Low-Income Farmers Now Eligible For Low Rate Credit

A new credit service to help low-income families in rural areas raise their incomes is now available in Texas, according to state director L. J. Cappleman, Farmers Home Administration.

Cappleman said the new service opens up FHA credit aid for the first time to many low-income rural families who previously were unable to obtain either public or private loans to improve their earnings.

All county offices in Texas are accepting applications for loans up to \$2,500 to finance farming enterprises, small family businesses, trades and services, Rural cooperatives serving low-income families and providing services and facilities not otherwise available may also be eligible for

credit under the program. Liberalized loan terms and conditions for participating lowincome families allow for an interest rate of 4 1-8th per cent.

To be eligible, an applicant must live in a rural area, have an income that does not cover basic family necessities, be unable to obtain credit from other sourcese, including the regular loan progam of FHA, and show a reasonable promise of succeeding in the enterprise to be financed by the loan.

FHA offices for Terrell County are located on the 6th floor of the Del Rio National Bank Bldg. with an office period in Terrell County at the courthouse on the third Wednesday and following Thursday morning of each month.

Auto Inspection Lags Over State

Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety this week encouraged Texas motorists to 'start the new year with a safe vehicle by securing the 1965 vehicle inspection sticker without further de-

The Public Safety director said that approximately one-half of the inspection period has ex pired and only about one-fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. He added that unless the inspection pace is stepped up, motorists may expect to find the usual waiting lines at the inspection staions when the

April 15 deadline approaches. The inspecion stickers for 965 have been available since September 1. allowing ample time for all vehicles to be spected without delay prior to the deadline. There can be no extension of the deadline and vehicles not displaying the new sticker will be in violation of the

law after April 15. Texas now has more than 5,2.30 authorized inspection stations over the state. According to Garrison, these stations are ready and capable of handling the remaining uninspected vehicles without delay provided vehicle owners do not wait until just a few days before the deadline.

He pointed out that he basic function of vehicle inspection is to detect and correct vehicle defects that might cause an accident. He said last year vehicle defects contributed to fewer traffic accidents that ever before in Texas.

Commissioners Act On Improvements Of Room, Vehicles

The Terrell County Commissioners Court Monday approved a plan to remodel the district court room and plans to equip

to vehicles for emergency use. Bids will be asked for the installation of an acoustical ceiling suspended from the present ceiling in the district court room. The remodeling will not only improve the appearance of the court room, but will make the acoustics better for jurors and participants in district court cas-

es, as well as for specators. A plan was submitted by Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey and approved by the ambulance committee and subsequently approved by the court to equip two additional

vehicles for emergency use. Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg has already purchased a station wagon exactly like the ambulance owned by the county and Sheriff Cooksey has a similar vehicle on order, he reported. Both of these vehicles will be used by the sheriff's department officers as their regular patrol and routine-duty vehicles, and with the emergency equipment purchased and installed by the county, may be used

as emergency vehicles. It was pointed out that in no way was the sheriff's department trying to go into the ambulance business, but that their vehicles might be used in case of an emergency which occurred while the ambulance was on a run or in case of multiple injuries in an

Cooksey stated that the vehicles would be equipped with twoway radio and other law enforcement accessories which would enable them to take care of their first-obligation duties saltisfac-

F. M. Weigand, commissioner of Precinct 1, also stated that work of repairing and patching of the local streets would begin immediately and would include protecting the shoulders of the

present black-topping. Plans for lowering the ceilng and installing recessed lighting in the county clerk's office. the sheriff's office, and the county court room were also discus-

sed by the commissioners. An order was passed to leave the salaries as they were last



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


