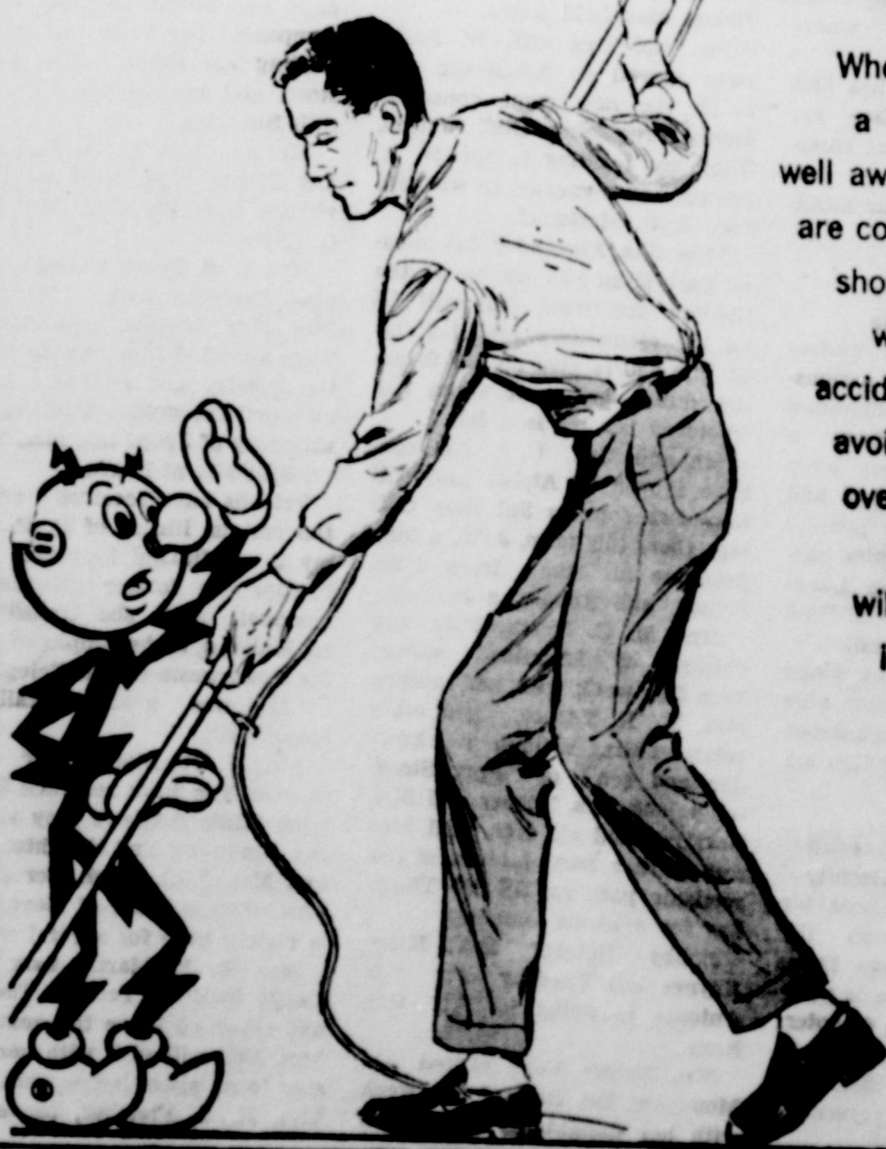

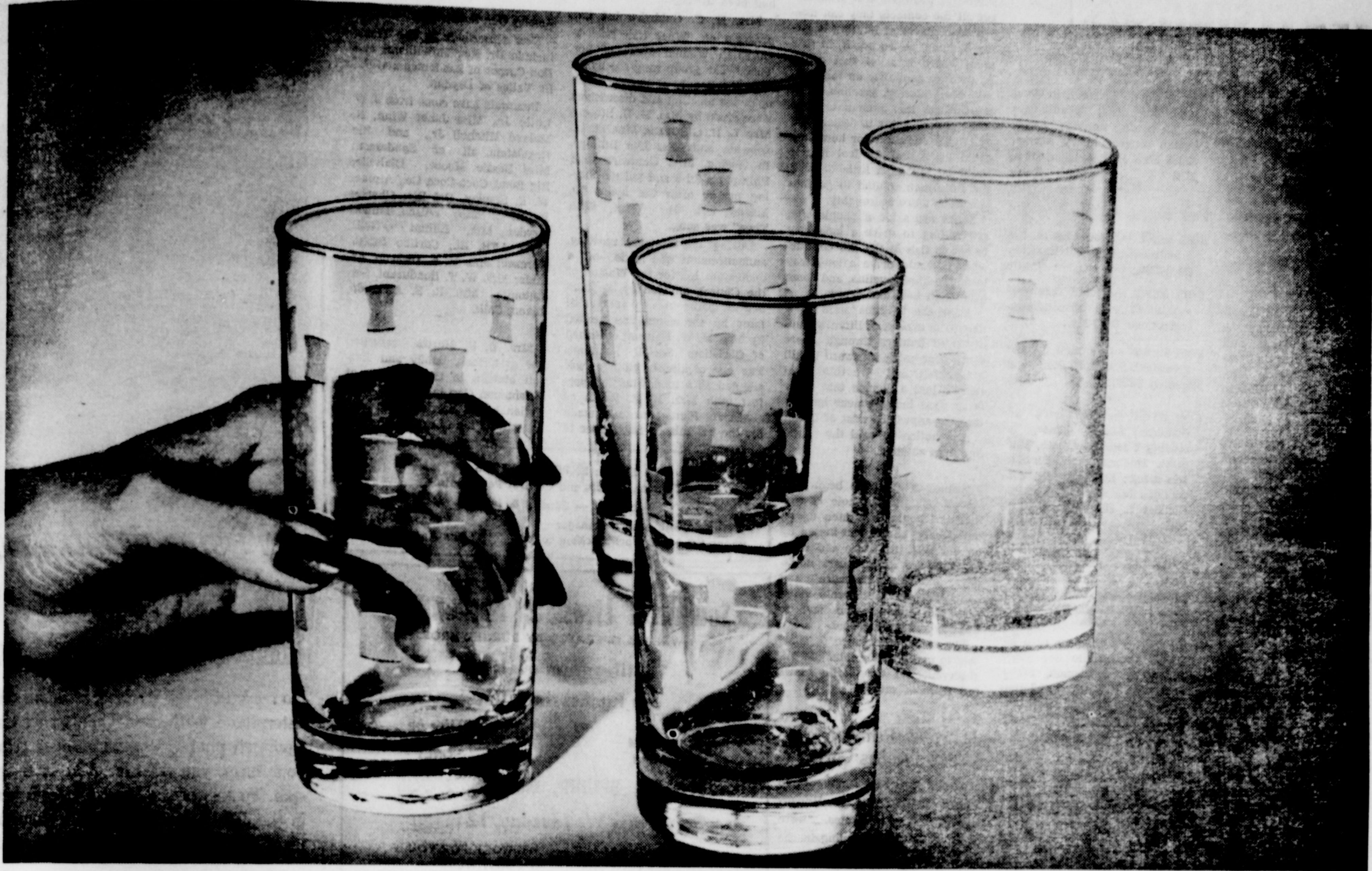

All of the "citizens" here know about the exodus of literally hundreds of hunters through here every year going westward to kill a blacktail, and we think that there's just a chance that there is as good hunting near here as there is anywhere west of here.

And notice we said the "hunting" was as good.

More and more students are driving cars nowadays, and this puts more and more cars on the streets along with the students who have to walk to and from school.

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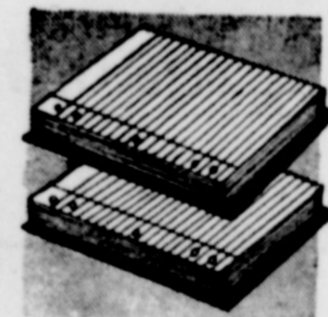

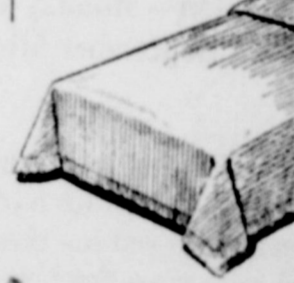
