LISTEN TO LUKE

The proposal of President Lyndon B. Johnson to have federal supervisors at all elections to be sure that all who are eligible to vote can — is about 30 years too late. There should have been federal supervision in Duval County about then.

There is the constant tendency toward giving the federal government more and more power and authority. This is being done in many different ways and under many different guises.

We are about to become a nation of laws under the policing of federal agents to control so many of our actions.

Governor John Connally, who alienated the attentions of LBJ during the last election — and, conversely, is going along with the trend toward federalization by his proposal for the teachers' pay raise and its associated gimmicks.

The Texas State Teachers' Association and many, many of the district are opposing the governor's plan vigorously. The teachers say they would rather not get the raise than get the proposal advocated by the governor. Taxing agencies of the school districts, property owners, and big companies paying taxes to the schools are alarmed and concerned over the proposal of the governor's plan.

His plan would cost the districts more money — taxes — and at the same time would not give the teachers as much of a pay raise as they would get under their own proposal which would not be so expensive to the taxpayers.

There has been a lot published in the daily newspapers about the two proposals, and there will be more said in this paper concerning details of the two proposals. If you are not aware of the details of the two, please acquaint yourself with them and urge your state representatives to support your ideas on them, whatever they may be.

This will be decided in the legislature, one way or another, and only your letters to your representatives and state senators will make your voice heard in the issue.

In the past several years, there has been four or five pieces of mail come to this office either marked for our attention, or in the form of a letter or note expressing an opinion. These mailings have not been identified by sender and they get no more consideration than an immediate toss into the waste basket. If you want us to read, make comment, notice, or publish something, put your name on it. If you are too ashamed of it to sign it, we would be too ashamed to notice it.

The work being done at the court house is greatly improving its appearance as well as usefulness. We also are proud to notice the work being done on local streets and commend the commissioners' court for getting the things done.

We hope that money and possibility for more such action will be available.

Remodelling Of Some Rooms In Court House Done

The remodeling of some of the rooms in the Terrell County court house is being completed this week and some additional work is planned and will begin probably next week.

A suspended ceiling has been installed in the sheriff's office, the school tax assessor-collector's office, the county clerk's office and in the county court room on the lower floor. The ceilings have recessed lights which add to the appearance of the ceilings.

The commissioners also approved the enlarging of the vault adjacent to the county clerk's office to take in the room now being used by the Lemons Abstract Co. This was deemed necessary because of the crowded condition of the present vault which stores all the records of the county.

The entrance door to the office will be sealed and a door made between the present vault and the acquired room. The window will also have burglar and fire-proof bars and panel installed.

Improvements have also been made to the plumbing in the men's rest room on the main floor of the court house.

Ranchers Urged To Send Money For Fly Program

Terrell County ranchmen are urged to contribute to the support of the screwworm eradication program again this year, according to N. M. Mitchell, Terrell County chairman of the program.

The program is asking for only \$4,304.00 from county ranchmen this year, according to Mitchell, compared with more than \$20,000 sought and attained last year. He pointed out that the request for funds now is to keep the program going until July when the program will be taken over by the federal and state government.

Mitchell stated that now the state funds were \$250,000 and \$550,000 in federal funds for the interim fly program.

Mitchell also pointed out that the asking this year is based on 10c per animal unit (1 cow or 5 sheep), as compared with 50c per animal unit last year. Mitchell stated that it would be appreciated if those ranchmen who have decreased livestock or have no stock would make a small contribution so that the total goal will be reached. He said that it would be a question whether or not there was enough livestock in the county to reach the quota on the basis of 10c per animal unit and all who were interested in the program would be doing a great favor if they could see fit to support it by their contribution.

Checks may be given or mailed to Troy Druse, treasurer of the county fly eradication committee, or to Mr. Mitchell.

The livestock industry leaders are hopeful that Congress will approve a U. S. Department of Agriculture request for \$5-million to continue the program after July 1.

Eradication experts have estimated that during April, May, and June, which in the past has been a time of heavy screwworm activity, 100 million sterile screw worm flies will be needed each week to keep fertile insects from Mexico from reinfesting the Southwest where the livestock pest has been eradicated through use of the sterile male fly technique.

Completion Try Is Set On Graham Project

A completion attempt is slated by Great Western Drilling Co., Midland, on the Della Graham No. 1 in section 29 of Block 1, I&GN Survey in Terrell County.

The well is in the extreme northeastern part of the county. The driller plugged back to 6,575 feet and was preparing to run

casing and test the Wolfcamp prospect.

A 30-minute straddle-packer drillstem test in the Strawn between 8,350-558 feet, recovered 1,767 feet of drilling mud. A deep failure, it was drilled to 10,450 feet.

Wolfcamp production was indicated with the flowing of gas at the daily rate of 1,385,000 cubic feet and 15 to 30 barrels of oil in 30 minutes when drilling had reached 6,227 feet. A drillstem test between 6,215-232 feet flowed gas, no gauges, and oil in two hours and 40 minutes, making 9.8 barrels of oil in two hours. Recovery was an additional 14.3 barrels of oil, 19 feet of gas and 180 feet of gas- and oil-cut mud.

Mr. McAllister is presently the principal of the Fort Stockton High School and has been in the system in Fort Stockton since 1957. He has coached for 18 years.

Mr. McAllister is a native of Illinois where he attended a junior college and received his BBA from Northwestern University, in Illinois, and his MA degree from Sul Ross College.

Mr. McAllister is a veteran of World War II, and has taught in Alpine, Eldorado, and San Angelo.

Health Legislation

Sweeping new concepts for treatment of tuberculosis, mental illness and mental retardation are about to be written into Texas law.

Bills overhauling the entire

state organization for dealing with these vast problems soon may be sent to Gov. John Connally for signature.

House passed 142-0 an amended version of legislation already approved by the Senate to set the TB eradication program in motion.

A separate bill to establish a new Texas Department of Mental Health and Retardation cleared the House 139-1 and was sent to the Senate.

The tuberculosis control measure would shift all TB hospitals and programs from the Board of Hospitals and Special Schools to the Texas Department of Health.

Board all mental hospitals and special schools for the retarded, moving them to the new department.

Both emphasized community-centered attacks on the problems at hand.

Experts maintain that case-finding, long-term follow-up care and contract care of patients close to home can virtually eliminate tuberculosis. Proposed \$22,300,000 six-year program will begin in the San Antonio-Central-South Central Texas area and in counties along the border from El Paso to Brownsville.

Community care centers to treat mental patients close to the cities they live in rather than big hospitals far away are heavily relied on for major progress in the mental health field.

Horses Booked. Odds are long against the horse race betting advocates this session, but they will provide one of the Legislature's most colorful shows.

On March 29 the House State Affairs Committee will hear a bill to legalize parimutuel betting on supervised tracks. Bill is backed by the Texas Racing Association.

A constitutional amendment has been introduced which would outlaw parimutuel (in a pool) betting and all other forms of gambling in the state.

Budget Conferees Take Over. Whether Texans will face substantial new taxation to finance expanding state services rests largely with 10 top lawmakers.

Budget writing was checked to a joint conference committee of senators and representatives after the Senate, without discussion, passed a \$3,650,000,000 appropriations measure. It called for \$617,000,000 in general revenue spending.

Senate version is \$13,000,000 above the House-passed bill in general funds earmarked for the 1966-67 biennium. Both houses left money "on the table."

Senate bill is \$14,000,000 below anticipated income; House bill is \$25,000,000 below. But there are plenty of claims for the leftover.

Amount of the school teacher pay raise approved after the general budget finally is adopted is the real key to the magnitude of a tax bill. But recommendations of the conferees — likely to be approved by both houses — will determine just how much of the foreseeable revenue is left to apply toward better salaries for teachers and other new spending demands.

Beer-Liquor Interests Clash. One of the hottest floor fights of the session was waged over a bill which found beer and liquor interests on opposite sides and "wets" and "dries" somewhat confused.

Liquor store operators bitterly opposed a measure by Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham, which they contend permitted wholesale beer distributors to sell ale and malt liquor directly to consumers.

Mutscher said the two beverages should be treated as beer under state statutes, since they are made by breweries, not distillers.

After prolonged debate in the House an unsuccessful attempt was made to tack an amendment on the bill to raise the beer tax \$1 a barrel.

Mutscher's bill finally passed 90-44 and went to the Senate for

another round.

Pickups May Speed Up

House has approved and sent to the Senate a bill permitting pickup trucks to travel 70 miles an hour on Texas highways instead of the present 55 mph limit.

ups may be driven with a regular operator's license. Some law enforcement agencies (not the Texas Highway Patrol) contend that drivers of pickups must have a commercial license. They say the law is not clear on the point. Bill cleared committee and is on the House calendar.

Property Titles Unclear

Rep. Forrest Harding of San Angelo believes that no Texan can be sure he has a clear title to any of his personal property because present law permits the state to get a preferred lien without notice on any property which has gone through the hands of a person in arrears on his taxes.

Harding said the state can do this regardless of how many times the property has changed hands.

He has introduced a bill which would provide for handling of personal property liens in the same manner that liens on real property now are handled, including filing of a notice with the county clerk. No lien would be effective on personal property before the filing of such notice.

Vocational Education Plan

A bill has been introduced calling for a statewide plan to take maximum advantage of federal funds for vocational and technical education.

Bill would make the State Board for Vocational Education, established in 1949, the coordinating agency for setting up standards and requirements for school districts which want to set up a vocational and technical school or a vocational and technical school district with state and federal participation.
