This traveling should acquaint the students and teachers with all roads out of Sanderson except US 90 to the southwest which was taken care of in trips to Comstock already by both teams and trips to Del Rio slated for January 12 by the girls. The boys have no games scheduled with Del Rio, but will play in Big Lake, a trip the girls will not

The two games scheduled for December 1 will take both the boys and girls out of town on the same night against different teams. On some nights, co-ed games are scheduled either locally or out of town, in which case only A teams will play when they have a common opponent.

Monahans Firm Contracts Job Of **US 285 Construction**

A contract for 16.96 miles of construction on U.S. Highway 285 in Pecos and Terrell Counties has been awarded to a Monahans firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Border Road Construction Co. submitted the low bid of \$1,098,-163.15 on the project. Grading, structures, flexible base, and two course surface treatment from Terrell-Pecos County line to 15 miles north and from 8 miles north of Sanderson to 2.92 miles north is expected to take 340 working days, according to Archie J. Sherrod, District Highway Engineer at Odessa.

Kenneth Plunkett, resident engineer at Sanderson will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.


