Twelve-months wool brought from 47 to 55 3-4 cents per pound in the grease, and the range of prices for eight-months wool, grease basis was from 42 5-8 to 50 5-8 at the sealed bid sale of wool here Tuesday, John T. Williams, manager of the Sanderson Wool Commission Co., said that about 310,00 pounds of 12-months fleeces and about 230,000 pounds of eight-months fleeces were offered and that less than 10,000

pounds were rejected. The prices were some lower than the prices paid at the sealed bid sale here about a month ago. Most of the 12-months wool sold Tuesday brought from 49 to 53 cents per pound and the bulk of the eight-months wool ranged from 47 to 50 cents per pound,

#### 'Americanism' Paper Published

The following is a prize-winning essay on "Americansim" by Candace Cooksey.

'Americanism is a word that most students hear about a great deal. Some connect it with the flag and its glorious beauty, but this is only symbolic. To me it is our way of life. It is something that every American takes for granted. Good Americanism could and should improve our lives, but too often it is accepted in a casual way.

Freedom of speech, press, and religion are privileges we enjoy that had a great deal to do with the beginning of our country. To me, Americanism is a thing that can be felt rather than seen, such as the swelling of pride after a presidential election; the rise to the call of the March of Dimes; pledging allegiance to our flag; the Yankees or Dodgers winning the world series pennant; or just being able to walk to the corner and buy a hot dog. The most outstanding example in my mind is the assassination of the late President John F. Kennedy and the way every American, whether political friend or foe, joined his fellow Americans in mourning. I believe this event, more than any other that has occurred in our lifetime, has greatly influenced the thinking of American youth.

It is my hope that the feeling of Americanism will persist and grow stronger as I grow and mature and am, perhaps, able to help further its cause. In time, I sincerely hope that we will have less cause to worry about wars and feuds between fellow men, regardless of race, color, or creed. Americanism will truly have reached its peak when we put into practice the Golden Rule-"Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Hodgkins explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and rern it to the letter-drop. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poul

try holdings." After studying the cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the state's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets. This information is said to guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions.



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


