Deer Season Promises Good In This Area

The deer season west of the Pecos River will open Saturday, November 28 and last for 15 days.

Prospects are good for a successful deer season in all areas west of the Pecos and countless numbers of hunters are expected into this area during the 15 days of the season.

Ranchmen report that deer are in good shape and the numbers are greater than in many years previously.

The bag limit is one black tail or mule deer buck and one white tail buck; or two white tail bucks. Antlerless deer are legal under certain conditions.

Grass Management Lessens Effects Of the Drouth

A recently completed economic study of the effect of drouth on ranch income in the Southern Great Plains showed that a 25 per cent reduction in animal forage production decreased net profits by 45.9 per cent.

Drouth is certainly nothing new in the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District and in all probability will continue to occur in the future. Using past data to predict the future, 58 per cent of the years will have below average rainfall and 20 per cent of the years will have less than one-half the average rainfall.

What can ranchers do to minimize the reduction of net profit during the drouth years?

Listed below are a few things that have proven helpful to successful ranchers in attempting to out-manuever the drouth.

1. Recognize that over one-half of the years will have below average rainfall and forage production will be light in these years.

2. Maintain a ground cover of grass and good brush in good vigor so that they can reduce runoff and evaporation of rainfall and produce forage with a minimum amount of moisture.

3. Stock the ranch for the drouth years and increase livestock numbers in good years; not stock for the good years and buy feed in the dry years.

4. Defer grazing on a part of the ranch each year to have a feed reserve and increase plant vigor.

Weather Can Affect The Mail, Hodgkins Says

The Christmas "rush" brings a very old quote to mind: "Neither snow nor rain, nor heat, nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds." This has said by the Greek historian, Herodotus in the 5th Century B.C. But it still is true of the postal service.

However, Postmaster Hodgkins recently added a thought, "While it is true that bad weather does not stop the mails, it certainly can slow them down."

He mentioned that planes can't get off the ground, switches on railroad tracks can freeze up. Trucks must move more slowly and cautiously over highways. And, in many places, mailmen might wish for the warmth of an igloo. Even the impish Mr. Zip can't assure next-day delivery under these conditions.

"This is mentioned to let the people know that there is a factor that we just can't control — the weather," Postmaster Hodgkins said. "It is important that people mailing Christmas cards and gifts make every effort to shop early and mail early to assure on-time delivery. This is especially true during the Christmas rush when an ever-increasing avalanche of mail moves through the postal system."

Moving the Christmas mail is a hard tiring job and the four local workers who work so diligently during this period ask for your cooperation in early mailings if at all possible.

It has been emphasized, too, that the use of the Zip Code in many cases will cut down the number of times a piece of mail must be handled and consequently it gets quicker service.

Eagles Win Over Junction In Final Game Of The Season

The Sanderson Eagles won over the Junction Eagles 12-0 in the final game of the season last Friday afternoon in Sanderson.

It was the second win of the season for the local team and Junction wound up in the cellar in district standings.

During the first period, most all of the play was in the near-center of the field, with two Junction punts putting the ball behind the 20-yard line on the Sanderson end of the field.

Sanderson fumbled on their first offensive series on the 3rd down and Junction was forced to punt on their fourth. The ball went to the Sanderson 15, but was run out to the 27. Sanderson

lost the ball later on downs and Junction was again forced to punt on their fourth down. Play ranged in mid-field during the rest of the first period.

The Sanderson defense held the Junction team to a minus net yardage in the first period and Sanderson had the ball during most of that frame.

To open the second period, there was a fast exchange of punts and on Sanderson's first down after receiving the punt, Tommy Weigand ran 45 yards for the first score of the ball and in a try for two points extra, missed the effort.

Junction received the ensuing kickoff and worked down to the Sanderson 35 where they fumbled and Sanderson recovered, but was forced to punt on their fourth down. Junction again worked down to the Sanderson 29 and drew a 15-yard penalty, losing the ball on downs to a strong Sanderson defensive effort.

In Sanderson's offensive effort, they worked the ball down to the Junction 30 from where Weigand threw a pass into the end zone which was caught by Roman Gonzales for the second Sanderson tally. Gonzales caught the ball on a dead run going away.

The try for the extra point failed.

To open the second half, Junction received the opening kickoff and lost the ball on downs on the Sanderson 26. On the second play Sanderson fumbled and the visitors had a minus yardage on the next four downs and Sanderson fumbled again on their first play offensively. After a 15-yard penalty, Junction again lost the ball on downs and Sanderson made it to the Junction 45 before they bogged down and punted to the 10. Junction had the benefit of a 15-yard penalty, followed immediately by another 15-yard penalty against Sanderson, which put them at their 49.

The visitors drew a 15-yard penalty and then passed to the Sanderson 26, ending the third period.

Junction fumbled on their 3rd down in the last frame and Sanderson recovered on their own 24. They were forced to punt on the fourth down and Junction returned the punt on their fourth down, Sanderson gaining on the punt by owning the ball on their own 42. In four plays the Sanderson Eagles were on the 6-yard line but lost the ball on a fumble. Junction got to the 25 and lost on two downs and were forced to punt again, giving the locals the ball on the 50 from where it was returned to the 31.

Sanderson fumbled four plays and two penalties later and gave Junction the ball on the Sanderson 16-yard line. Junction was unable to move the ball effectively and had possession at the closing buzzer.

Sanderson had 11 first downs to seven for the visitors. They had a much greater offensive effort and defensive showing, but had 85 yards in penalties and Junction had 55.

During the half-time show, the Sanderson Eagle Band honored the Eagle players who were in their last high school game. They included David Hardgrave, Rudy Arredondo, captains; and John Cates, Ricky Felts, Oscar Marquez, Jack Bogusch, Paul Guadarrama, and Miguel Perez.

Late Inaugural of Governor

Gov. John Connally may have a late inauguration.

Ceremonies likely will be postponed from January 19, when he normally would take the oath of office, to January 26.

Postponement, ramrodded by the State Democratic Executive Committee, is aimed at helping Texans arrange their schedules so they can attend inauguration ceremonies for both President Johnson and Governor Connally.

Presidential inauguration is fixed at January and thousands of Texans plan to attend. Many prominent political figures would have to pass up Connally's swearing-in to reach Washington in time for Johnson's ceremonies.

Besides, the President wants Governor and Mrs. Connally there.

SDEC will call on members of the Legislature to co-sponsor a joint resolution to postpone the governor's inauguration.

If a majority of lawmakers sign, the Texas inaugural committee will go ahead with its plan to push back the Connally swearing-in date. A vote of the Legislature would make the change official here on January 12.

Texas Constitution provides that the governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after organization of the Legislature, "or as soon thereafter as practicable."

Courts Speak

Supreme Court agreed that, to protect the public, the State Department of Public Safety has full authority to suspend driver licenses of motorists found to be habitual traffic violators.

High court declared moot a Starr County Republican candidate's suit to void 650 poll tax receipts in the stormy South Texas county. The GOP office-seeker claimed the poll taxes were neither paid for nor requested by their holders.

A-G Opinions

Attorney General Carr ruled that it would be legal for a commissioner's court to buy a helicopter for the county sheriff if there is enough money in the right funds.

He held that a sheriff may buy any equipment he needs to do his work, but it is up to the commissioner's court to decide whether a helicopter comes under "reasonable" expenses.

Carr also determined that, under a treaty clause, a Mexican consul stationed in Texas and bringing in liquor for use by consular officials, is not bound by the liquor import restrictions (quart per person) applying to Texas citizens.

Sure to Please: Curry and Rice



Like fingerprints, tastes in curry seem to vary with the individual. The cook of India makes her own curry powder, and may pulverize from five to fifty different ingredients to obtain just the such precise flavor she wants for a particular dish. In other countries, such precision is not required; prepared curry powder will do the trick. But the foods to be carried, the amount of spice used and not seem to change, however; curries are popular, and are always accompanied by rice.

The reason for the latter fact is simple. Whether the curry is hair-curling hot or subtle as a hint, the bland flavor of rice sets it off ideally. Rice adds to the attraction of the dish, too, with its contrasting texture and compatible color — snowy white or delicate yellow as in the Saffron Rice below.

Lamb Curry With Bananas is a Caribbean version of the classic Indian curry. Bananas as the single accompaniment and the saffron rice (yellow rice) give it the island touch.

- Lamb Curry With Bananas**
- 1 cup thinly sliced onion
 - 3/4 cup chopped green pepper
 - 1 small clove garlic, minced
 - 2 tablespoons olive oil, butter or margarine
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 2 cups meat stock or bouillon
 - 1/2 cup tomato sauce
 - 2 tablespoons minced parsley
 - 1 tablespoon curry powder
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 - 1 large bay leaf
 - 1 pinch thyme

2 whole cloves
Dash of ground mace
2 1/2 to 3 cups cooked lamb, cubed
3 bananas, sliced about 1/2-inch thick

Saffron Rice:
1 cup uncooked rice
2 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon saffron
1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Cook onion, green pepper, and garlic in 2 tablespoons oil until golden. Sprinkle on flour, stir until well blended. Add meat stock, seasonings, simmer about 15 minutes. Add tomato sauce, parsley and stand in the sauce — preferably overnight but at least an hour. Shortly before serving, cook banana slices in remaining oil. Cook lamb mixture just long enough to heat it through. Serve over Saffron Rice and garnish with the sautéed banana slices. To prepare Saffron Rice, combine ingredients in a saucepan. Heat to boiling. Stir, cover, and cook over low heat until rice is tender, about 15 minutes.

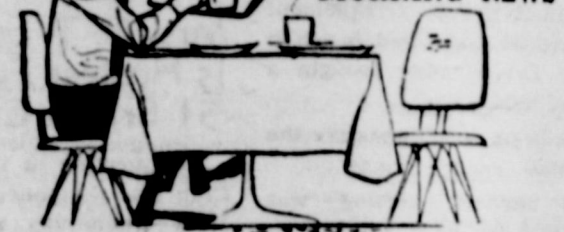
