

## **General Rains Hit This Area**

General rains hit this area on Sunday night leaving up to three and one-half inches of moisture in some rain gauges.

The hard-blowing rain began falling locally shortly after midnight Sunday and another, gentler rain, fell before dawn.

Creeks and draws over the county were running full, but there was no stopping of traffic for an extended period except on the Dryden-Sheffield road where there are several low crossings. The rainfall has been followed by several days of cloudy, foggy and cool weather which has aid

Rain. Rain. Rain. This is the prime topic of conversation during the summer months in Sanderson. Rain probably stimulates more ulcers, and sprouts more grey hair than any factor in the ranching industry. It also has the ability to paint very happy faces and germinate many plans when it comes.

The lack of moisture is quite often unjustly blamed for the slow rate of range improvement. Local rainfall records bear out a very stimulating fact. On the averae, approximately six of ten years, rainfall is well below the expected average of 11.29 inches. This holds true even if the drouth years are excluded from the records. There are probably the many years that those of us connected with ranching live in anticipation of an exceptionally good season, Range improvement has been very slow since the extended drouth of the '50s, but the average rainfall for the past eight years has been 12.01 inches. Also the eight year average, through May, has been 3.65 inches. This doesn ot differ appreciably from the 4.21 inches prior to the drouth. This indicates annual and spring rains are holding very near the average. The culprit, then, to be accused for slow range improvement, should be as much the lack of ground cover as the weather. This lack of cover causes rapid runoff and severely reduced penetration which starves existing plants. In order to combat the real villian, a more moderate stacking rate must be established through a flexible herd of animals. Livestock numbers should be reduced in greater numbers during dryer years, and increased for the wetter ones. Then ground cover, range improvement, and rainfall penetration will increase at the desired rate.
