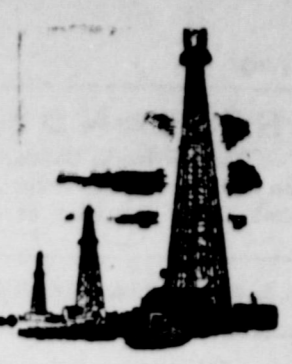

LISTEN TO LUKE

It is a shame there seems to be absolutely nobody in Washington with authority who has the foresight and plain common sense to see that the 58 American students who are aiding and abetting the Communists while visiting in Havana are brought home. Surely not all of these students are Reds, but they might as well be. At least Castro is taking advantage of them and using them to his advantage.

The 58 students arrived in Havana via Prague, Czechoslovakia, their trip being paid for by the Cuban Student Federation, a front group for Castro. The announced purpose of their visit to Cuba was that it was a "fact-finding" tour. It has turned out to be a propaganda vehicle for the Reds. They have been put on Radio Havana to blast their own country and to praise Castro.

Some months ago the State Department warned them if they went to Cuba they would be in violation of a law and subject to possible prison sentences and \$5,000 fines each. Now, it seems that the State Department should make it known that unless the students do return immediately, the maximum penalty will be sought.

When we disregard our own laws of travel of our citizens, we can hardly expect other nations to have much respect for our regulations concerning travel of their citizens in our country.

We cease to have much control over anything when we try to turn and twist and regulate laws to suit the individuals involved and the individuals doing the twisting.

Water District Study Plans To Increase Local Supply

The board of directors of the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1 this week initiated plans to increase the supply of local water by the addition of two wells with a total capacity of approximately 100 gallons per minute.

An engineering firm of Freeze Nichols, and Enders of Fort Worth has been employed to plan the equipment of the wells installation of storage tank of approximately 20,000 gallons, and the pipe to bring the water to town.

The two wells in the plans are on property belonging to the Lee McCue Estate north of Sanderson adjacent to the highway and were drilled to furnish water for a deep exploration well on the McCue property.

Jimmy Caroline, manager of the water district, stated that a deed for the property including the two wells had been promised

School Opening Date Is Set

Sanderson schools will begin on Tuesday, September 3, at 8:40 a.m. with a full regular schedule, according to Supt. H. L. Richardson. The bus from the El Paso Natural Gas Plant and from Dryden will operate on the same schedule and route as last year.

For all children entering school for the first time, the law requires a copy of their birth certificate showing that they will be six years of age on or before September 1, 1963. Also all of those students must have a doctor's certificate of smallpox vaccination, Supt. Richardson stated.

The teachers will have begun their work earlier as faculty meetings have been called for Thursday and Friday of next week.

Registration of all students will begin on Tuesday according to a schedule published last week. The registration next week will expedite many details incident to the opening of school the officials say, and will make possible a day of regular schedules on the opening day.

There are some vacancies yet to be filled on the faculty but it is expected that all places will be filled in time for the opening of school.

Gym Remodeling Is Completed

The remodeling of the gym at the Sanderson High School has been completed and basketball fans are in for a real surprise in the difference in the appearance.

The entire basketball court and backboards have been moved to the east side of the gym, leaving a five-foot lane between the east wall and the sideline of the basketball court.

Glass backboards has been installed on the goals, replacing the old wooden boards.

The score board and clock have been moved to the center of the south wall for easy observation by the scorekeeper, players, and spectators.

A new type of bleacher seat has been installed to afford greater comfort for the fans, and all fans will be seated on the west side of the gym. The seats have a solid deck so that nothing can be dropped underneath them, with room for the feet without bothering the person seated in front. The seats are in higher tiers and have hand rails on either end of each section for the safety of the fans.

Between games, or during the off-season for basketball, the seats may be folded back against the wall to afford more room in the gym, or for cleaning.

Supt. H. L. Richardson stated that there was absolutely no danger in the seats collapsing or folding while being used as there was a lock on the folding apparatus which had to be opened by a key before they could be folded or unfolded.

He stated that he hoped that the fans and players would enjoy the new arrangement and welcomed an inspection of the remodeled gym by any fans.

The first annual non-denominational Vacation Bible School began Monday, August 19, with the Church of Christ as host. The opening assembly was held at 9:00 a.m. for children from age 2 through the third grade. The fourth grade through the "teens" met at 2:00 p.m.

The theme of the school is "The Home In Which I Live" and has proven to be very interesting to the young folks, according to W. L. LaFleur, minister of the church.

Attendance at the school is holding an average of 71 through Wednesday and an invitation has been extended to all the children of Sanderson and Terrell County. The school will last through Friday of this week.

Telephone For Rural Residents Promised Again

Big Bend Telephone Co. officials last week announced plans for construction of a \$2,000,000 rural telephone system to serve six counties in West Texas.

Territory to be served covers 20,000 square miles in parts of Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Terrell, and Val Verde Counties, according to Charles DeBarbrie and Neville Haynes, officers of the corporation.

Approval of a \$2,000,000 loan from the Rural Electrification Administration is expected about the middle of September, they reported. There will be about 2,300 miles of telephone line constructed, 1,300 of which will use existing REA poles and 1,000 miles of new construction.

The first exchange has already been built at Heath Canyon in southeast Brewster County to serve Dow Chemical Co., and others will be built at Alpine, Marfa, Marathon, Fort Stockton, Sanderson, and Langtry.

The officials of the company stated that rates have not yet been set but an effort will be made to keep them as low as possible for customer acceptance.

On Not Moving Fast

As of July 31 this year, the Kennedy Administration has submitted 403 legislative requests to Congress and only 19 of them had been enacted into law. With Democrats in the White House and in control of every single agency of the federal government; with Democrats outnumbering Republicans 2 to 1 in the Senate, and 3 to 2 in the House, some folks are beginning to wonder where is the dynamic leadership that was so glowingly promised in the 1960 campaign.

The answer given by apologists for the administration is that Congress, as an institution and its outmoded machinery is to blame. Apparently, Congress only became outmoded since Mr. Kennedy took office, since there was no hue and cry about this supposed obsolescence during the eight Eisenhower years. The recordbreaking federal

spending, planned \$12 billion deficits, and the ever-increasing White House demand for more power are not geared to the 1960s but to the New Deal depression years. There is no public demand for youth camps area redevelopment, and the whole string of federal boondoggles, nor is there any enthusiasm in Congress for them. That is why most of Mr. Kennedy's program is bogged down and why only essential legislation will eventually pass. The truth is that it is not Congress, but Mr. Kennedy's legislative program which is outmoded.

Some 700 state employees scattered throughout Texas are getting a new set of bosses. Reason is the creation of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission on August 23.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission is made up of only three men, replacing the nine commissioners on the old Game and Fish Commission and six on the old Parks board.

Many state employees, who wondered whom Gov. John Connally would select to head the infant agency, now are wondering whether they themselves will remain on the payroll.

About 72 of the employees are in the Parks Department; some are managers of the state's 50-plus parks system. Another 625 or so are in the field of game and fish. About 100 of these are in the Austin office — the rest out in the field.

Connally says the consolidation will eliminate some duplication of services and effort.

One thing the state is sure to save is per diem and expenses for the commissioners. The \$27 per diem plus travel, hotel, and

High School Drop-out

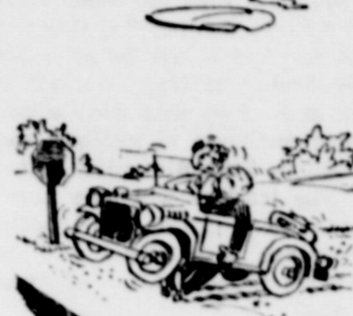
The growing problem of high school dropouts will be the topic of the annual meeting of the Texas State Committee on Public Education in Austin September 22.

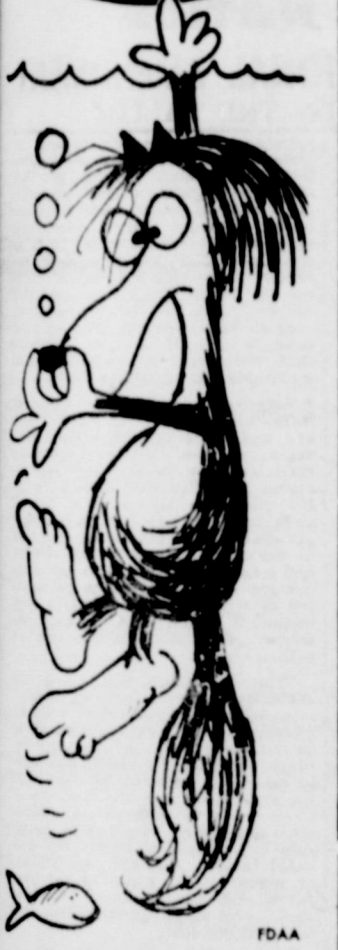

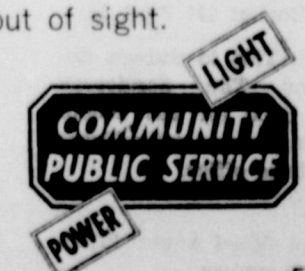
