LISTEN TO LUKE

Newspaper people have decisions to make like everybody else. The trouble is that many of our decisions are made public and consequently are held up for criticism. And usually it is forthrightly. And we did, and it was!

Our decision to print the letter last week came after much effort and thought on our part. We did not want to print it because we felt that nothing good could come of it.

And we feel that there is sufficient strife without adding any more leavening.

But there had been too much comment about related things recently, and we felt that our not permitting the printing of the letter would add kindling to a fire, which if allowed to burn, might possibly dissipate itself.

We have some letters written to us in answer to the letter last week — one from a student in the school.

Which of the letters should we print, since we cannot devote all our columns to such writings?

We have decided on this and will take the consequences:

In an effort to try to stay away from further controversy and to keep from widening a gap of contention, we are going to try to let this issue pass without further notice. We have the letters on file and they may be read by the curious or interested. And we ask understanding on the part of those who wrote the letters, in our decision to not publish them.

We feel that no one is going to be changed by the first letter or by subsequent letters. If the line of differences of right or wrong hangs on our complete and total effort for or against athletics in our school — then all sides are wrong.

How many conversations have you heard recently about the condition or adequacy of the library, the chemistry lab, the homemaking department, the band uniforms, the facilities in the junior high school building?

How many people are concerned that the ready-writers, the picture memory competitors, the typing competitors, the tennis players, the little story tellers, and other such competitors in district or regional contests must worry about their own meals, and quite often, their own transportation?

How much time is spent in school board deliberations about academics in comparison to time spent on some of the problems of athletics.

Is there one person out of 100 who knows how much is spent on the athletic program? Or how much is spent on plant janitorial services?

Let's look at an over-all picture for a change and evaluate our schools on the type of students we turn out, rather than whether or not they had tennis balls given to them!

Odessan Killed In Car Accident East of Dryden

John B. McDonald, 44, an Odessa business man, was killed instantly Saturday night when his car hit a bridge railing and burst into flames.

Texas Highway Patrolman Malcom Bolinger stated that the victim apparently lost control of the car, the cause of him hitting the bridge, and that he was thrown from the car before it burst into flames.

Mrs. Jimmy Merritt, justice of peace of precinct 2, went to the scene of the accident and ruled death as the result of head injuries received in the accident.

The accident occurred 21 miles east of Dryden at the location of construction at Lozier Canyon on U.S. 90.

McDonald was apparently alone at the time of the accident.

Postmaster Tells Of Parcel Post Rate Increase On April 1

Postmaster Ray Hodgkins reminded residents of Terrell County that an effective date of April 1 has been set for new domestic parcel post rate increases.

The parcel post increase — approved recently by the Interstate Commerce Commission and averaging about 13.1% — is expected to yield about \$75.4 million annually.

Catalogue rates will be increased approximately 13% and will produce added revenue of about \$2.4 million if 1962 volume is maintained.

The higher rates do not affect air parcel post or international parcel post.

Postmaster Hodgkins said he has been advised by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski that the decision of the ICC will assist the Post Office Department in carrying out its objective of reducing the drain on the federal treasury by \$100 million.

The last parcel post increase was on February 1, 1960, the postmaster pointed out.

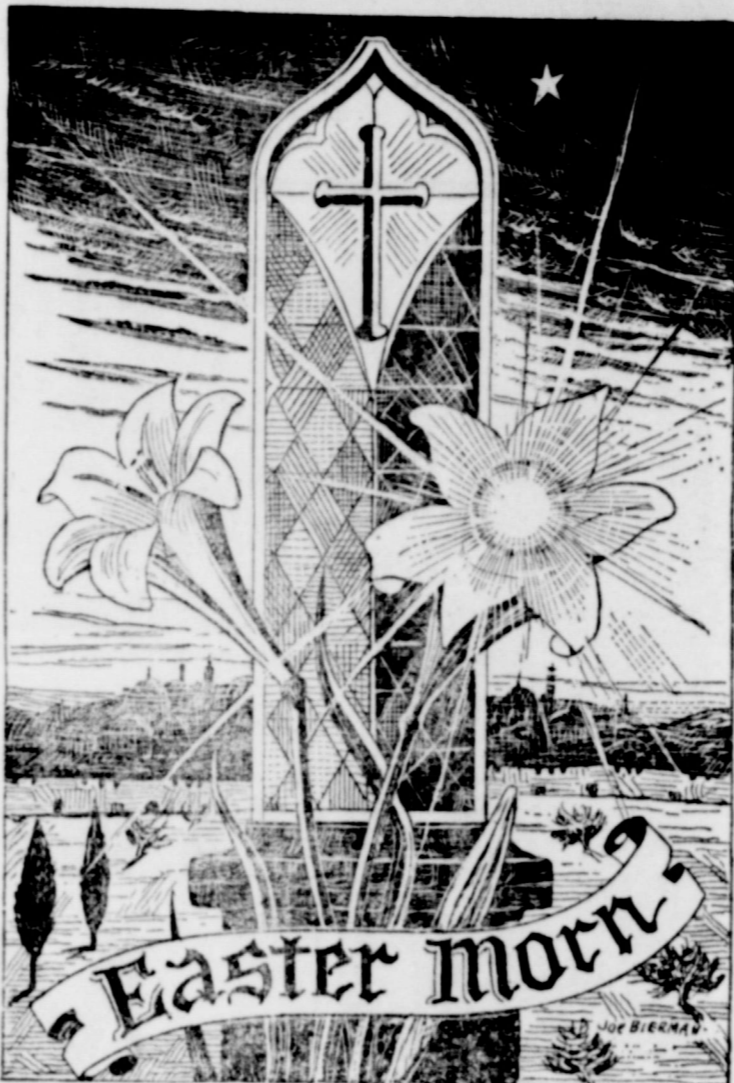

In his annual Easter message to the Protestant Episcopal Church and to the nation, Presiding Bishop Arthur Lichtenberger said (in part): "The glorious fact is that Christ did rise from the dead... Every church building is a standing witness to this conviction; every Sunday is a remembrance of Easter Day. But the church building where we worship and the day we call Sunday are not simply reminders of the fact that Jesus rose from the dead some nineteen hundred years ago. This strange thing which many find hard to believe is much more than a fact of history, although it is that. This is the wellspring of the Church's life. It is incredible foolishness to those who look at the church from the outside. But to many within, it is the clue to the meaning of life; it is the source of hope and joy. This is the word of Easter. It is not, 'Believe and you will be secure in this world and safe in the next'; but rather, 'let the saving power of God which is for all men work in you and through you.' Let this power give you faith and patience and courage; let it work in you to help bring unity and justice and order to this land and to this world."

April 1 & 15 Are Deadlines Worthy of Note

Two deadlines worthy of note will occur in April — 1st the deadline for new registration plates on all motor vehicles in Texas — and April 15 — the deadline for the new motor vehicle inspection sticker.

The same day is the deadline for income tax returns for all who did not have to file before February 15.

It is possible that the two local inspection stations would be continually busy on the inspections yet unmade between now and the deadline date, according to information available on the number of cars to be inspected locally and over the state.
