New License Plates For Motor Vehicles Are Available

Vehicle license plates for 1963 went on sale Monday, according to Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax collector.

The purpose of the change is to increase readability and to meet the growing demand for more license plates numbers, made possible with the change.

The six by twelve inch plates have black letters and numberals on a white background. In Terrell County the designated numbers will begin with CMX 375 and go through 999 and then CWY10 through 275. The new plates must be on all motor vehicles in operation by midnight April 1.

The available combinations under the old two-letter, fourdigit combination would soon become inadequate for the increase in demand for license plates. The three-letter, three-digit system. called the English system, makes hall, available 7,920,000 combinations which should be sufficient for some time to come.

The plate was designed so that the identifying letters and numbers could be read a a distance of 125 feet and so that the name of the state may be read from 60 to 70 feet. Since identification of the vehicle is the prime purpose for



It increases the earning exemption by \$300 to a \$1,500 maximum, and provides a \$1 reduction in benefits for each \$2 of earnings on the next \$1,500. This reduction now applies to the next \$500.

The measure also revises Social Security financing to set a wage base of \$5,600, as compared to the present base of \$4,800. It revises rates over a five-year period to a maximum of 5.2 on employees and 7.8 per cent on selfemployed persons.

It increases matching aid for the needy, blind, and disabled, and increases carning exemptions for old-age assistance programs.

Physicians are not covered. Tips are not included as wages, Firemen and policement with existing state and local retirement plans are not covered. Certain religious groups which make provisions for their own members are not covered.

The bill proportionately increases those railroad retirement benefits which are tied to Social Security rates. It liberalizes the definition of "dependent child," and the disability insurance definition of blindness.

Tower said the bill was offered to cover "the cost-of-living increase of recent years"

"I have not included in this bill the controversial medical care proposals which prevented its passage last year. I hope that those proposals will receive the separate consideration they need and deserve. In the meantime, I do not believe we can delay further in granting to Social Security beneficiaries the cost-of-living increases they so desperate need".

T.S.T.A. Airs **Views On Raise** In Salary Plan

The legislative committee of the Texas State Teachers Association this week commended Gov. John Connally for his recognition that salaries paid Texas public school teachers are in need of marked improvement.

But the committee reaffirmed its support of TSTA's \$45 per month salary increase proposal which already has 92 co-signers in the House of Representatives and substantial support in the Senate.

Teachers would get less money under the governor's program, and local school district would have to pay about 90 per cent of what they do get, said Joe B McNeil, Wichita Falls school superintendent who is TSTA legislative chairman.

McNeil stated that the proposals of the governor are inadequate for the immediate and long-range needs of teachers.

Under the TSTA "45 for '65' salary plan, the state would contribute about \$34 million a year and local districts about \$8.5 million yearly.

McNeil said this added load to local districts would do two things: (a) require local school board to add heavily to the already overloaded ad valorem tax burden on local homes and buslinesses and (b) as a result, reduce local capacity to pay salaries higher than the present minimum scale and continue improvements in the school program.

McNeil pointed out the local school boards can raise money only by taxing local property. while the state has many tax resources.

The TSTA plan call for a \$405 annual increase in the minimum salary schedule for teachers. which now starts at \$4,014 and goes to a top of \$6,075 for a master's degree teacher with at least 17 years' experience. The average salary paid Texas teachers this year is estimated at \$5,461, almost \$800 below the national average. TSTA would expect to ask for additional increases during the next 10 years.

The Connally plan, McNell said, would provide only \$480 over a 10-year period to a new teacher beginning next fall, or \$48.60 a year. The highest amount any teacher could receive would be \$1,296 within 10 years, or \$123 60 per year average. This compares with average annual national increases of \$200 to \$280





McNeil pointed out that Texas has been slipping behind the national average of teacher salaries by almost \$200 per year. With an average salary increase of \$129 per year or less, as proposed, Texas would remain \$800 below the average and continue to drop further behind at the rate proposed by the governor.

TSTA has always aproached the legislature, the governor. and other state officials in a spirit of cooperation and teamwork to solve the problems facing our public schools," McNeil said This is our desire now."

"The TSTA salary program is not the final solution, but it offers much more than the governor proposes. We believe that the legislature and the governor will agree with us upon further study," he concluded.


