## Rankin Slams Eagles 40-6; Open Date For This Friday

The Rankin Red Devils romped over the Eagles 40-6 here last Friday night in a conference game. Rankin had shown up well in conference play against stronger foes of the district as had Sanderson, and most fans expected a closer game than it was.

## Second and Third Proposals Are Explained Voters

Last week The Times published a critique of the first proposed constitutional amendment to be voted on Tuesday of next week at the time of the general election.

This week, consideration will be given the second and third proposals. In the second amendment is included the scope of legislation adding land, altering the taxing authority or bond issuance authority and amending qualifications or terms of office of the governing board of a district.

Those favoring the amendment say it would be a safeguard against creation of new units of government, with taxing powers, before those affected can prepare and argue a case against it. Requiring the water commission's opinion will provide expert advice on whether the proposed district would harmonize with the needs of the area and benefit the statewide water program.

Opponents say adequate notice already is given. They also argue that the amendment would add to the load of an already overburdened water commission.

The third proposal on medical care probably has received the most attention of all three of the proposals. It would enlarge the state's participation in the state-federal program of medical assistance to the aged under the Kerr-Mills Act of 1960.

The state is already participating in that part of the act that raised the amount of federal matching funds available for caring for the aged who are already receiving old age assistance. And since 1962 Texas has paid a monthly group health insurance premium to reach recipient of old age assistance plus direct payments to nursing homes.

The present program costs approximately \$30-million a year with about three-fourths of that paid by the federal government and one fourth paid by the state. Services included under the new bill would include eye glasses.

The Texas Medical Association strongly supports the proposal and says that privately purchased health insurance and the old age assistance already take care of about three-fourths of the Texans over 65. They say, too, that the Kerr-Mills Act is preferable to medical care under social security.

Opponents say that the program would place a heavier tax load on the taxpayers of Texas and that the program is not needed. Some also argue that the proposal is also a step toward socialized medicine.

## Agricultural Census To Begin Soon

Mrs. Minnie Mae Cartledge of Alpine has been named a crew leader for the 1964 Census of Agriculture. Percy R. Millard, director of the regional office of the U.S. Bureau of the Census at Dallas, announced today.

The new crew leader will supervise a team of census enumerators who will visit all ranches in Terrell County to collect official census questionnaires from operators. Enumeration of all ranches in the county will take place in November and early December.

Shortly after November 5, the Bureau of Census, an agency of the U.S. Department of Commerce, will mail census questionnaires to all rural boxholders. Those required to fill out the forms should do so and hold them until a census enumerator comes to collect them. At that time the enumerator will help to answer any questions that may have proved troublesome.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U.S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, livestock inventories, and information on equipment and improvements and income and some production expenditures.

The information will be published for counties, states and the nation.

## 22,000-Foot Wildcat Staked North Of Here

The location is 1,980 feet from the south and 2,432 feet from the east lines of section 12, Block 160 in the GC&SF Survey.

The 22,000 foot test will be the deepest scheduled test in Terrell County and is expected to hold the attention of the industry until completion.

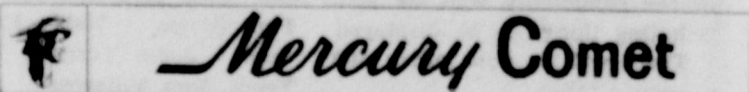

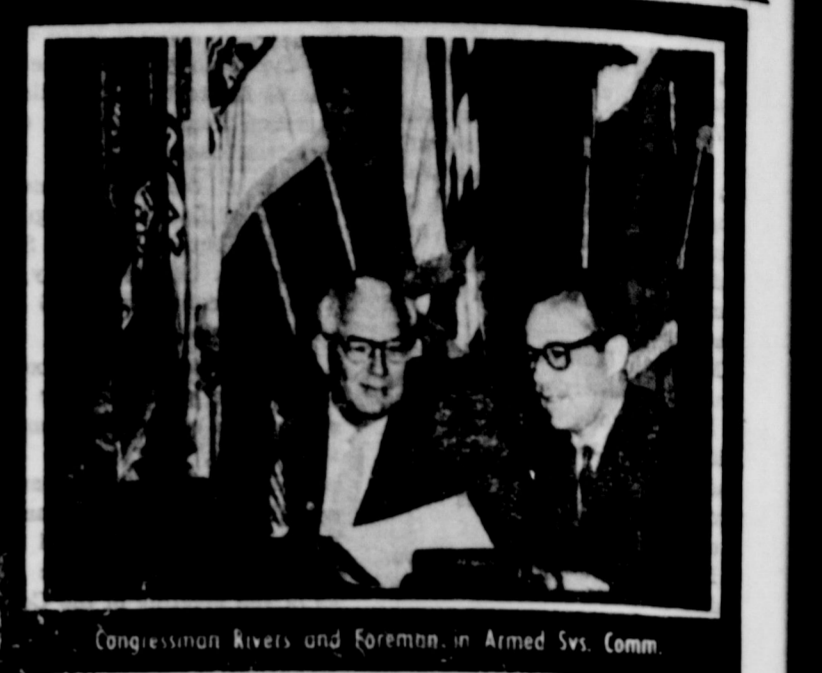

### Postmasters Urge Attention To Rules For Christmas Mail

The Post Office Department is now getting ready for its biggest Christmas mail in the history of the department. Special meetings of postmasters of all first and second class post offices have been held to discuss the transporting of mail and getting it to its destination on time and in good condition. It was pointed out at these meetings that parcels addressed with Zip Code were arriving at their destinations on time and in good condition. It was pointed out at these meetings that parcels addressed with the Zip Code were arriving at their destinations from 24 to 48 hours in advance of parcels not Zip Coded and due to the less frequent handlings of these Zip Coded parcels there was less breakage.

The period October 21 to November 10 has been designated for the mailing of Christmas parcels by surface transportation to members of our Armed Forces overseas. For airmail parcels the period is December 1 to December 10. The same periods have been designated for the mailing of greeting cards for the Armed Forces overseas. The term "Armed Forces Overseas" includes personnel of our armed forces and their families, and any civilian employees who receive their mail through an APO, Fleet Post Office or Navy Post Office.

Packages should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper and tied with strong cord. Unless they are completely packed and tightly filled they are likely to be crushed. Sufficient packing material should be used to prevent any rattling or loosening of the contents. A slip showing a list of the contents and the name and address of the addressee should be placed inside each package.

As there are some restrictions of articles that can be mailed to various countries it would be advisable to check with your post office clerks about any item you are not sure is mailable to a certain country.

Gift packages for distant states should be mailed before or during the week of November 29-December 5 and packages for nearby areas not later than December 14. Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than December 14. Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than December 10 and nearby areas not later than December 18.

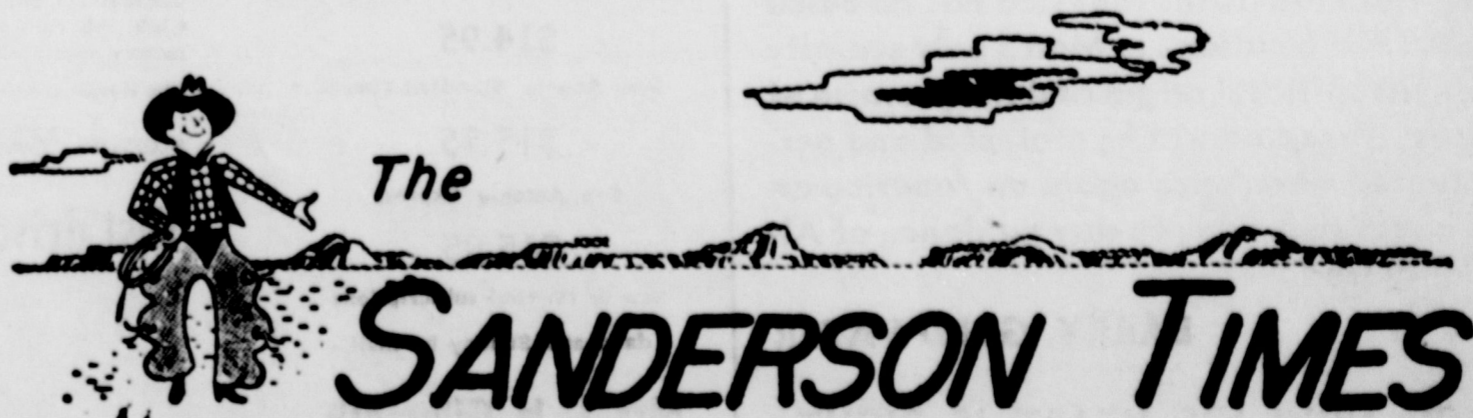

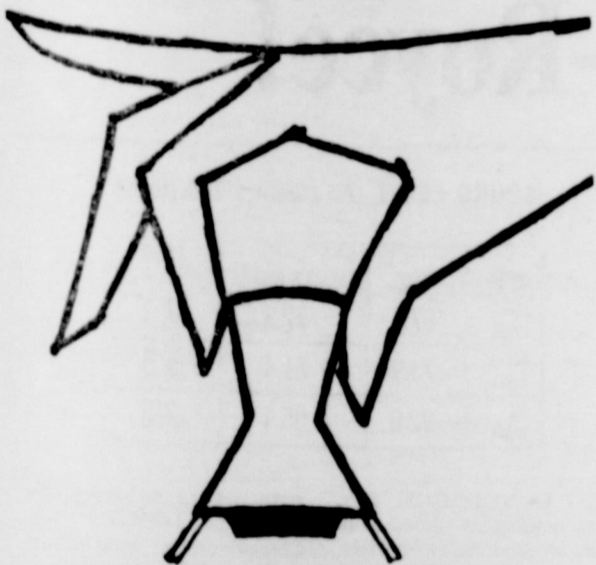
