But all of this and lower taxes and a balanced budget, too!!!

His plans for a billion and a half to go toward the education of all who will, is the one that we hope will be defeated. The idea behind it is good. We cannot help but agree that everyone should have the right to further his education to the limit of his desires and his ability. That's perfect.

We will not forget and we will always believe, that a government with the power to give is a government with the power to deny.

As you wind up the year and either get your W-2 forms or are making out your W-2 forms for your employees, be sure and notice the amount of the tax in proportion to the amount of your earnings, and the amount that it costs you to live.

We are still wondering if we can afford such prosperity as it is said that we have.

Mothers to March For Dimes Soon

"How many of our children have to die, how many more must be crippled in body or retarded in mind, how many more millions of parents must undergo this tragic ordeal before we begin to look on birth defects as a national emergency?"

Mrs. H. E. Ezelle asked these searching questions today as she sought women to assist with the Mother's March on Birth Defects during the last week of January. She is county chairman for this traditional event to climax the January 1965 March of Dimes campaign.

"Women, and especially mothers, should be outraged by the fact that most Americans are apparently unaware or indifferent to the birth of 250,000 babies each year with serious birth defects," declared Mrs. Ezelle. "The March of Dimes is offering women an opportunity not only to awake the public to this tragedy but to do something about it as well," she added.

Mrs. Ezelle said that the mothers who call for contributions to the March of Dimes will also leave a pamphlet explaining why the fight against birth defects is so necessary, what the March of Dimes is doing about it, and how expectant mothers can protect themselves.

"The funds raised by the mothers," explained Mrs. Ezelle, "will help support scientific research in this country and overseas — research to find causes and preventatives of birth defects. Money will also go to finance the network of March of Dimes-financed birth defect centers where latest treatment techniques are available to birth defect children — often saving them from life-long disability."

State Sales Tax

There is guarded talk in the halls of the State Capitol, by lawmakers who would rather remain anonymous for now, that the two per cent sales tax will be extended to cover grocery purchases when the 1965 Legislature meets. States sales tax law passed three years ago brought in \$204,736,161 during the fiscal year that ended August 31. This tax accounted for 12 cents of every state revenue dollar.

But expected demands on state resources — to meet teachers' pay raises, improvement of higher education facilities, and upgrading of other state services — is expected to be the trigger for

Also, 16 new installation, repair and construction centers will be built across the state.

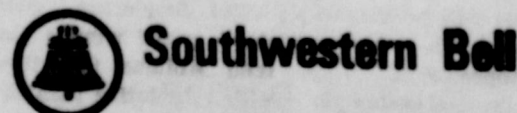

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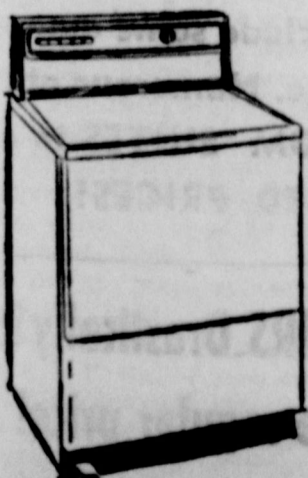
