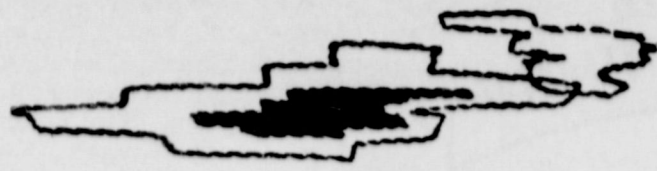

We have been busy in recent years granting certain rights to certain minority groups or to groups without going to the bother to emphasize to them that all of these rights carry certain responsibilities.

I have still the right to shoot a gun, but I have the responsibility of seeing that I do not harm anyone in so doing.

Monday Jack Deaton told us that he was buying some poison to put out in the pasture on his ranch in an effort to kill some dogs that were seen chasing some horses. He asked that we inform our readers that the poison would be put out in the pastures only and that if any dogs got any that he put out it would be because they were in his pastures.

The depredation of dogs to livestock surrounding town is as bad as it has been in many years according to the ranchmen.

This is one instance of rights and responsibilities. We all are entitled to a dog - or sheep -- but there is a responsibility to owning either.

## W. J. Ferguson Jr. Local Car Dealer, Dies Thursday

William James Ferguson Jr., owner of the Ferguson Motor Company, died in a Fort Stockton hospital Thursday morning. He had been a patient in the hospital for most of the past eight weeks after surgery on December 17th.

Funeral services were in the First Presbyterian Church Friday afternoon and interment was in Cedar Grove Cemetery. Rev. Bob Moon, pastor, officiated at the rites and the funeral was directed by the Janes Funeral Home of Ozona.

Mr. Ferguson was born in Sanderson December 17, 1917, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Ferguson. He was a lifetime resident. He was a graduate of the University of San Antonio, now Trinity University, and was a veteran of World War II, serving in the Finance Department of the U. S. Army as a 1st Lieutenant. He was a member of the Sanderson Rotary Club, a director of the Sanderson State Bank, and a member of the Presbyterian Church and the Masonic Lodge.

On June 7, 1961, he was married to Mrs. Clara Rose Wooten who survives. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Hinton J. Baker of Silver Spring, Md.; an aunt, Mrs. R. R. Atkins of Floresville; an uncle, Jessie Ferguson of Palestine, and numerous cousins.

State Representative Gene Hendryx of Alpine, who has served in the Legislature since 1963, is unopposed for the Democratic nomination of the new 66th Legislative District.

Hendryx serves as floor leader for Speaker Ben Barnes.

Among his achievements in the Legislature is the passage of the constitutional amendment which bars the Legislature from tampering with the permanent school fund. A member of the powerful Legislative Council, his new district is the largest in the United States, covering 15 counties bounded by El Paso County on the west and Runnels County on the east.

Hendryx graduated with honors from Sul Ross College with a bachelor and master's degree.

## Attendance At Meeting Wednesday Important To Flood Control Project

Attendance of everyone who possibly can come to the courthouse Wednesday at 1:30 p. m. is of prime importance to the success of the dam project that is now under consideration by the State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

It has been stated that interest

on the part of the public will be one of the governing factors to insure the initiation of the project.

Several businesses of town have indicated their plans to close for about an hour and a half Wednesday to permit all of their employees to attend the meeting.

The primary purpose of the meeting is to request a priority from the State Board for planning assistance on the watershed.

The hearing is in regard to the possibility of getting a Watershed and Flood Prevention Program started on Sanderson Canyon and Three-Mile Draw.

The sponsoring organizations are the Terrell, Brewster, and Pecos Counties Commissioners Courts, Rio Grande-Pecos River and Big Bend and Trans-Pecos Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

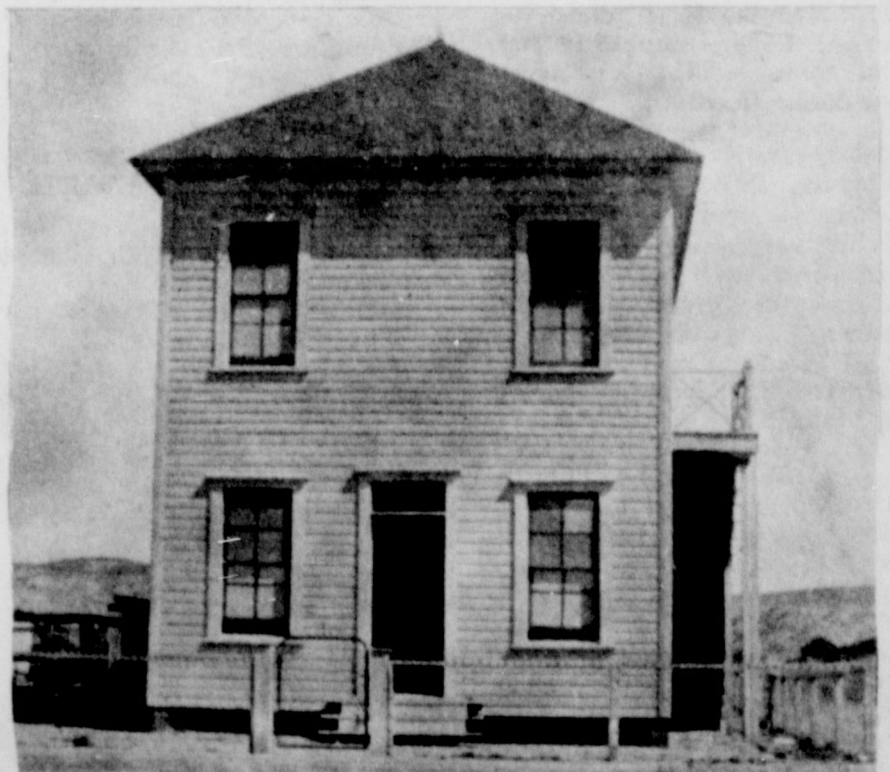
During the hearing the sponsoring local organizations will present the damages that have occurred from the flood and the benefits that could be received from a watershed protection and flood prevention project.

## Title Necessary To Get License

It is necessary to bring your title to your vehicle in order to obtain a license for 1966, according to J. R. Hunnicutt Jr., investigator of the Motor Vehicle Division of the Department of Public Safety, who was in Sanderson last week. It is unlawful for the tax collector to issue a license without it, he explained.

The purpose for this is to insure the accuracy of the information on both the title and the license receipt now, because within a very short period the receipts would be checked automatically and the correct information has to be on the receipts.

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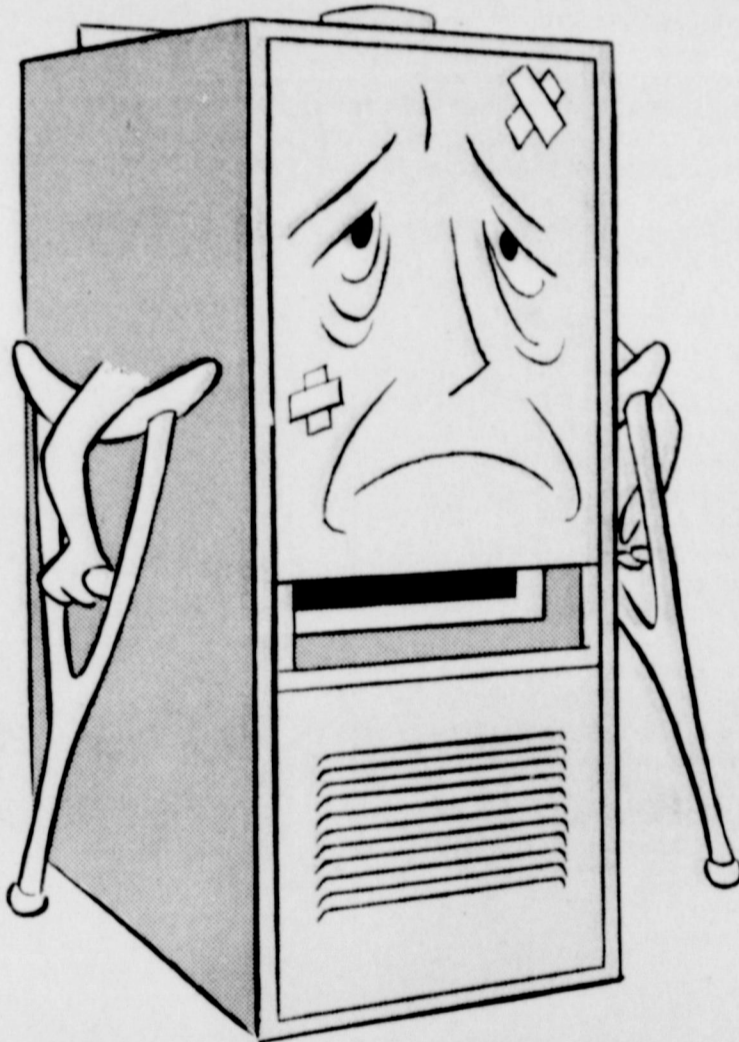

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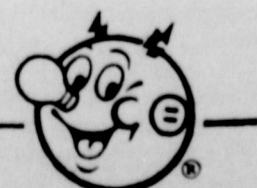


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**Miss Davenport Weds February 4 in Kingsville**

Pink candles in crystal holders lighted the dining room where cup cakes iced in red and pink, dips and chips, and pink punch were served from a table covered in a pink cloth.

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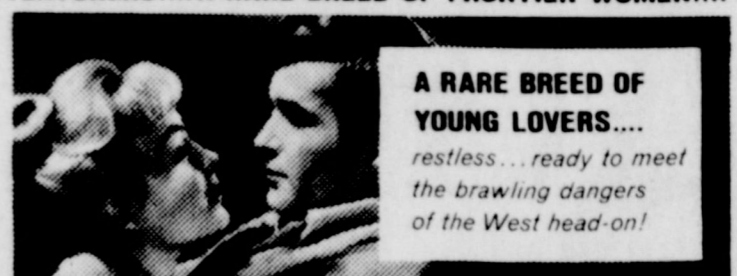
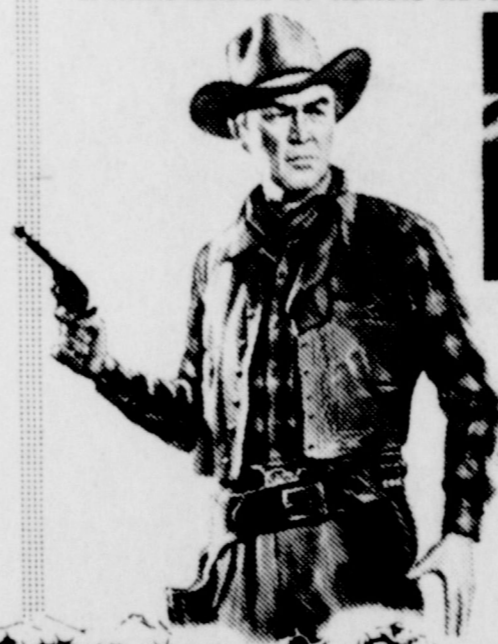
