TO ALL QUALIFIED VOTERS OF TERRELL COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID COUNTY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held on the 9th day of November, 1963, in said Terrell County, in accordance with the provisions and upon the proposition contained in the following order passed and adopted by the Commissioners Court of Terrell County, Texas, on the 14th day of October, 1963:

AN ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE QUESTION OF THE ISSUANCE OF \$140,000.00 OF BONDS FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES

WHEREAS, on the 14th day of October, 1963, there was presented to this Court the petition of more than ten per cent of the qualified property tax paying voters of Terrell County, Texas, praying for the establishment of a County Hospital, and praying for an election on the proposition hereinafter set forth; and it appearing to this Commissioners Court that such petition is duly signed by more than ten per cent of the qualified property tax paying voters of Terrell County, Texas, and that no petition for the establishing of a county hospital has been presented to this Commissioners Court during the interval of more than twelve months immediately preceding the presentation of this petition to this said Court, and that such petition should be granted;

BE IT ACCORDINGLY ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF TERRELL COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said County on the 9th day of November, 1963, such date being not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION
"Shall the Commissioners Court of Terrell County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the amount of \$140,000.00, to become due and payable serially in not exceeding Twenty-five (25) years, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding Four per cent (4%) per annum, as may be determined and fixed by the Commissioners Court, for the purpose of providing funds for the establishing and equipping of a County Hospital, acquiring any necessary land therefor, and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith; and shall the Commissioners Court of Terrell County, Texas, be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding a tax upon all taxable property in said Terrell County sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for their redemption at maturity."

2. That the said election shall be held at the several polling places in Terrell County, Texas, each Commissioner's Precinct of Terrell County, Texas, is a voting precinct, and for the purposes of said election each Commissioner's Precinct of said Terrell County is hereby constituted as a voting precinct. The polling place for said election in Commissioner's Precinct No. 1 of said county shall be the County Courthouse of Terrell County, Texas, and at such voting precinct the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election:

E. E. Harkins, Presiding Judge
Tol Murrah, Alternate Judge
The polling place for said election in Commissioner's Precinct No. 2 of said county shall be the School House in the town of Dryden in said Precinct No. 2, and at such voting precinct the following named persons are hereby appointed as officers of said election:

Dan Riggs, Presiding Judge
Jim Powers, Alternate Judge

And the following named persons are hereby appointed to be a special canvassing board to count the absentee ballots in said election:

James Caroline, Presiding Judge

Each Presiding Judge at each of said polling places shall appoint two qualified voters, who are residents of the precinct, to serve as election clerks, and shall appoint for said election as many additional clerks as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of said election, not to exceed the maximum number of six clerks for said Precinct No. 1, and not to exceed the maximum number of four clerks for each of the other said precincts.

3. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote and all such electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence.

4. The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

5. A substantial copy of this order signed by the County Judge of Terrell County, Texas, and attested by the County Clerk of said county shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with the provisions of Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended. The County Judge of Terrell County, Texas, is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the Courthouse door and in each of the election precincts in Terrell County, Texas, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within Terrell County, Texas, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed
