the wandering albatross.

Congressman Abele is to be commended for having ferreted out these truly shocking instances of wild extravagance. Anyone who has even attempted to plough through the voluminous, intricate and "cover-up" phraseology of the federal budget knows that it really takes patience and expertise to spot the flagrant spending abuses.

It is to be hoped that Rep. Abele's labors will not have been in vain; that something is done to stop these giveaways, and fast.

Austin—Texas Youth Council's parole division will triple in the next six months or so. But the problem of trying to help "reform school" graduates become useful citizens is still great.

Until September 1, five state parole officers are responsible for some 1,800 juvenile parolees that are spread over 169 counties. That's a ratio of one parole officer to about 357 parolees, compared to national standards of one officer to 40 parolees.

Staff will increase to 10 on September 1 — a ratio of one to 178. On March 1, 1964, when five more are added, ration will be down to one parole officer to 119 parolees, spread over the Lone Star State.

Biggest number of parolees is stationed in big cities where the general rate of crime is always higher. More than a third of the paroled children are in Dallas, Harris and Bexar counties; another 288 in El Paso, Jefferson, Tarrant and Travis counties.

About 154 are in Nueces, McLennan, Bell and Lubbock counties.

But sizeable juvenile parole populations are centered in smaller counties, such as Cameron, Grayson, Brazoria, Ector, Galveston, Gregg, Hale, Hidalgo, Howard, Hunt, Midland, Navarro, Potter, San Patricio, Smith, Taylor, Wichita and Williamson.

Some counties have only one paroled child. But the state is responsible for every one that it has "retrained".

First Aide
 State Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell appointed

ed Robert C. Duke, Houston attorney, as Deputy Commissioner and General Counsel of the new state agency.

Duke formerly served as acting Securities Commissioner in the Secretary of State's securities division.

Regulatory bill takes effect on August 23. Some 2,000 loan companies operating in Texas will have to file for state licenses at that time.

Insurance Hearing
 A State Insurance Board hearing on proposed rules for regulating credit insurance—which pays off a man's debt if he dies, or makes the payments when he is disabled—drew a big crowd.

One controversial point was a ceiling rate of 90 cents per \$100 of insurance.

Some insurance company executives insisted the ceiling should be no more than 60 or 65 cents per \$100. But one spokesman thought the 90-cent per \$100 rate was too low and recommended \$1.

Some loan companies said they now give credit insurance free. They feared the proposed rules might outlaw this practice.

A second hearing with new proposed rules will be aired on September 10.

Money Men
 The Legislative Budget Board, lawmakers who make the Legislature's financial decisions between sessions, recommended \$4,644,000 worth of state building to Gov. John Connally.

Plans approved included one by the State Hospitals Board to equip a genetics lab and follow-up clinic on mental retardation in the State Psychiatric Institute at Houston; new dormitories for Gatesville School for Boys, Gainesville School for Girls and Crockett School for Negro Girls; and several prison system units.

Authorization was recommended for \$25,000 worth of partitioning to provide 23 new offices in Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr's department.

But the board balked at Texas A&M University's request to spend some \$100,000 on a home—exclusive of land and furnishings for A&M President Earl Rudder,

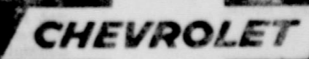
