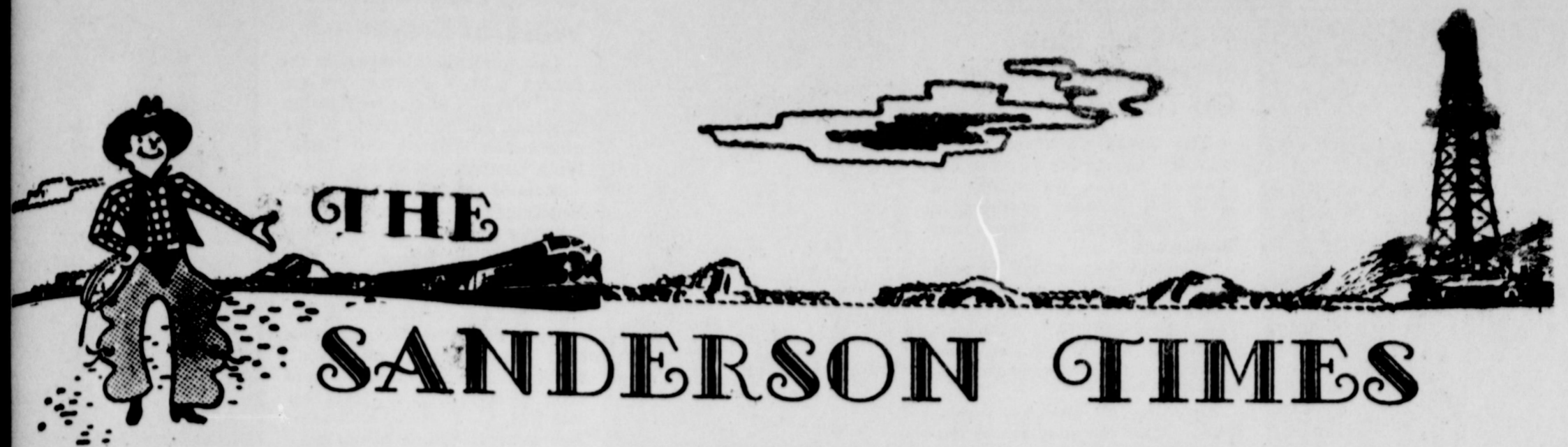

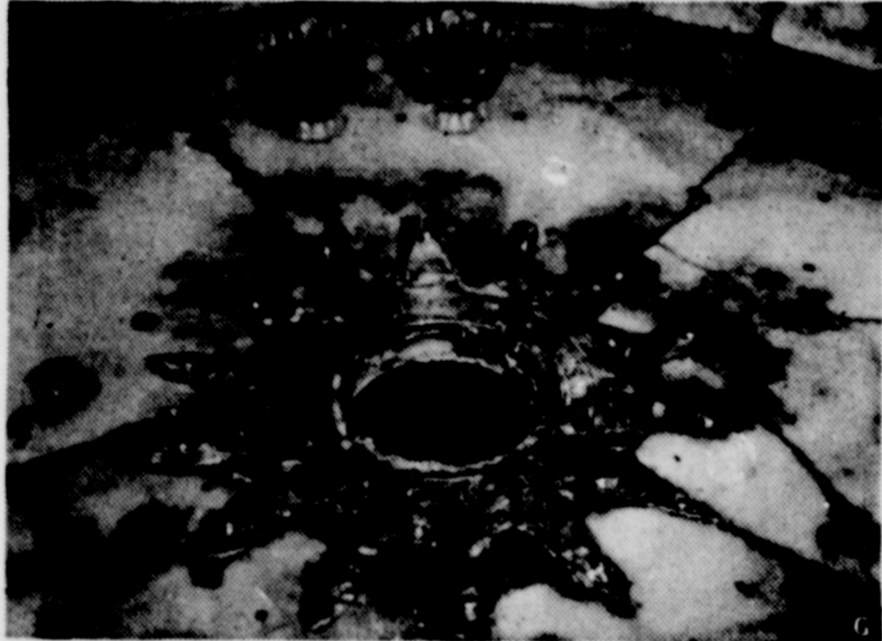

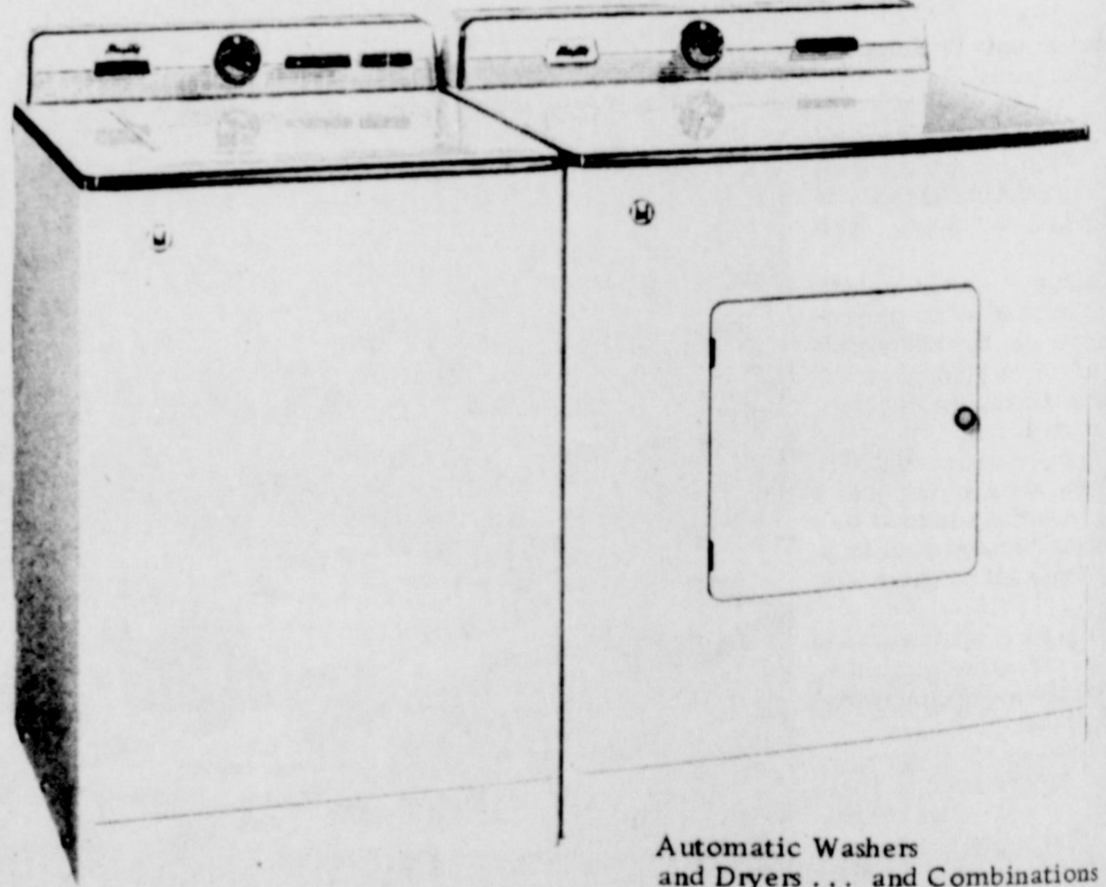

Odessa S.S. Office Announces Hours

The social security district office in Odessa will remain open from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Thursday evening, December 9th, 16th, and 23rd, and from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Saturdays, December 4th, 11th, and 18th, for the added convenience of residents of the area. H. P. Thomas, social security district manager said today. These extra hours are in addition to the regular 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. schedule of office hours, Monday through Friday.

Thomas pointed out that it is important for many people to get in touch with the district office to take advantage of the health insurance and other provisions of the 1965 amendments to the social security program. Although most people are able to visit the office during the day, many find it impossible to do so because of employment or home responsibilities.

The three major groups of people who should get in touch with the social security office are the following, Thomas said:

1. People who are now 65 or older but who are not entitled to social security benefits. Some of these people are eligible for benefits but have not applied for them because they are still working full time. Thomas emphasized that it is desirable for these people to apply now to establish their social security benefit rights and to qualify for the hospital insurance protection that begins in July, 1966. He emphasized that no one can lose by applying for benefits as soon as he reaches 65 (those who retire between 62 and 65 may receive cash benefits but in a permanently reduced amount. They are not eligible for hospital insurance until they reach 65.) Many of the people 72 or older are not now getting benefits because they (or their husbands) had not worked enough under social security to qualify. Many of these people will now be eligible for cash benefits because the new law reduces the amount of work required for most people 72 or older.

2. Widows 60 or 61 years of age who under the old law would have been eligible for widows benefits at age 62. They may now apply for social security benefits as early as age 60 if they wish to accept a permanently reduced amount.
3. Unmarried students 18 to 22 years of age whose social security benefits stopped when they became 18 (or never started because they were over 18 when their parent died, retired, or became disabled), and students who receive social security benefits and are nearing age 18 and who plan to continue in schools. Upon application, monthly benefits can be paid back to January, 1965, to students who were under 22 in January, 1965.

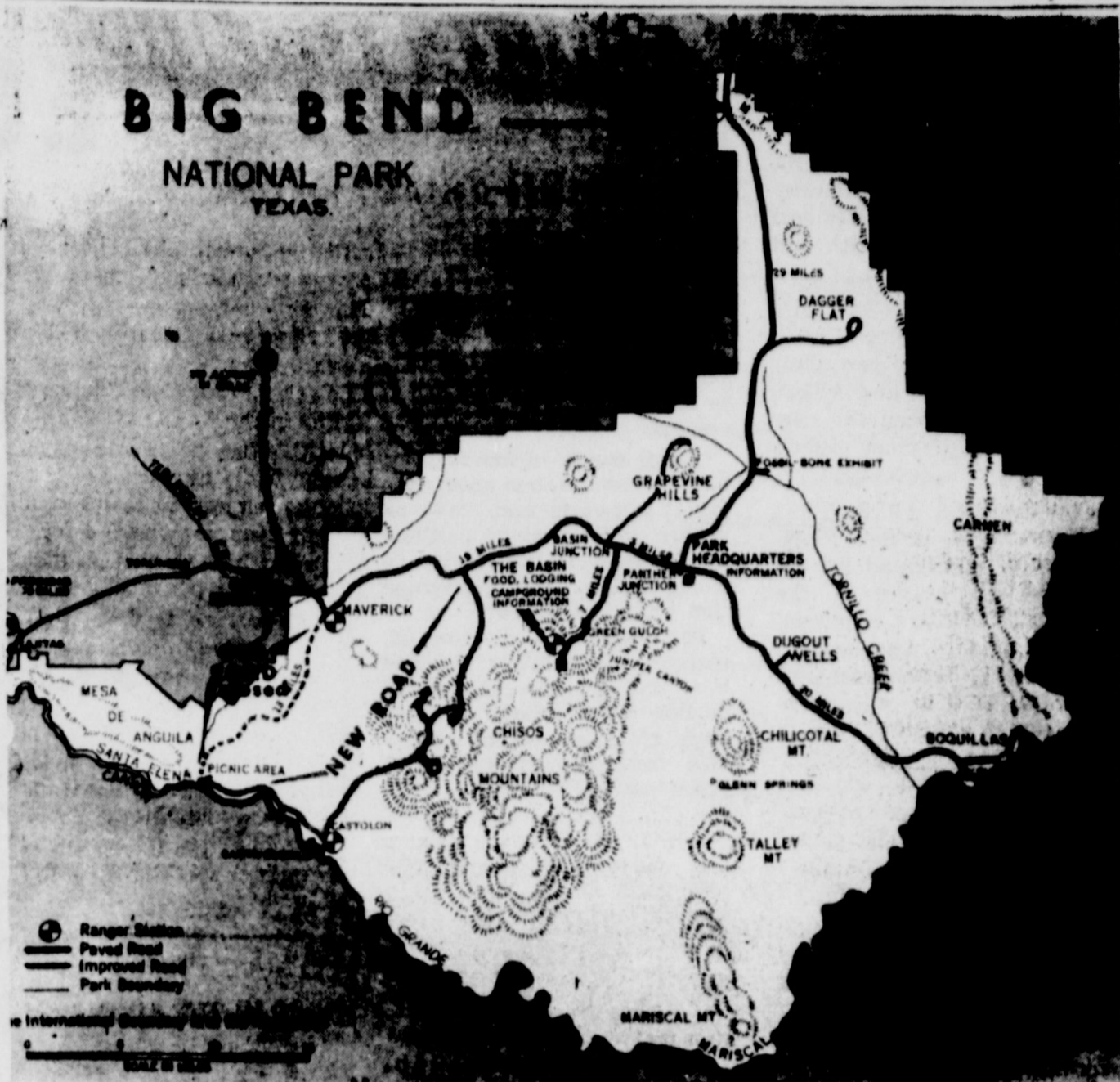

Married Men With No Children Face Draft in December

December 8, 1903—Professor Langley, secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, failed in a second attempt to fly an airplane constructed according to his own plans. (Eleven years later the Langley machine was re-tested and successfully flown.)

AUSTIN — State draft boards will be authorized in December to draft any young married man without children, regardless of the date he was married, to fill the biggest Texas draft call in more than 12 years.

This was announced by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, who said the new policy pertained to men 19 through 25 years old.

The state draft quota for December calls for 1,714 men, the biggest since June 1953, when a call for 1,749 was made on Texas boards.

No married man with children, or an expected child, will be selected to fill the December call.

"Draft boards, of course, must have the information about children," Schwartz said, "and an unborn child must be certified by a physician. Otherwise, a young husband and father may find himself selected."

The state draft director explained that childless married men will be ordered for induction when boards exhaust pools of examined and acceptable single men 19 through 25 years old.

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Labor Statistics Don't Confirm Secretary's Speech

WASHINGTON — "There is broader, firmer labor peace in the country today than there has been in a long time," Secretary of Labor Wirtz asserted in a formal statement reviewing the employment and labor disputes picture.

Latest available strike figures issued by Secretary Wirtz's own Labor Department, however, certify just the opposite if one looks at long-range trends, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

They show a steady and sharp increase during first eight months — January through August — in each of the five New Frontier-Great Society years in the number of strikes, workers involved, and working time lost by strikers.

Over the five-year period, number of strikes increased 19 per cent, from 2,442 in 1961 to 2,910 this year. Workers on strike increased 44 per cent,

from 804,000 to 1,160,000. Man-days of work lost by strikers skyrocketed from 8,860,000 to 16,800,000, an increase of 9 per cent, says the Labor Department figures.

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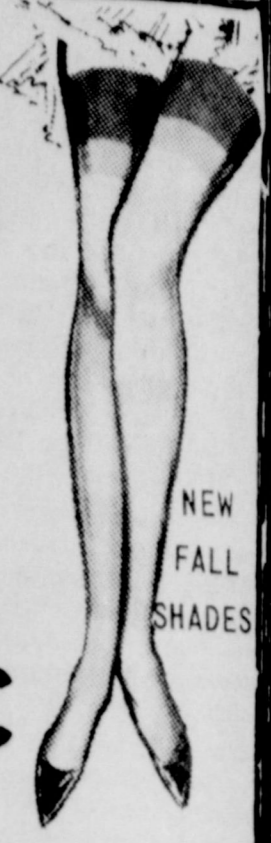

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WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Slowly, but surely, bureaucracy arrives at fundamental truths. The latest discovery in Washington is that there is a difference in the sexes.

This official reaffirmation of an age old fact has been brought about by the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which among other things, forbids employment discrimination because of sex. The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission is now wrestling manfully, and presumably also womanfully, with the problems created by this law.

In Russia they don't have such problems. As any visitor to Russia can report, women do heavy work, are the street cleaners of Moscow, shovel snow, work in the mines.

Of course, the degree of development in any Western civilization has always been judged by the consideration shown in relieving women of burdensome tasks.

So now, there is a government bureau making many decisions in this field. For example, who knows what learned reports and debates can take place around a conference table on a subject such as "Can a lady hire out as a stevedore and still be a lady?"

Commission Chairman Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr. with fine Harvard diction says "We

will make every effort to distinguish those situations where job discrimination on the basis of sex is merely a convenient extension of tradition. The law will be seriously applied."

Many states have laws regulating the hours a woman can work or amount weight she can lift. Presumably, these state laws can now be over-ruled.

And of course, bureaucrats will now decide in place of employers, which sex can best perform the duties of the job. But presumably, this might have some bright, freshening side affects. Instead of the tired old jokes of the past, consider what could be done with a new approach based on the travelling saleslady and the farmer's son.

How many tax paid man hours, and woman hours, too, will be consumed debating which jobs are unisexual or bisexual.

As already pointed out in Russia this is no problem.

One of the wonders of this age is the belief that any problem can be solved by passing a law, and hiring a commission to administer it. It will be interesting to see what decision on sex discrimination will be made when those places that employ topleless waitresses hold job interviews. It does not seem possible that a male in a pair of shorts would be an adequate topleless waitress.

On the other hand, judging by some past scandals in Washington, there is apparently a segment of the population along the Potomac that would think this situation quite good.

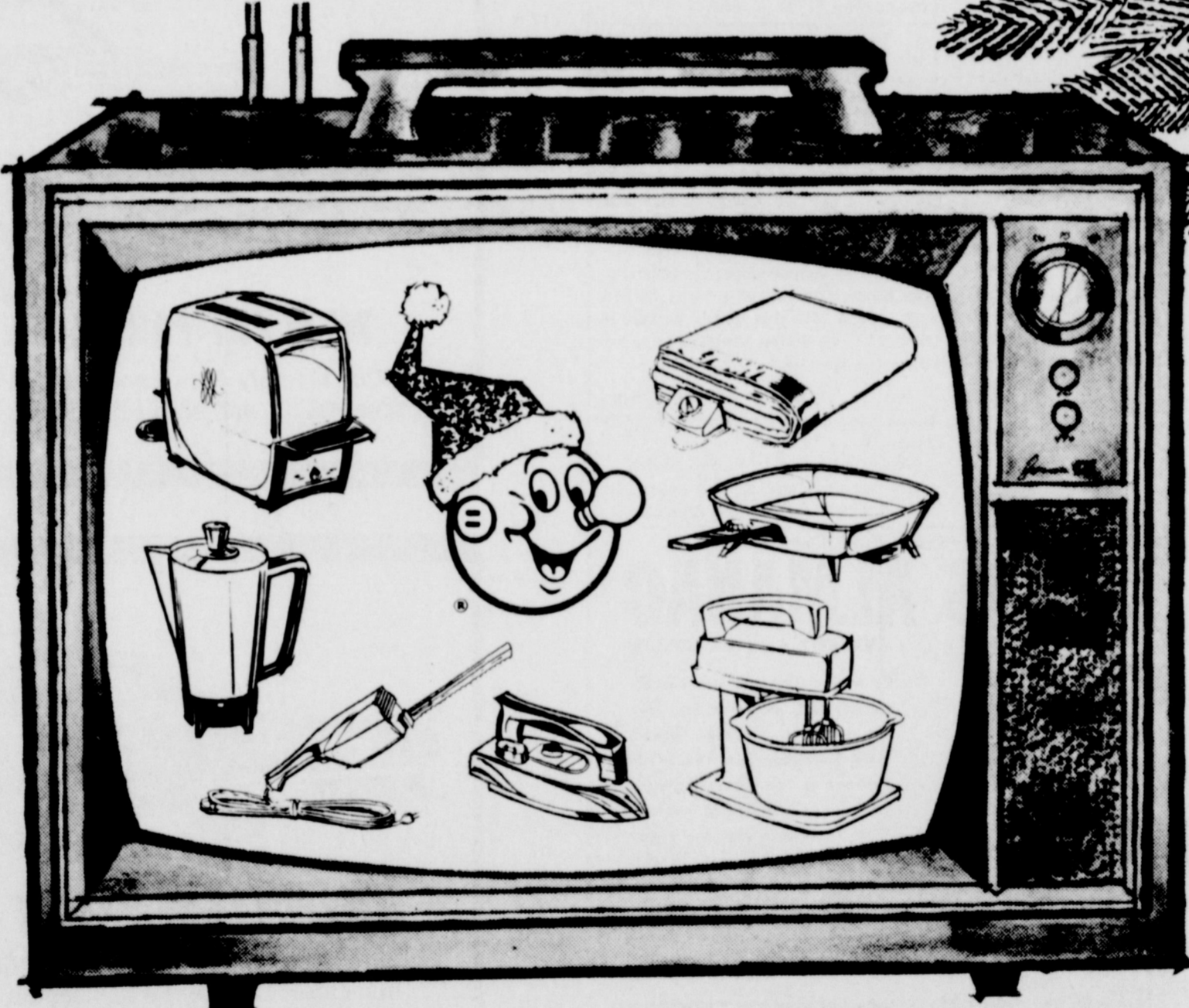

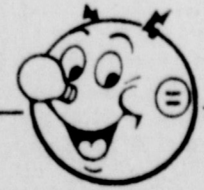

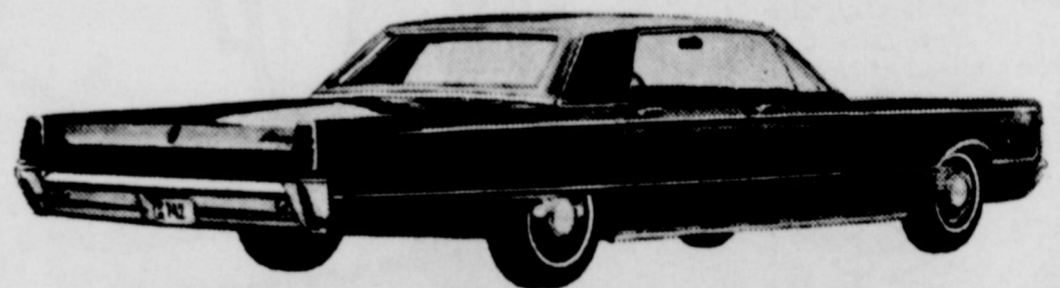
