It's "Back To School" For Students Monday

Approximately 1250 Friona area youngsters will find the summer suddenly ending and another school year beginning on Monday, September 1. That is the number of students expected to enroll in Friona schools.

Students who will be in the seventh through the 12th grades

will enroll at 9 a.m. Friday. The first six grades will enroll Monday, when buses will run at their regular time.

The first general faculty meeting is scheduled for 9 a.m. today. A meeting of all new teachers will be held at 10 a.m. Principals will meet with their

teachers at 1 p.m., and at 4 p.m., a meeting will be held of all bus drivers.

The number expected will be an increase of about 50 from last year's first day of enrollment, and an increase of 46 from the enrollment on the final day of school last May.

"We feel reasonably sure that this normal increase will occur," said Alton Farr, Friona Superintendent of Schools. He pointed out that the high school should experience a major part of the increase, due to the larger number of incoming freshmen than seniors who graduated last spring.

Last year at the close of school there were 293 students enrolled in high school, as compared to 911 in the rest of the system. About 90 students are expected to enroll in this year's freshman class. There were 44 graduating seniors last May.

One change announced by Farr is the dismissal of school at 3:45 p.m. each day rather than 4 p.m., as has been the case in the past. School will start, as usual, at 8:45. Certain things have been eliminated, such as the 30-minute activity period for high school. Meetings will be held at 8:30 a.m. when needed.

Watch For Star's Football Contest

The Friona Star will begin its annual Cotton Bowl football contest with the next issue. Football fans are urged to get in on the contest from the start, so as to have a better chance at the grand prize of two tickets to the 1964 Cotton Bowl game on January 1 and \$55 expense money.

Queen Deadline Is Approaching

One week from tomorrow (September 6) is the deadline for entering girls in Friona's Matze Days Queen Contest, Eva Miller, chairman of the contest, reminded this week.

The contest is open to girls who are residents of Farmer County between the ages of 16 and 18 who will be high school students in a Farmer County school this fall.

"We would like to urge the merchants and organizations to be punctual in getting girls entered, so as to give them more time to work on the talent portion of the contest," Mrs. Miller stated.

It was stated that entrants are not to wear corsages in the contest this year. Also this year, the bathing suit division has been eliminated, replaced by the talent portion of the contest.

Master of ceremonies for the contest, which will be held Thursday, September 12, is to be J. B. Lynn, currently manager of Station KDHN in Dimmitt. Lynn is probably better known throughout the Panhandle-South Plains area as KGNC's "Uncle Jay" a few years ago. In a special board of direct-

ors meeting by the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Tuesday night, it was voted to charge admission for the queen's contest this year for the first time. Charges of \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children will be made.

"This will help considerably on the costs involved in the celebration, and will make the queen's contest more self-sustaining," said Porter Roberts, Chamber manager and general chairman for this year's celebration.

Winners in the queen's contest will receive cash prizes of \$50 first place, \$30 for second and \$20 for third. All entrants will receive a charm suitable for wearing on bracelets.

It was decided that the girls will wear no shorts or swim suits during the talent portion of the contest. Street clothes will be worn during this portion of the contest and at the buffet supper prior to the contest.

An entry fee of \$7.50 for each girl should be mailed by the sponsoring organization to the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, Box 905, Friona.

As of Wednesday morning nine girls had entered the contest.

Chiefs In Second Week Of Drills

The Friona Chiefs, who will open the season a week from Friday by hosting the powerful Farwell Steers, are about to close their second full week of two-per-day workouts.

"The boys are coming along pretty good. I'm pleased with their progress," was the comment of Don Light, head coach.

The Chiefs will begin to see results of their hours of work tomorrow night at Springlake when they hold a practice session against the Wolverines.

On Monday, with the beginning of school, the squad will go to one-per-day workouts, beginning at the start of the final period of school, 2:45 p.m.

Senior S. D. Batze, who injured his right leg while punting during the first day, still had not been able to practice as of Wednesday. Batze was on crutches during the entire first week of workouts.

"We don't know how soon Batze will be able to work with the team. We hope he's ready

for the first game," Light said.

Meanwhile, the Friona coach has been busy lining up a "B-Team" schedule. So far, four games have been booked for the junior varsity. These games are against Boys Ranch (home and home), Hart, and Springlake. Light hopes to add several other games to the schedule.

Weatherly Out

Coach Don Light announced Wednesday morning that the team had lost the services of giant sophomore tackle Eugene Weatherly for an indefinite period.

Weatherly, who suffered from back trouble last year, was taken to a Hereford hospital for X-Rays, and was kept for observations.

The 234-pound sophomore was making a bid for a starting slot at tackle. It is not known how long he will be out of action. Counting Weatherly, the Chief squad now totals 51, the highest in history.

36 Qualify For TSL Reading Certificates

As the summer reading program, sponsored by the Modern Study Club, draws to a close, the committee reports that 36 individuals have already qualified for the certificates issued by Texas State Library. A minimum of 12 books is required. Several of the Friona readers have read as many as 30 books.

CO-OP HOLDS MEETING

Dividend Paid By Gin After Good First Year

The Friona Farmers Co-op Gin reported a net savings to its stockholders of \$43,027.47 for its first year of operation. It was announced at the first annual Stockholders Meeting Tuesday in Friona.

This is equal to \$8.42 in savings per bale of cotton ginned. The new gin reported ginning totals of 5,112 bales during its first year of operation.

"That is the highest per bale saving for any gin's first year that I ever personally audited," stated Alex Williams, Muleshoe, who has 14 years of auditing experience on the Plains.

The board of directors has authorized and paid dividends on

first preferred stock in the amount of \$6,684.76, or eight per cent per annum.

"This has been paid, and we are not in arrears on our payment of dividends," stated Ellis Tatum, president of the Board of Directors of the gin.

Tatum was re-elected board president in a short meeting of the officers following the meeting. During the business session, A. W. Anthony, Jr. and R. J. Renner, Jr. were re-elected to three-year terms as directors. Anthony was elected over Travis Stone, and Renner won over Estes Beaton in voting by common stockholders attending the meeting.

Williams presented the auditor's report. N. B. Seay, gin manager, gave a report which included figures on the gin's labor camp, which was completed at a cost of \$16,563.01. The stockholders voted to adopt a resolution to change the co-op's by-laws allowing individual dividends to be taxed, in compliance with a new tax law.

Area cotton officials paid the new gin many compliments during the evening. Those appearing on the program included Roy B. Davis, general manager of the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill, Lubbock; C. E. Bowles, secretary of the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association, Lubbock, and John McCQueen, manager, the Plainview Cooperative Compress.

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A report was presented by representatives of the Cotton Producers Institute, who gave a graphic illustration of what the \$1 per bale donation to the CPI is being used for. The new Friona gin was congratulated upon having 89 per cent participation in the institute during its first year.

Other officers re-elected by the board included D. L. Carmichael, vice president and Keith Brock, secretary.

Door prizes were won by Franklin Bauer, Kelvin Welch, Roy Zieschang and Debbie Houlette.

A nominating committee to serve for the coming year was elected. Members are Travis Stone, L. R. Hand, Estes Beaton and Charles Myers, Jr.

A total of 61 stockholders and guests enjoyed the meeting, and were served refreshments at its conclusion.

Bowling Association Will Meet Friday

All men bowlers in Friona are urged to attend a meeting of the City Bowling Association at Friona Lanes Friday at 8:30, according to Raymond Adams, Association president.

Plans will be formulated as to winter leagues, Adams says, and organizations who wish to sponsor teams are invited to attend.

Ed Hicks, owner of the lanes, points out that the lanes have been resurfaced, and are in their best shape ever. "A new finish was put on the lanes, using the finest materials available. Nothing is too good for Friona bowlers," he said.

Hicks announced that Buford Hartwick is now associated with Friona Lanes. He is filling in for Karl Kuhlman, who is hos-

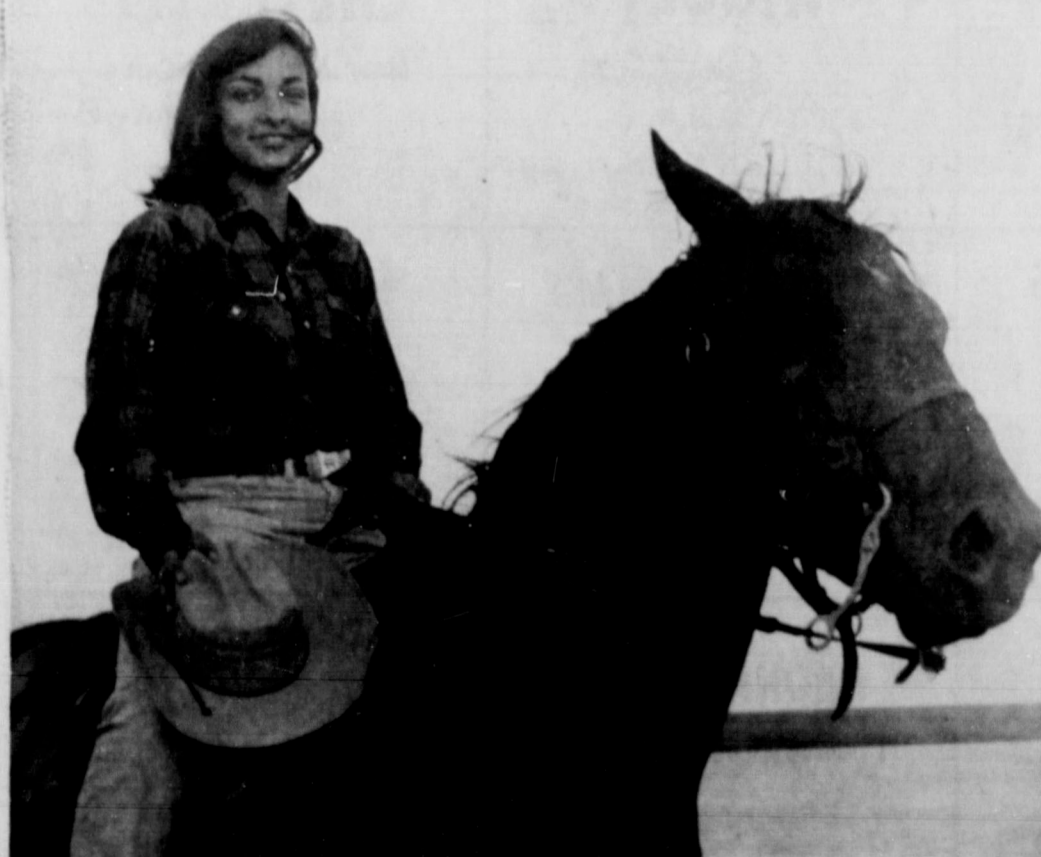
pitalized. Both will continue to work for the firm when Kuhlman returns, he said.

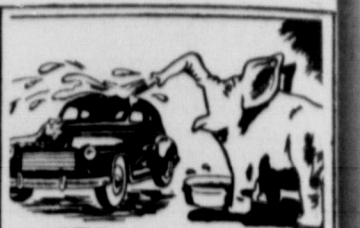

Spring concluded, July E and H Savings Bonds sales in Farmer County totaled \$712 according to Frank A. Spring, Chairman of the county Savings Bonds Committee. This figure represents only 34.6 per cent of the 1963 sales goal.

Friona-Farwell Series Has Lop-Sided Results

The Farwell-Friona football series, which will be renewed September 6 in Friona for the 15th consecutive year, has been an overwhelming success for the Steers throughout the years, a check of the records shows.

Since 1936, the teams have met 19 times, and the record shows Farwell with 14 wins and Friona with just five. Divided out, that is a winning percentage for the Steers of .737.

Farwell has won the past four games, and according to pre-season outlooks, should be favored to make it five in a row over the Chiefs, who have lost their last 27 straight games. The Steers have a host of returning regulars, featuring an experienced backfield led by big Leon Lovelace at quarterback. The "Last of the Lovelaces" has been all-district three times, and is back for one last round.

The last Friona win of the series was in 1958, when the Chiefs won 15-12. That was the last year Friona had a winning record, posting a 6-3-1 mark under Colie Huffman. The Chiefs also won in 1957, by an 18-0 score.

Farwell also scored wins from 1953 through 1956. The Steers had to pull one out of the fire in 1953, as Friona had a 14-0 lead at halftime. Farwell came out on top by a 20-14 score. In one of the closest games of the series, and another hair-raising finish, Farwell came from behind to take a 20-19 win in 1950. The Steers had trailed, 19-6 at the end of three quarters, but scored two TDs to win.

The teams didn't play from 1941 through 1948. Farwell dropped football during the war years, 1941 through 1943. They

resumed, playing with a six-man team from 1944 through 1947.

Friona's largest winning margin was a 60-0 score in 1951. Farwell took a 69-0 win over the Chieftains in 1938, their largest win. The teams met twice that year in a home and home affair. The Steers also won the first game, 12-0.

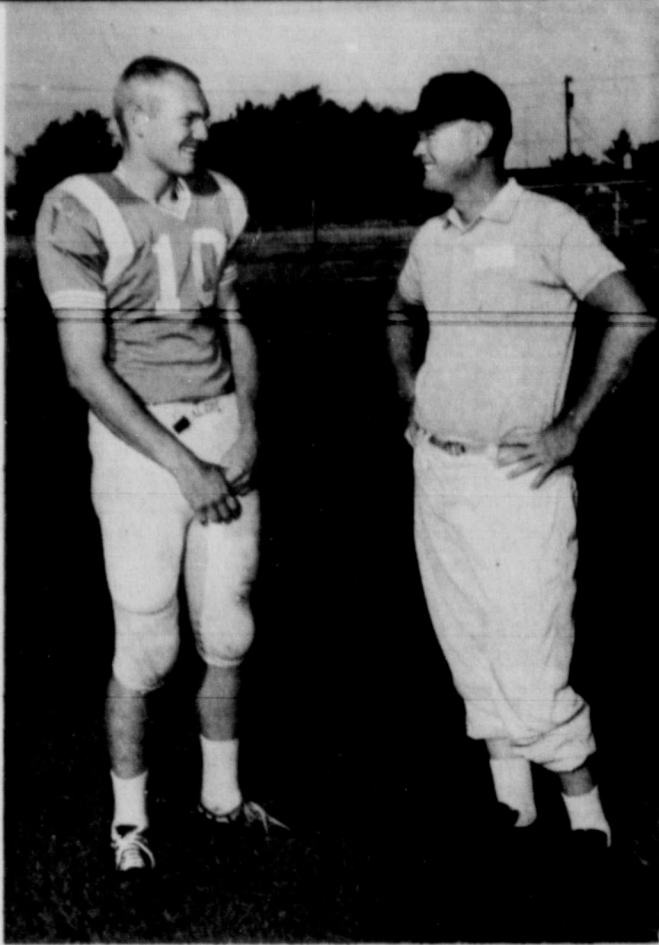
