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WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

One of the best kept secrets in the world apparently is how many people are being laid off due to automation in nation's huge industrial complexes.

The big corporations themselves presumably do not want to release this type of information as public dissemination of it would only trigger more demands by the labor leaders to increase "feather bedding" processes. The labor leaders have a pretty good idea, if from no other source than the drop off of dues payers. But of course, they are in no political position to release such figures.

The best estimates indicate that at the present time, some 40,000 workers are being replaced each week by machines.

On the reverse side of the coin is the information being developed by continuous surveys being conducted by the National Federation of Independent Business.

There are being developed the statistical studies showing that in 1964 some 30% of the nation's 4,500,000 independent business firms did expand, and in so doing, created between 3 and 4 million new jobs.

Thus, the slack created by automation has been so far taken up by the independent business firms.

The fact that unemployment continues at a high level can be accounted for that in addition to the workers laid off by automation, new workers are coming into the potential working force.

Federation surveys also indicate that a greater expansion of small business, and hence jobs, will take place when the Great Brains of the Great Society learn what actually creates jobs.

Washington bureaus abound with degree holders. There is nothing wrong with education, but scholastic theories should be leavened by some practical experience and knowledge.

And it is on this score that the government is failing completely to solve the unemployment problem.

A few simple laws and regulations which would unleash the potent force contained in the aspirations of the independent entrepreneur would take care of the problem.

This then becomes the real problem. Or expressed in another way, the problem is one of people who have practical economic experience making their viewpoint heard so loudly in government, that they offset the untried and unsound theories being expounded.

The unemployment problem cannot be much longer handled by theory, for this government, nor any other government, can successfully cope with hordes of unemployed. It is questionable that anyone can fiddle with a Phi Beta Kappa key while Rome burns.

A Facial For Mt. Rushmore



A crew of daring specialists from the National Park Service will climb 8,050-foot Mt. Rushmore in South Dakota's Black Hills this spring to give the granite countenances of Presidents Washington, Jefferson, "Teddy" Roosevelt and Lincoln their annual "facials." Strangely, the basic ingredients in these treatments is linseed oil, the same material used by Egyptians 5,000 years ago to preserve their mummies and today the ingredient in house paint that protects against sun and weather, according to research experts of the National Flaxseed Processors Association. Preservation of the giant carved faces—each 60 feet long—is a large undertaking. The repair experts patch cracks resulting from weathering with Sculptor Gutzon Borglum's original compound, a mixture of linseed oil, white lead and granite dust, so future generations can admire this memorial to our great presidents.

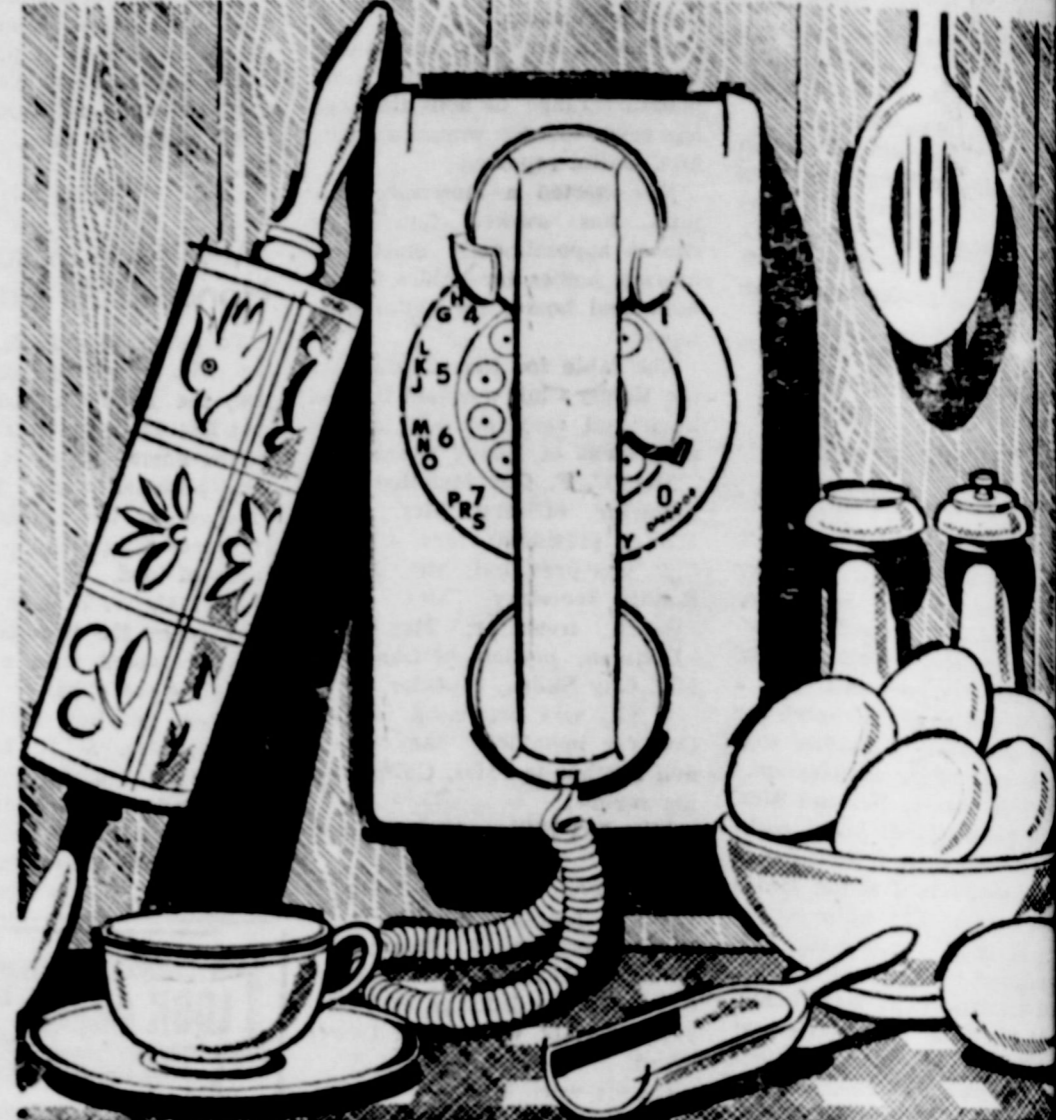

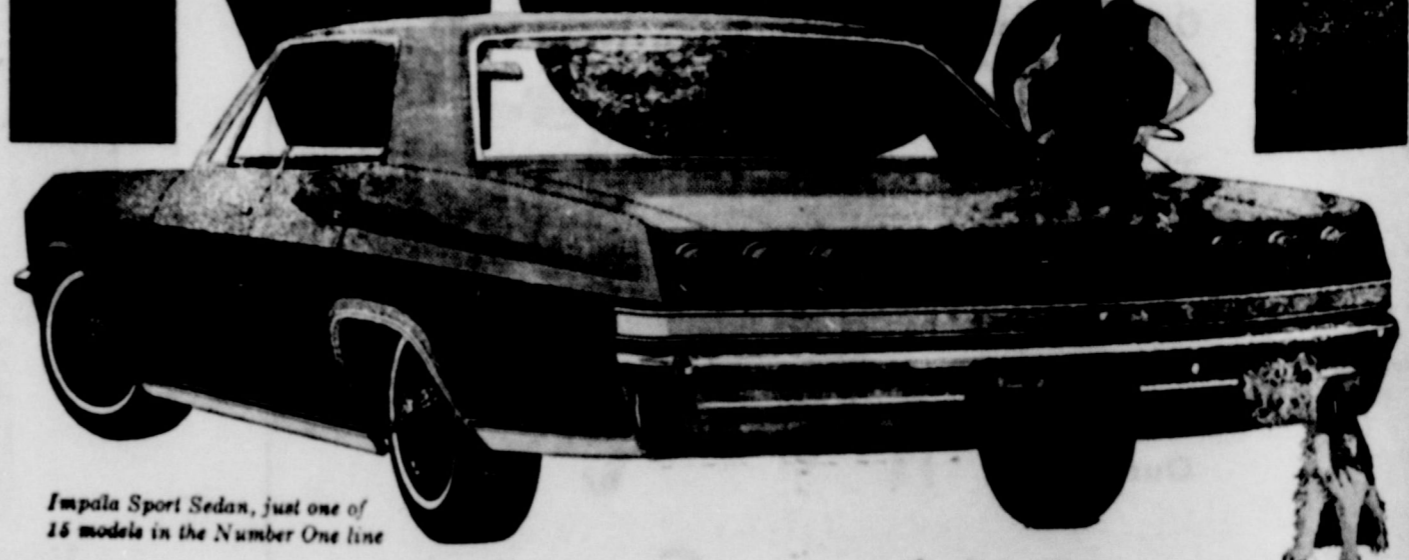
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
