"On a cold blustery morning in lanuary, a young man took the of office as chief executive of his nation. He was 43 years of age. Standing at his side was his redecessor, a highly respected general of the armies who just 15 years before had been in command of his country's forces when the Germans were defeated. The new executive celebrated his ascension to office by sponsoring a party that lasted until 300 a.m. The chief executive owed his position to a small min-

"As soon as he took office, the chief executive began to harass big business firms of his nation by threats. Later ignoring the legislative bodies of his country, he sought to regulate by execu-

"Constitutional government was being replaced by executive

"In order to satisfy the demands of his minority, the chief executive condoned mob violence and endorsed street demonstrations which inevitably resulted in mass arrests. The government courts invariably ruled in favor of the mobs and their leaders who were released for further use in later unlawful ac-

"Encouraged by his success, the chief executive introduced legislation favoring his minority group. Each piece of legislation as introduced with a background of mob violence and the threat of vast street demonstrations, accompanied by singing and civil disobedience.

"This chief executive established a direct communication with the Russian dictatorship and actively supported the non-aggression pact with his nation's enemies to the east - the Russians.

"Who was this man? Think! "The year was 1932, the general was von Hindenberg, and the thief executive was Adolph Hit-

verted from feed, grain, and wheat production for 1963, such diverted acres have been opened for grazing without the need of prior approval. Downward adjustments will

be made in payment to farmers who harvest hay on their feed grain and diverted acres or who harvest hay or graze livestock on conservation-reserved land.

Government - owned feed grains will be offered in the designated counties through county agricultural committees

to eligible ranchers. Grain sorghums in minimum carloads of 80,000 pounds are available at \$1.485 per cwt, for foundation herds. This price is 75 per cent of the support price for the grain and is applicable at one point of delivery by rail.

Efforts are being made by the county committee to establish shelled corn, but indications are that demands over the state are greater than the supply stored in Texas. Most all counties east and south of Terrell County have been declared drought emergen-

Texas' 46 parks drew 7,200,000 visitors during the 1962-63 fiscal year. That's an all-time high, according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Of 2,200,000 autos checked, 112,932 were from out-of state.

McKenzie Park near Lubbock attracted the most visitors, with 1,800,000, closely followed by Garner Park at Uvalde with more than 1,000,000, and Huntsville with 614,335.

Garner Park was first in campers with 172,683. Huntsville had 93,310 and Inks Lake 38,311. Parks with more than 25,000 campers included Lake Brownwood, Palo Duro Canyon, Possum Kingdom, and Tyler.




