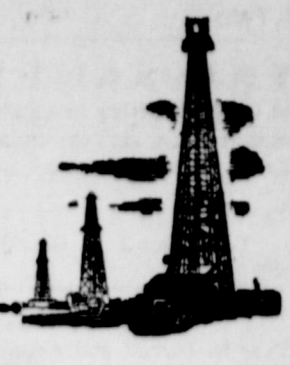

LISTEN TO LUKE

The week of October 13-19 is National Newspaper Week and the observance will be made in various ways over the nation.

The Sanderson Times will have no colorful or unusual activity during that week, except to go ahead with the publication of The Sanderson Times, the Lord willing.

All of the newspapers of the country have a tremendous responsibility to the people they serve, and in our humble opinion, we feel that none of us in the newspaper media are fulfilling that obligation to the fullest extent. We, being human, are like that. We have the same shortcomings as other individuals.

Our job has its pleasures and its woes the same as other jobs. At times, we, too, become discouraged over the nature of factors in our town or county — economically, politically, morally, spiritually, and in all other facets of our community life.

We would also say that we spend some quiet time in deep meditation trying to find some answers to some problems that exist. But neither do we know all of the answers.

We are constantly concerned with the economic pulse of the county and town. But we have found no solution to the problem of a diminishing population, a diminishing of services available to us, or of some of our other failings.

The first thing that seems to enter some people's mind is "Find some government agency to subsidize it or finance it completely."

And that is one thing that is contrary to each of our principles — that is unless we stand to gain by such action.

We like the idea of some new government program that will boost the conditions locally, but detest salt cedar eradication on the Pecos River, and the buying up of surplus Maine lobsters.

The purchase of old delapidated buildings at astronomical figures, and their resale for practically nothing by the federal government in a neighboring town was a deplorable thing, but the expenditure of tax money for certain improvements in Terrell County is the best money ever spent.

School, County And State Tax Statements Mailed

Tax statements for 1963 from the Terrell County Independent School District and from the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office, which also collects state taxes, were placed in the mail on October 1, according to information received from both tax assessing and collecting offices in the court house.

A discount of three per cent is offered to taxpayers who pay their county taxes during October, two per cent if paid in November, and one per cent if paid in December. There is no discount on school taxes.

Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax assessor-collector, stated that the 1963 poll tax receipts for eligible voters in the county between 21 and 60, presents a problem until after the November 9 constitutional amendment election. That election will determine the fate of the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting in Texas.

Voters within the 21-60 age limit are urged to wait until after the election to buy a poll tax receipt.

If voters insist on buying the \$1.75 poll tax receipt now and the proposed constitutional amendment is approved on November 9, the cost of registration will drop to 25c and no refunds of previously purchased poll tax receipts will be made.

New Law Requires Texas Flag Flown At State's Schools

Sanderson is complying with a recently-passed state law which requires that schools fly the Texas flag under the United States flag or be restricted from state funds. The Texas flag had been flying on the flag pole of the local school long before the new law was passed.

Eagles Tromp Tigers 42-6; To Host Van Horn Friday

The Sanderson Eagles won a 42-6 victory over the Brackettville Tigers last Friday night in that city. It was a non-conference game.

The Sanderson Eagles drew first blood when John Ed Robbins made a 6-yard touchdown run early in the first period. The try for the extra point failed.

Billy Garza, Eag' back, scored from the 5-yard line and a pass from Bill Adams to Tommy Weigand made the two extra points. Garza scored again in the second frame on a 15-yard run and the try for extra points was no good.

The only score for Brackettville was also in the second period when Paul San Miguel, 150-pound halfback, went over from the 1-yard line.

In the third frame, Robbins scored again from the two and Weigand broke loose for a 42-yard gallop and score. He ran the ball over for the two points extra.

John Cates, Eagle quarterback, threw a pass to Weigand in the fourth frame, which was good for 45 yards and six points and Weigand caught a pass from Robbins for the conversion.

The Eagles led in all departments in the statistics except in passes tried and completed.

Sanderson led 16-11 in first downs; 75-40 yards penalized; and Sanderson completed one pass and tried one, while the Tigers tried eight passes and four were good.

Sanderson will host the Van Horn Eagles Friday night of this week in the last non-conference game of the season. The kick-off is slated for 8:00 p.m.
