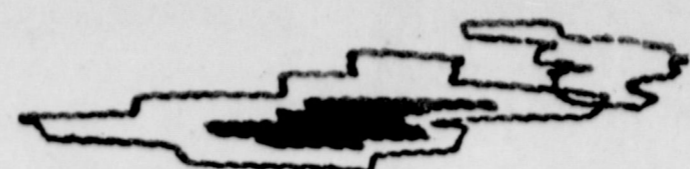

## Three Projects Approved For Terrell Highways

Three projects in Terrell County have been approved by the State Highway Commission as a part of a two-year program. The program covers the actual construction work and the purchase of any needed right of way. Federal funds have been made available and these projects will be placed under contract as the plans are completed and necessary right of way has been acquired by the county.

Archie J. Sherrod, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department in Odessa, stated that the following highways in Terrell County are scheduled for work under this program:

1. Construct Bridge and Approaches at Meyers Canyon Creek 9.0 miles North of Dryden on F. M. 1217, Distance: 0.3 mile, Estimated Cost: \$111,500.
2. Construct Bridges and Approaches at Big Canyon Creek 17.0 miles North of Dryden on F. M. 1217, Distance: 0.3 mile, Estimated Cost: \$112,900.
3. Construct Bridge and Approaches at Thurston Canyon Crossing 2.5 miles North of Dryden, Distance: 0.5 mile, Estimated Cost: \$82,000.

Senior resident engineer Jack V. Valentine will be in charge of the work in this area.

## J. A. Soto Injured In Car Wreck

Jose A. Soto Jr., who was returning to Sanderson in his car from Brownsville, received serious injuries in a car wreck early Sunday morning which cost the life of Lt. Paul E. Roth, 25, of Laughlin AFB, Del Rio, who was driving a new sports car. The head-on collision occurred about two miles south of Del Rio on U. S. Highway 277 about 6:45 a. m. Highway patrolmen who investigated the accident had no explanation for the cause of the accident.

Soto, a teacher in the local schools, had spent the holidays in Brownsville with his parents. He was moved from a Del Rio hospital to that city early Tuesday morning by ambulance.

He is reported to have suffered severe head and face injuries, the loss of his teeth, a broken jaw, and both legs fractured.

## Emergency Loans Available For County Ranchers

The office of Congressman Richard C. White announced today that the Department of Agriculture has designated Terrell County as an emergency loan area for purposes of Farmers Home Administration Loans.

These loans made pursuant to Section 321 of Farmers Home Administration Act, make loans available to larger than family ranchers, at a lower-than-normal. 3% interest rate.

This action was necessary because many farmers in the county have not recovered sufficiently from losses caused by adverse weather conditions in recent months.

Farmers in the county desiring information about emergency loans or other types of assistance available through the Farmers Home Administration should get in touch with the FHA County Supervisor or Congressman White in Washington.

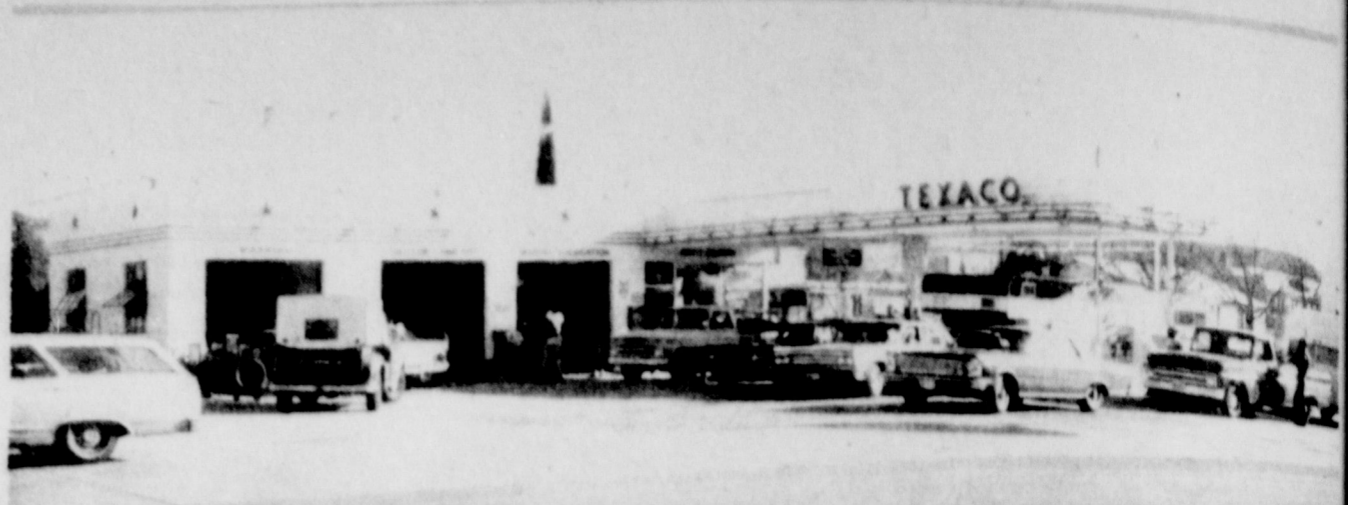

## Lions Observe Worth of Camp For Handicapped

When the Sanderson Lions Club members have their regular meeting today (Thursday), at the Oasis Restaurant, Bill Smith will pay tribute to the local club and other clubs of Texas who are providing the handicapped children of Texas with a camp of their own.

The Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children at Kerrville was opened in 1953 and accommodated 236 blind, crippled, deaf and mute youngsters the first year. Since then the camp which is free has grown steadily until it is now serving up a summer filled with fun to 720 children each year. Eight thousand handicapped youngsters from the ages of seven through sixteen have been given the thrill of a lifetime as they have learned to swim, to camp out under the stars and develop new skills in various handicrafts.

Anyone knowing of a boy or girl who may be eligible for this free camp is requested to give the information to a member of the local Lions Club.

## Mrs. Blackstone Dies Last Tuesday

Mrs. N. D. Blackstone, pioneer West Texan and widow of a prominent West Texas ranchman, died Tuesday afternoon in a San Angelo hospital.

She was hospitalized last Saturday and had been in precarious health since breaking a hip in 1963.

Mr. Blackstone preceded his wife in death in 1944.

Mr. Blackstone moved to West Texas in the early 1900s. He and Mrs. Blackstone were married in San Angelo in 1910. With his late brother-in-law, Lon Slaughter, Mr. Blackstone operated ranches at Barnhart and Sheffield and another between Sanderson and Fort Stockton. The partnership owned over 220,000 acres of West Texas ranchland.

Survivors include a son, N. D. Blackstone, Jr., who formerly operated the ranch south of Sheffield.

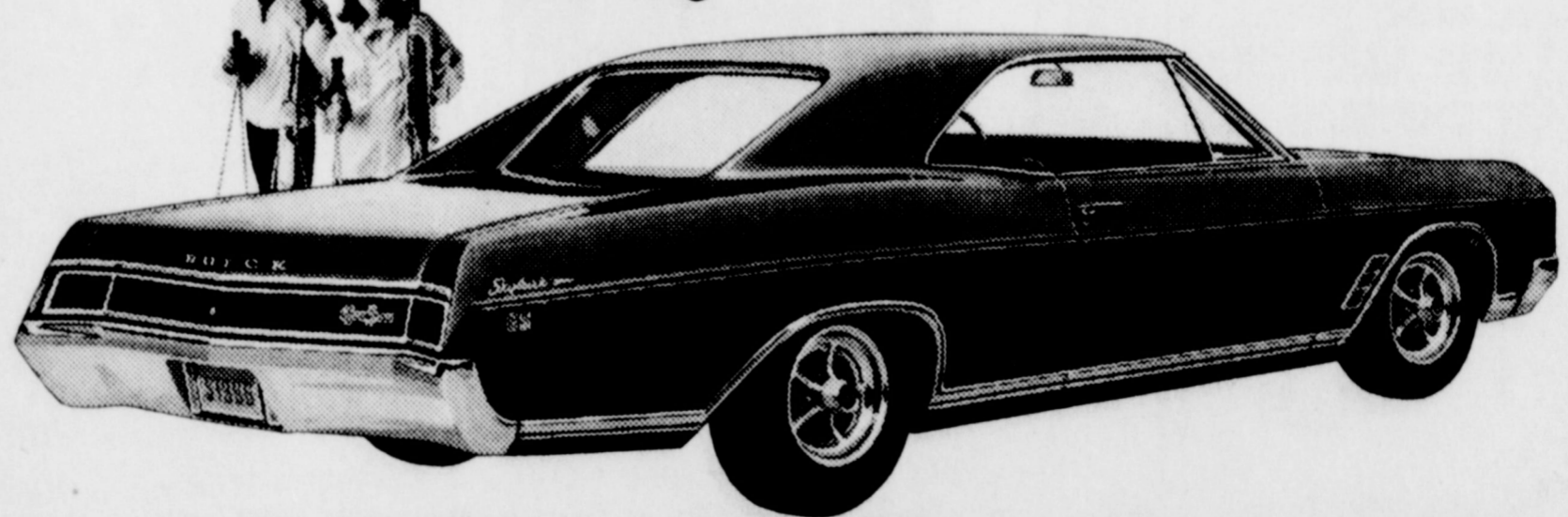
