Local Competitors Fare Well In Regional Meet

Local competitors made a good showing in the regional Interscholastic League Meet in Lubbock last weekend.

Tommy Weigand placed sixth in the 100-yard dash, behind a 10.1 winner, and ran second in the 180-yard low hurdles, with a time of 20.6, only 1-second off of the winner. The effort of Weigand netted nine points for Sanderson in the meet, and placing them ninth in a field of 12 who earned points.

In the doubles tennis for boys Travis and Harry Harkins went to the finals and lost to a team from Memphis by 6-2, 6-3, 7-5 earning runner-up slot in the regional competition.

Weigand will be a competitor in the state track meet in Austin on the weekend of May 8, by virtue of his second-place win in the 180-yard low hurdle event.

Weigand is a freshman student in the Sanderson High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Weigand.

There were eight districts in the regional tennis competition. The Harkins brothers won their first match over Stratford 6-4 6-1. In the semi-finals, they won over Aspermont 6-1, 6-3.

Jodie Kay Tronson won her first match over Idalou 6-1, 6-4 and lost in the semi-finals to Wellington 6-1, 6-2.

Primary Vote To Be Saturday

The Democratic Primary will be Saturday all over the state. Most counties in the state are holding a Republican Primary but locally there has been no interest and no candidates announced in the Republican Primary on the county level.

According to information given The Times Wednesday at noon, Carlos Dunn, County Democratic Chairman, who is on the ballot for re-election, will be the presiding judge; with the other three judges listed as Rev. Bob Moon, Rev. J. C. Hancock, and H. E. Ezelle. The poll list clerks are to be Mrs. H. E. Ezelle, the precinct Democratic chairman seeking re-election, and Miss Augustina Bustos; and tally clerks will be Mrs. Roy Bogusch, Mrs. Cruz Marquez, Mrs. H. P. Boyd and Mrs. W. J. Murrah.

Balloting in precinct one will be at the courthouse.

There was no information available at press time about the clerks and judges of the other precincts, or the polling places, but it is presumed that the balloting will be at the usual places.

Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. County Clerk Ruel Adams said that 46 absentee ballots had been cast for the primary.

Candidates over the state are urging their constituents and friends to get out the vote, since there seems to be a lack of interest state-wide in the primary this year.

The selection of a Democratic nominee in Terrell County will be tantamount to an election because of the lack of a Republican Primary and probable continued support of the voters of the nominee of this primary.

Clyde Higgins, Long-Time Cowboy, Dies Wednesday

Funeral services will be held in the Methodist Church Friday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock for Clyde Higgins with Rev. Miller H. Stroup, pastor, officiating. Burial will be in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

Mr. Higgins died suddenly at his home Wednesday morning. He had been in failing health for a long period of time, and was said to be the victim of a heart attack.

Mr. Higgins was born in 1887 in Hopkins County and at nine years of age, after the death of his father, was placed in an orphanage. After three years, he was released to an uncle and later turned over to another uncle to soon begin a long career as a cowboy. Until he was 15 he wrangled horses and trained Waggoner race horses at the place near Beaver Switch now called Electra. He was later employed on the Matador ranch and then for the Harris Bros. 7-F and Suggs outfits in the San Angelo country.

In 1917 he enlisted in the army during World War I and after the war worked for the late Collins Coates on a place near Big Lake. He came to Sanderson in 1921 and went into the sheep business before buying his first land in 1926, an 18-section ranch east of Sanderson in Terrell County which was recently sold to Mr. and Mrs. Worth Odom. In 1939 he bought an 18-section ranch in southeastern Brewster County.

In 1922 Mr. Higgins married Miss Myrtle Carter and they have maintained a home in Sanderson to rear their two daughters, Mrs. B. F. Davis of Standish, Calif., and Mrs. L. G. Hinkle of Sanderson.

Other survivors include five grandchildren, Steve, Amanda, McLissa and Paul Nicolls and Glen Bob Hinkle; also a sister, Mrs. Loy Barkley of Ventura, Calif.

The Lawrence Janes Funeral Home of Ozona is in charge of funeral arrangements and the body will be brought to the First Methodist Church here Friday to lie in repose from 9:00 a.m. until the hour of the funeral.

An orchestra from Del Rio played during the reception and also furnished the music for the dance Sunday evening.


The couple left for their wedding trip to several points in Mexico and upon their return will reside in Andrews where the bridegroom is employed.
