

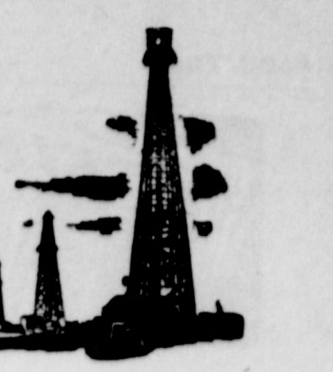

Wool Sale Here Last Week Has Some Good Prices

Some good prices were recorded in a wool sale here last week when the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. sold 473,000 pounds of wool to five buyers.

A top price of 62 1-8 cents per pound was paid for some wool in a 75,000-lb. purchase by Nichols & Co.

The low was 48 1-8 cents per pound and was a part of the 219,000-lb. purchase of Forte, Dupece Sawyer Co. who also paid as high as 57 5-8 cents for a part of the purchase.

John T. Williams, owner of the wool warehouse, stated that he was well pleased with the results of the sale which was well attended by buyers' representatives.

Traffic Deaths Increase In West Texas District

"With 35 rural traffic deaths the first four months of 1964, as compared to 23 the same period of 1963, West Texas drivers are compiling a very serious accident record," said Capt. Ray B. Butler, commander of the 24-county Midland Highwaq Patrol District this week as he released the four-month rural traffic accident summary.

"This trend in rural traffic deaths exists throughout Texas but this area is considerably higher from a percentage standpoint," Butler stated. "The statewide trend stands at an 11 per cent increase in deaths and this area is showing a 35 per cent increase," he said.

During the first four months of 1964, 19 of the 30 fatal rural traffic accidents that have occurred involved only one car. This points up a glaring need for each driver to assume more responsibility in the job of driving, as that second vehicle that usually is blamed was not enough to be a contributing factor in 19 of the accidents.

In Terrell County there were three accidents reported during April with a total of \$2,015.00 in property damage.

Fatalities in Terrell County in this four-month period totaled one with two injuries in 14 accidents, and total property damage was \$8,245.00.

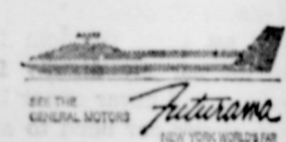



The 1965 marketing year will be the last of 11 years covered by the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended. The original

act was for four years. It was extended in 1958 for three years and in 1961 for four years.

The National Wool Act provides "the support price for shorn wool shall be at such incentive level as the Secretary, after consultation with producer representatives, and after taking into consideration prices paid and other cost conditions affecting sheep production, determined to be necessary to encourage an annual production" . . . of approximately 300 million pounds of shorn wool.

The act also requires that both appropriations reimbursing CCC for expenditures in operating the program and the total amount of payments be limited to a portion of duties collected on imports of wool and wool manufacturers.

The incentive level for shorn wool for the 1965 marketing year will be announced this summer so that growers may know the level when they are shaping up their herds for next year's production.

The incentive price level has been 62 cents per pound during each of the 10 years of wool payment program from the 1955 through the 1964 marketing years. USDA has under consideration a continuance of the present incentive price level for shorn wool again next year.

It is recognized that the United States production of shorn wool has declined from its recent peak of 265 million pounds in 1960 to 238 million pounds in 1963. Sheep numbers and wool production are expected to decline further this year before leveling off. A number of factors have contributed to the decline, including among others -- the discouragingly low prices of lambs in 1960 and 1961, competition for range, and production problems, including rising costs.

Views on the shorn wool incentive price level should be submitted to the Director, Policy and Program Appraisal Division, Agricultural Stabilization and

Conservation Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, by Monday, June 8.
