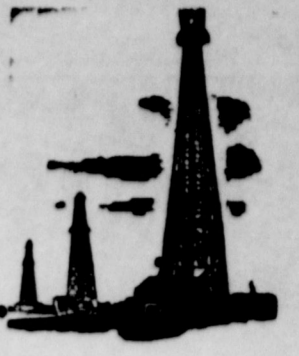

## Proposed Changes In Constitution Are Published

Three proposed changes in the constitution of the State of Texas are being published this week for the information of all voters in the state. The amendments will be presented for approval or disapproval at the November general election.

Number One on the ballot would remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund. The available school fund benefits of this proposal, if it passes, shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. The money would be distributed to the counties of the state according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law.

The distribution of funds for the use of the schools of the state would be based strictly on scholastic population, and would not take into consideration the fact that many schools of the state, particularly in oil producing counties, have an income now that taxes the spending efforts of the respective boards.

The second proposal on the ballot would establish certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts. This proposal is an effort to protect the resident taxpayers against annexations, boundary changes, bond issuance authority, or the altering of qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body.

This proposal, if passed, would offer protection to the property owning residents of certain districts in manners heretofore not stipulated.

The third proposal on the ballot would give the legislature of Texas the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals 65 years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the federal government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided further, however that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.

Solar Airlines also picks up passengers and freight on reservation from Presidio, Alpine, Marfa, Pecos and Monahans.

Another flight comes from Roswell, N.M., via Artesia, with Carlsbad planned as a later stop. This flight merges with the southern flight to Kermit-Wink for the non-stop flight to Dallas.

The schedule is planned so the round-trip to and from Dallas can be made in one day.

## Alfred E. Creigh Jr. Former Resident, Buried In Alpine

Funeral services were held in Alpine Wednesday afternoon in the First Presbyterian Church for Alfred E. Creigh Jr. of that city and interment was made in Alpine. Mr. Creigh died in a Dallas hospital Sunday afternoon following a long illness, a victim of emphysema, according to reports.

Mr. Creigh was county attorney of Terrell County for 13 years before moving to Alpine where he resided for 20 years prior to his death. He was a graduate of Washington & Lee University, Lexington, Va., and the University of Colorado, in Boulder.

He was a veteran of World War I and was with the Rainbow Division in the Army of Occupation. His son, Alfred E. Creigh III, was a casualty of World War II.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Vashti Creigh, and a daughter, Margaret Lynn (Lindy) of Alpine.

## Terrell County Eligible For FHA Emergency Loans

The following wire was received from U.S. Rep. Ed Foreman late Wednesday afternoon: "Secretary of Agriculture today designated Terrell County as an area eligible for 3 percent emergency crop loan. Ranchers interested in these loans should contact Ranza J. Adams, 201 Kellogg Bldg., Kerrville. Mr. Adams is county supervisor for Farmers Home Administration. He will be in Sanderson at the courthouse on afternoons of third Wednesday of each month."

## Longer Deer Season Authorized Locally

A longer big game season in the Trans-Pecos region has been authorized by the Parks and Wildlife Department, according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

In the Trans-Pecos region, including Terrell County, deer season will open the last Saturday in November and run through December 12. The bag limit is two buck deer in the aggregate per season of which not more than one shall be a buck mule deer. In certain areas designated by the Parks and Wildlife Department, three deer in the aggregate will be allowed, only two of the deer can be mule deer. Antlerless deer may be taken by permit only.

## Remodeling By Methodists Is Begun This Week

The complete remodeling of the sanctuary of the First Methodist Church in Sanderson was begun this week. The remodeling includes a complete change of the interior by the elimination of two closets on each side of the choir space, thus widening the space to that of the rest of the sanctuary, increasing the pulpit area between the choir and the communion rail, the installation of all new furniture in the sanctuary, including new cushioned pews, pulpit, lectern, sedalia, baptismal font, flower stands, communion table, altar cross and candlestick set, flags and flag stands, and carpeting in the aisles and in the front and back of the sanctuary.

The interior of the sanctuary and the outside trim of the church is also to be repainted. Most of the new furnishings in the church will be provided by memorials and gifts.

## Mann Thomas, Former Resident, Dies In California

Mann F. (Mex) Thomas, who would have been 59 years of age on July 27th, died suddenly in the hospital in Manteca, Calif., on July 12.

Private cremation ceremonies were held Monday in that city at the crematorium and private funeral services on Wednesday. Final interment will be in El Paso beside his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles Thomas, who brought their family to Sanderson in 1915. Mr. Thomas attended the Sanderson schools, Abilene Christian College, and graduated from Tyler Commercial College. For many years he was employed by the AS&R Co. in El Paso, later with the Moffett Cattle Co. of Brawley, California, and had resided in Manteca for the past five years.

A native of Big Foot, he was well known in rodeo circles in the west. Besides his widow, Mrs. Ruth Thomas, he is survived by two step-sons, Gene and Rodion Eglevsky of San Francisco, Calif., and two sisters, Mrs. W. A. Banner of Sanderson and Mrs. Martha Smith of Hondo.

## Religious Census To Be Taken In September

A religious census is planned to be taken in Sanderson during the early part of the month of September, according to an announcement made by the local ministerial alliance.

The census is planned to cover all of the town and the information will be made available to all denominations, according to the plans being made.

A committee composed of the ministers of the Baptist, Methodist, and Presbyterian Churches, Rev. J. C. Hancock, Miller H. Stroup, and Bob R. Moon, and Ruel Adams, Greene Cooke, J. A. ## Sam C. Harrell Makes Last Run As SP Conductor

Sam C. Harrell made his last run Saturday as a Southern Pacific freight conductor, taking his retirement after forty-five and a half years of service with the company and all of them as a resident of Sanderson.

He went to work in the local roundhouse in January of 1917, transferring to the train service in 1927 as a brakeman. He was promoted to a conductor in 1937.

Mr. Harrell was 65 on July 19, 1964, and decided that working on the long and rough trains of the past few years was for younger men. He said that he would be busy for at least a year in cleaning out garages, wash rooms, and storage rooms at his home and the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. John Neal. He plans to mix in some fishing with his work around the house and he had always spent much spare time with his flowers, garden, shrubs, trees, and grass which he will continue.

He not only has a "green thumb" but he is one who hums a tune when he works, denoting his joy in what he is doing.

Mrs. Harrell, county treasurer, finds her office work not too demanding and she will have plenty of time to share her husband's activities. They have one daughter, Mrs. W. P. Pendleton of El Paso and two grandchildren, Gary and Julie Pendleton.

## N. L. Batson Dies In Lamesa

N. L. Batson of Lamesa died in that city Sunday morning after a long period of failing health. He would have been 81 years old on August 24.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday afternoon in the funeral home chapel with the Methodist pastor officiating and interment was in Lamesa.

Besides the widow, he is survived by three daughters and seven sons, including Marion and Marvin Batson of Sanderson, a twin sister of Shreveport, La., who attended the funeral services, a brother and two other sisters; also 26 grandchildren and 25 great-grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Marion Batson, Marvin Batson and son, Craig, left for Lamesa soon after receiving word of the death.

If the survey determines actual switching operations consume an average of more than four hours during a ten-hour spread, the assignment will be continued. If the average is less, the yard crew will be taken off and switching performed by the road crews.

The study is being made pursuant to 10 days notice given by the railroad of proposed discontinuance of yard crew assignments in Del Rio, Sanderson, and Valentine.

The check is being made under provisions of Article V, Section 1 of the new work rules agreement which states:

"In the case of the last yard crew assignment in a yard, such assignment may be discontinued if a joint study indicates that the average time consumed in switching is less than four hours within a spread of 10 hours for ten consecutive working days. The 10 hours referred to will begin concurrently with the starting time of the particular yard crew assignment. If switching increases to the point where there is an average of more than four hours of such work within any spread of the same ten hours for ten consecutive working days, as previously assigned, the yard crew assignment will be restored."

Presently a yard engine crew is assigned in Sanderson seven days per week, working from 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Ryberg said that in the event the assignment here is discontinued, road crews will provide all such services as are now being performed by the yard crew. He said that extra compensation will be provided for the road crews if the switching operations require work beyond the normal mileage and time limits of their runs.

G. E. Rosenquist is the engineer holding the yard engine assignment here. A fireman for the engine was discontinued under the new agreement. At present, four yard men work here including W. F. Frazor, Jess C. Fisher, H. M. Beckett, and Richard Jones.

A costly plan for "catching up" with other states in the field of higher education has been outlined to Texans by the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School.

It will take considerable money to accomplish just one of the major tests of excellence in education — bringing Texas faculty salaries up to the national average. More money is needed for libraries and research facilities.

To help achieve goals in those three fields, the committee recommended that further college construction be delayed. By using present classrooms and laboratories more hours a day and more days a year, this saving can be accomplished, the committee felt.

Gov. John Connally conceded that it will take new taxes to finance the program which he has termed his No. 1 interest. Neither he nor the committee recommended a financing plan. Committee did say the Legislature should double college tuition, so students and their parents would share more of the cost of education.

Plan calls for expansion of the junior college system, and wide use of vocational training to prepare students for skilled and semi-skilled technical jobs in industry.

Coordination to eliminate duplication between state colleges, would be placed in the hands of an 18-member board appointed by the governor. Board would take over duties of the present junior college division of the Texas Education Agency and the Commission on Higher Education. This would put junior and senior college and university supervision in a single group.

Goal would be to make junior college training available to all and to raise its level of excellence so all junior college credits would be immediately transferable to senior colleges.

Parks and Wildlife Dept. Weldon Watson, director of the State Department of Parks & Wildlife, reports that a lot of people want state parks built

near the many reservoirs under construction around the state. He feels, however, that nothing should be added until old parks are rehabilitated.

Watson made this statement when he filed a request for a \$25,700,000 budget for 1966-67. This is an increase over the current biennial budget for \$11,000,000. Included are \$7,000,000 more for parks and \$4,000,000 more for wildlife projects.

He pointed out that most of the facilities in existing parks were built by C.C.C. workers some 30 years ago, and they're in bad shape. He said there's hardly a beam in the cabins at popular Bastrop State Park that hasn't rotted out.

But Watson described a poor pay structure as the Parks and Wildlife Department's chief ailment. He said the starting salary for game warden trainees of about \$330 a month is so low that it is impossible to recruit "men the state will be proud of."

He wants a complete revision of the Parks and Wildlife's pay classification formula so trainees as well as regional department heads will be paid in line with Department of Public Safety salaries.

College Study Unveiled Long-secret and long awaited recommendations by the governor's committee for making Texas colleges and universities No. 1 in the nation have just been unveiled.

College officials and the press were briefed on the highlights of the report by the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School. It followed a year of intensive research.

Report now has gone to the printers and will be presented to Governor Connally and the legislature by August 31.

Youth Conference Held Some 1,800 teenagers from 230 counties convened here for the attorney general's second Youth Conference. All are outstanding teenagers who were sponsored by a civic, church, or school group.

Purpose of the conference is to promote a free exchange of ideas, and then inspire the youngsters to go home and offer to help curb potential teenage trouble-makers.

Attorney General Carr, conference sponsor, delivered the keynote address. He brought

U.S. HIGH SCHOOLS' EDUCATIONAL RECORD HIGH DEGREE OF ECONOMIC ILLITERACY AMONG AMERICAN YOUTHS ONLY 5 PER CENT HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO ECONOMICS COURSES.

THE MISSING HIGH SCHOOL COURSE

America's high school students are being taught to drive cars but they are not being told how our economic system makes it possible for them, or their parents, to own automobiles.

A harsh indictment? Yes, but deplorably true. Although a vast majority of secondary schools provide driver-education courses, only a relatively tiny minority have regular courses in economics. The Brookings Institute is authority for the estimate that only five per cent of high school graduates have been exposed to as much as a one-semester course in economics.

Our neglect in this area would be understandable if we had an economic system of which we were ashamed and wished to hide it from our children. The very thought is preposterous, of course, since American free competitive enterprise is the greatest and most dynamic system in all history.

We should, therefore, be boasting about our economic system and insuring that our youths are fully aware of the principle that have made possible the highest living standards the world has ever known.

The present vacation period provides us an ideal time for schools to consider the introduction of this course.

America should not be complacent about economic illiteracy.

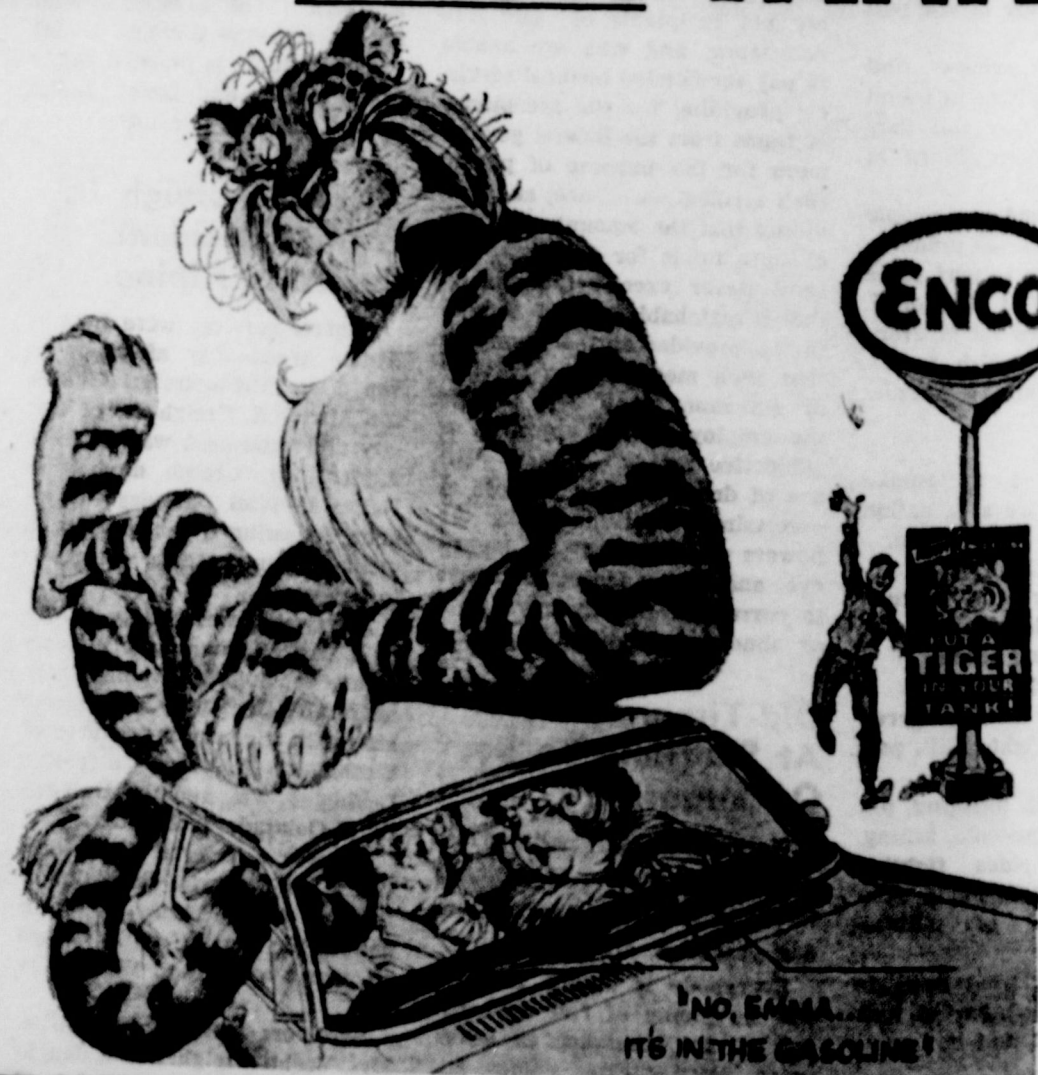

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"Wagon Bosses" representing all sections of the 60-county area served by West Texas Boys Ranch, will assist in the collection and assembly of livestock donations from ranchers who want to help in the ranch's biggest fund drive of the year.

During the week of August 24-29 every effort will be made to obtain gifts of sheep, cattle, goats, horses, and swine. The livestock will be sold at auction which will levy no charges for handling or selling the animals and all proceeds of the sales go directly to the ranch.

"The ranch needs help to provide for some 80 boys the year around," John Cargile, general chairman of the drive, stated. "Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

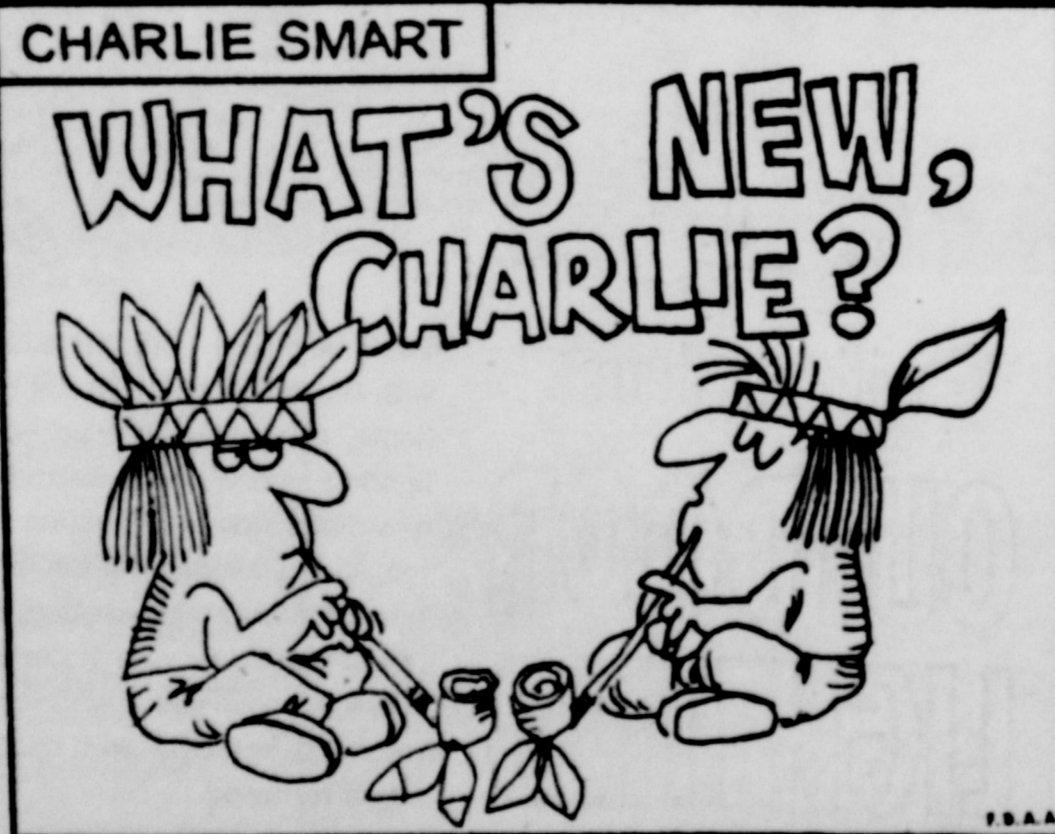

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.
