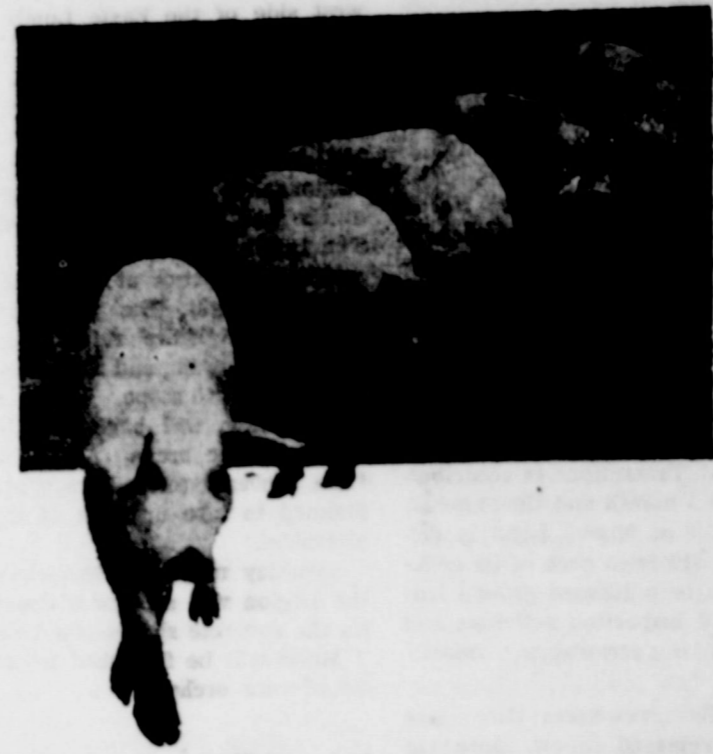
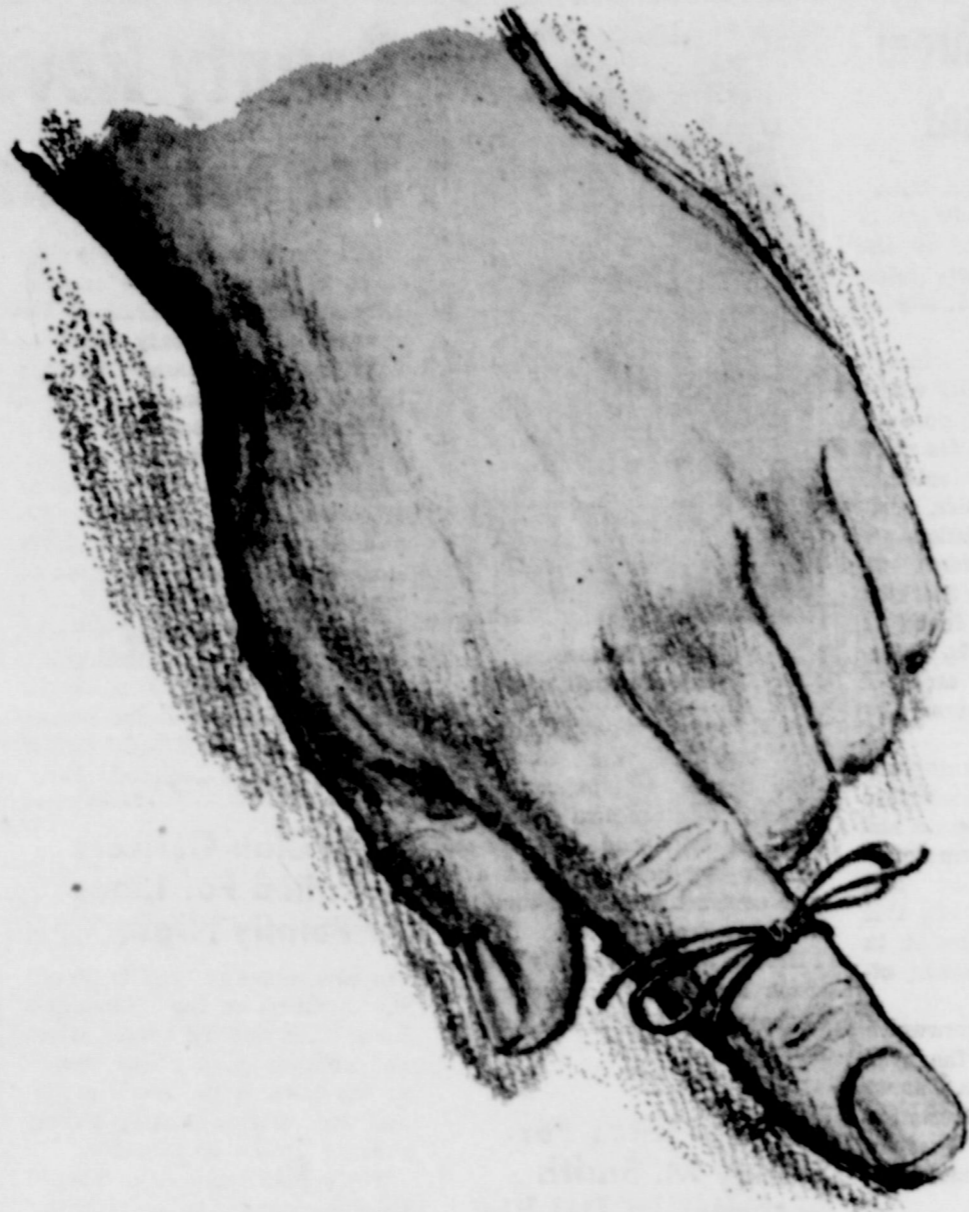

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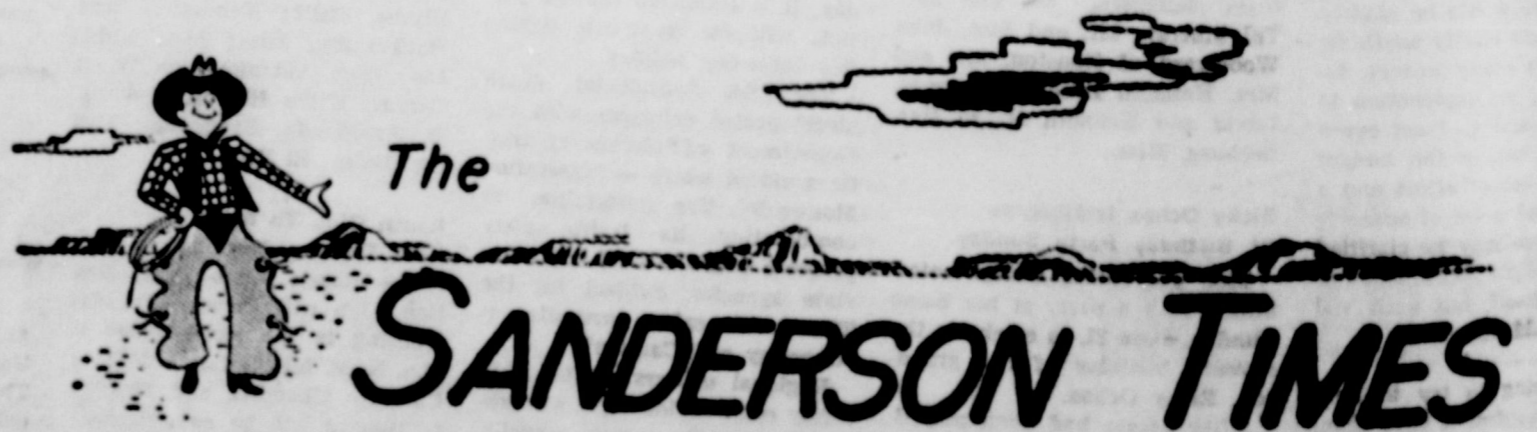

Mrs. Duncan Tells Of Mexico Trip

Mrs. M. W. Duncan wrote an interesting account of the recent trip which she and Mr. Duncan had to Mexico. Her summary of the trip is printed below:

"The Empire Club's Mexico vacation was a masterpiece of planning and efficiency. They put together a 17-car special train for the 2,500-mile trip involving three railroads, some 10 hotels, and buses and taxis too numerous to mention.

"From the moment of our departure, there was gaiety, fun and a spirit of adventure. Torreón and Zacatecas, where we made brief stops, turned out en masse to greet us with bands and a reception.

"Then we spent two days and a night in Guadalajara, a beautiful city of over a million people, the modern mixed in with the ancient. We visited the pottery works, the gold and silver artisans at work, the textiles tile, and glass-blowing factories toured the city to learn something of its history, and view the beautiful homes, the American colony. Guadalajara is a Moorish word meaning "water in the rocks".

In Guadalajara, there was the beautiful Avenue of the Americas, instituted by the Rotarians when they had their International convention there a few years back. Each Central American country was represented by a bust of some prominent citizen 'And guess who,' our guide said 'represents the United States?' You should have heard the guesses. Of course it was Abe Lincoln.

"From Guadalajara we took a side trip to beautiful Lake Chapala, 50 by 12 miles, the largest in Mexico, set high in the mountains. The ancient villages of Ajijic (recently written up in a national magazine) and Jocotepec were quaint, beautiful, and educational.

"Next was beautiful Mazatlan on the Pacific Ocean. Mazatlan has everything that Acapulco has, except the hordes of tourists and the commercialization. Here we bought some silver pieces, the best bargains in Mexico. The Taxco silver is beautiful and slightly superior to Sterling. The beach is lovely sand, no seaweed, the water wonderful for swimming, but very little surfing. All too soon this beautiful resort will be overrun, as soon as more people discover it.

"Then on to beautiful Barran-cob del Cobre, a whole day of allure for camera fans. Our train was split in two, with two diesel engines each to take us up the mountain, and through about 90 tunnels. What a feat of engineering skill, the construction of this railroad, which took nearly a hundred years to build, and finally, World Bank capital. At one place, three levels of the railroad are visible. Such a maze of curves and hairpin turns it is! "Chihuahua was our last stop. We had a day of sightseeing meeting Mrs. Pancho Villa, shopping, reception by the Governor Proxeded Giner Duran, who posed with us for pictures, and a cocktail party at the Fernon Hotel. At last it was time to board the train again for Juarez, and the customs, where we were vaccinated for smallpox before returning to the U.S.

"We found the people of Mexico courteous and charming, and eager for progress. Their culture is old and beautiful. They are our friends, unless we alienate them with our brassness and patronizing manner. For sun fun, and education, the Empire Club trip could not be beaten!"

Imports Decrease Ups Price Of Domestic Beef

Events during the past three weeks have dramatically demonstrated the need for legislation establishing reasonable beef import quotas, the president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association declared in Brady this week.

Fred Wulff of Brady said an Associated Press article pointing out the substantial increase in beef prices over the past two and a half weeks, coupled with newspaper reports of a substantial decrease in imports of foreign beef and veal during the first part of 1964, dramatically emphasizes the direct correlation between beef and veal imports and the price received for domestic beef.

"The ability of the importers to increase and decrease their imports at will under the so-called voluntary agreement so favorable to the importing countries points out more clearly than ever the absolute necessity of legislation providing reasonable import quotas," Wulff said. "The tremendous potential increase in beef and veal production which some of these countries are capable of obtaining in the future and the fact that they have no place to go with their increase except into the export trade, can bring ruination to the U.S. beef producer unless the imports are curbed by law," the cattleman added.

Wulff also strongly condemned the Secretary of Agriculture for statements attributed to the Department of Agriculture in an Associated Press article this week.

He said that if the article were true, then cattleman know no help can be expected from that quarter. Wulff referred to the news article which stated in part "material being distributed by the Agriculture Department stresses an Administration contention that Congressionally-imposed barriers to foreign beef would have wide-spread harmful repercussions on exports of U.S. farm products."

"This leads to the conclusion that the Secretary of Agriculture is willing to sacrifice American beef and the American beef producer in order to maintain a favorable balance of trade in other products. Apparently he is blatantly attempting to divide and conquer," Wulff stated. "What more reason could we possibly need for passage of adequate legislation establishing reasonable beef import quotas?"

New Auto Insurance Rates Set
 Texas automobile owners will pay less for auto insurance beginning August 1.

State Insurance Board and industry spokesmen agreed on the new rates, which will average out 1.2 per cent cheaper statewide than last year.

Board estimates that motorists will save \$3,000,000 in premiums compared with 1963. However rates will vary from area to area.

Liability insurance rates reflect a statewide increase of 3.8 per cent, and medical payment coverage will increase about 8.7 per cent. Collision coverage will be reduced 5 per cent.

Overall reduction in rates is due primarily to a 15.5 per cent in comprehensive coverage, due to low wind and hail storm damages last year.

Lawmakers Face Tough Job
 An already "tough" job faced by Texas lawmakers in the 59th Legislature will be complicated even more by "issues of high emotional content," Lt. Gov. Preston Smith feels.

These issues, according to the lieutenant governor, include: proposals to legalize parimutual betting on horse races, sale of liquor by the drink in eating establishments, control of oyster shell dredging on the Gulf Coast and an oil and gas "pooling" bill, further controls on water pollution, repeal of the poll tax and another proposed constitutional amendment to guarantee equal rights to women in property and business management.

"The Legislature will need a combination of many virtues if it disposes of all the important and controversial legislation laid before it," Lt. Gov. Smith told approximately 250 mayors and councilmen gathered in the capital city for an institute on municipal problems.

Three major "musts" confront the Legislature next year, Smith said. These include: deciding the future course of higher education, financing education and "other vital state functions," and congressional and legislative re-districting.

Traffic Deaths Up 14 Per Cent

In a mid-year summary of the traffic situation in Texas, Col. Homer Garrison stressed that fatal accidents on the streets and highways are up about 14 per cent over 1963 - which was the worst year in history for Texas traffic with 2,729 fatalities.

"If this trend continues during the rest of the year, traffic deaths will go over 3,000," he said. "We must break this trend toward ever-increasing fatal accidents which seems to have set in almost exactly two years ago. To do so, we must have public awareness of this dangerous situation and the full cooperation of everyone in saving lives and cutting down on injuries and economic loss."

The head of the Texas Department of Public Safety said a study of the present situation shows that the increase in fatal accidents has been in the cities and towns as well as on the open highways. A recent report shows that 445 fatal crashes occurred in cities and towns so far this year compared to 363 for the same period last year. The same report shows that a total of 524 rural fatal accidents have occurred this year, compared to 480 for the same period in 1963.

The Public Safety Director pointed out that nearly half of the fatal accidents that occur on rural highways involved either running off the roadway or head-on collision. To guard against these most frequent types of fatal mishaps, Garrison offered these suggestions:

1. Be sure your equipment - tires, steering gear, brakes, windshield wipers, lights, etc. - are in proper working order at all times.
2. Be sure the driver is in good physical and mental condition whenever he takes on the exacting job of driving.
3. Always be on the alert for unexpected actions of other drivers and for other hazards, such as slick pavement, pedestrians, construction areas, etc.
4. Reduce speed before entering curves.
5. Avoid improper passing, one of the major factors involved in head-on collisions.
6. Adjust speed to existing conditions and circumstances, regardless of the posted limits.
