Daylight saving time will be a matter of law when the bill is effective. This is to stabilize the times that are used all over the nation, and also will put everyone to work an hour earlier.

Take, for example, here in Sanderson: We all open up for business at what is now 8:00 a. m. This goes on for a while and it is decided that it is too early in the morning to open one's business, so all of the business community decides to open at 9:00 a. m., which would be the same as 8:00 a. m. now.

And the ranchman who works by the sun anyway---is this new time going to change anything in his habits of work?

We doubt it!

We understand this law will put all of Texas in the Central time zone, which will certainly not hurt anything. Since part of Sierra Blanca is split on the correct time, according to information we have, and from there west is Mountain time, it is confusing in traveling to El Paso for a day or two. And we understand that the railroad in El Paso operates on Central time on everything to the east and Mountain time on everything to the west; we can understand some confusion arising out of that.

We'll be the first to admit that we are creatures of habit, but we are not so fixed in our habits that we cannot change the time of opening and closing our business at another time in order to prevent going to work earlier or later than we want to, just because our watch says 8:00 a. m. or whatever----

We've never seen a coin that didn't have two sides!

While we admit there are lots of stray dogs here in town, there are also a lot of dogs that aren't strays. And while there are lots of dogs that run loose all of the time, there are some dogs that seldom, if ever, run loose.

And putting poison out in your yard is one thing, and putting it in someone else's yard is something else.

We do not infer by the above statement that those who have been putting out poison in their pastures, have also been putting it out here in town. We are not pointing a finger of guilt at anyone.

29 Register For Free Votes

Committee Names Trustees For Medical Center Program

At a meeting of the general committee of the medical center project on Monday night at the courthouse, five trustees or the executive committee for the group was named to include Sid Harkins, Troy Druse, R. S. Wilkinson, Jack Hayre, and Darwin Schrader.

Following the election of the executive committee, the group voted to let that committee select nominees for the various sub-committees to carry on the work of the project. These nominations will be presented to the general committee within two weeks for their consideration.

Following adjournment, the executive committee met and named officers to include: Harkins, president; Druse, vice-president; Wilkinson, secretary-treasurer. They set Thursday as the date for making the nominations for the committees and Friday night is tentatively set as the date for the next meeting of the general committee. Committee members will be notified of the time of the next meeting as soon as the nominations have been made by the executive committee.

J. A. Gilbreath, president of the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce presided at the first meeting until a chairman could be named. He explained that in keeping with the recommendations of the Sears-Roebuck Foundation representative, the general committee was the result of an effort to get a condensed version of the population of the county so there would be a group small enough to work with, and yet large enough to have a good representation for the sake of community effort.

Through this means, it was explained, the committee could select those who were thought to be best qualified for the particular jobs for the success of the project.

Following the selection of the various sub-committee heads, the general committee will be dismissed and the work turned over to the executive committee and the four sub-committees, including fund drive, building, doctor procurement, publicity.

Under the suggestions of the Sears Foundation plan, the sub-committees will pick those to work on the committees.

In the fund-raising drive, the citizens of the county will be contacted personally for their subscription by workers in that committee. Other means of increasing the interest in the project have been mentioned, some of which are already under way.

Just prior to adjournment of the meeting Monday night, Mr. Harkins stated that the success of the project would depend now on the work of the people of the county; that he and the executive committee would do all in their power to push to the completion of the project, but it would be the cooperation of the people who made it successful. His final statement was a plea for this cooperation.

It was pointed out that the executive committee included four men who would be working this week on the proposed dam project for Sanderson Canyon: Harkins, Wilkinson, Hayre, and Schrader. Were it not for this fact, the executive committee could meet prior to Thursday.

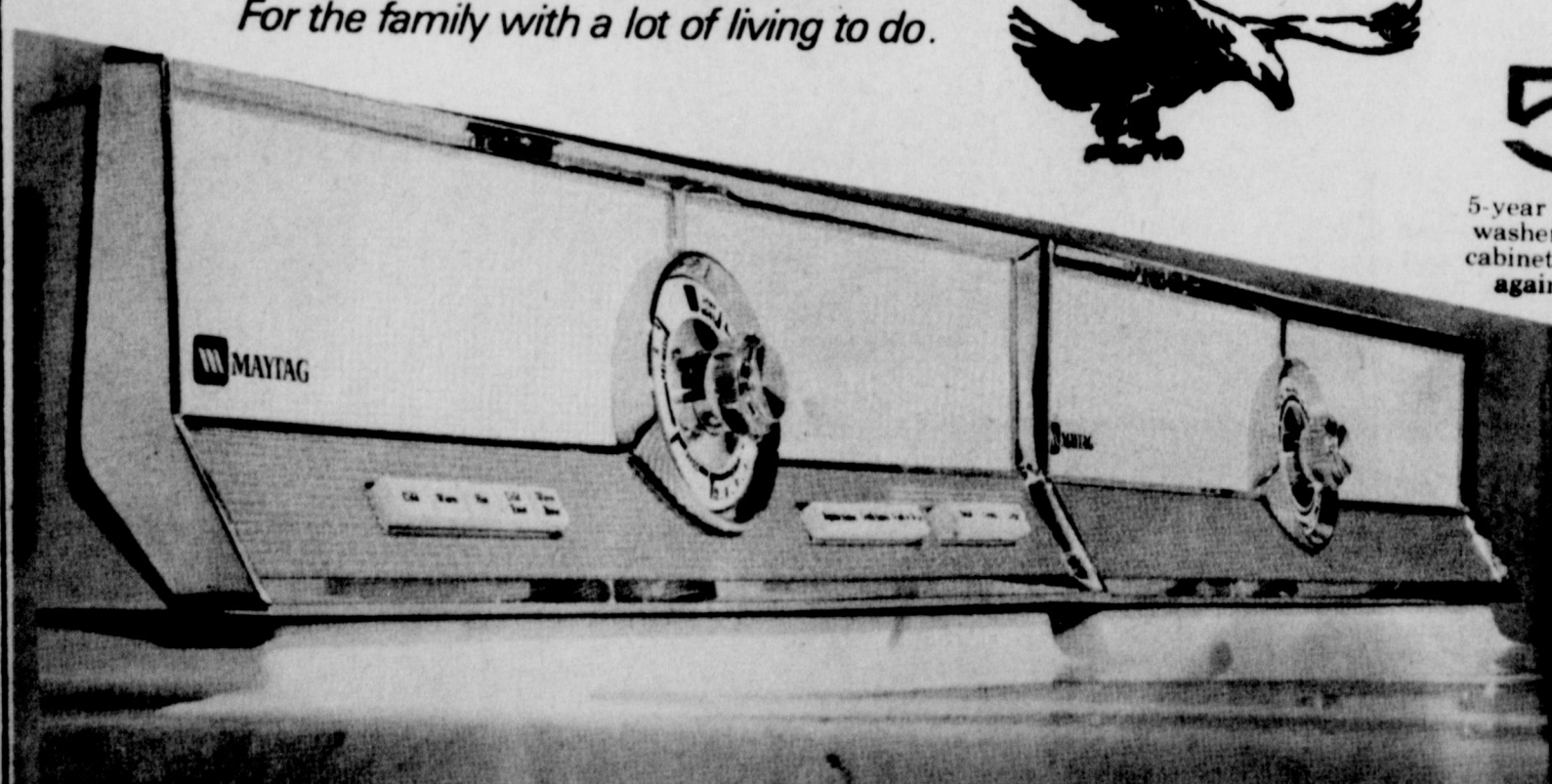

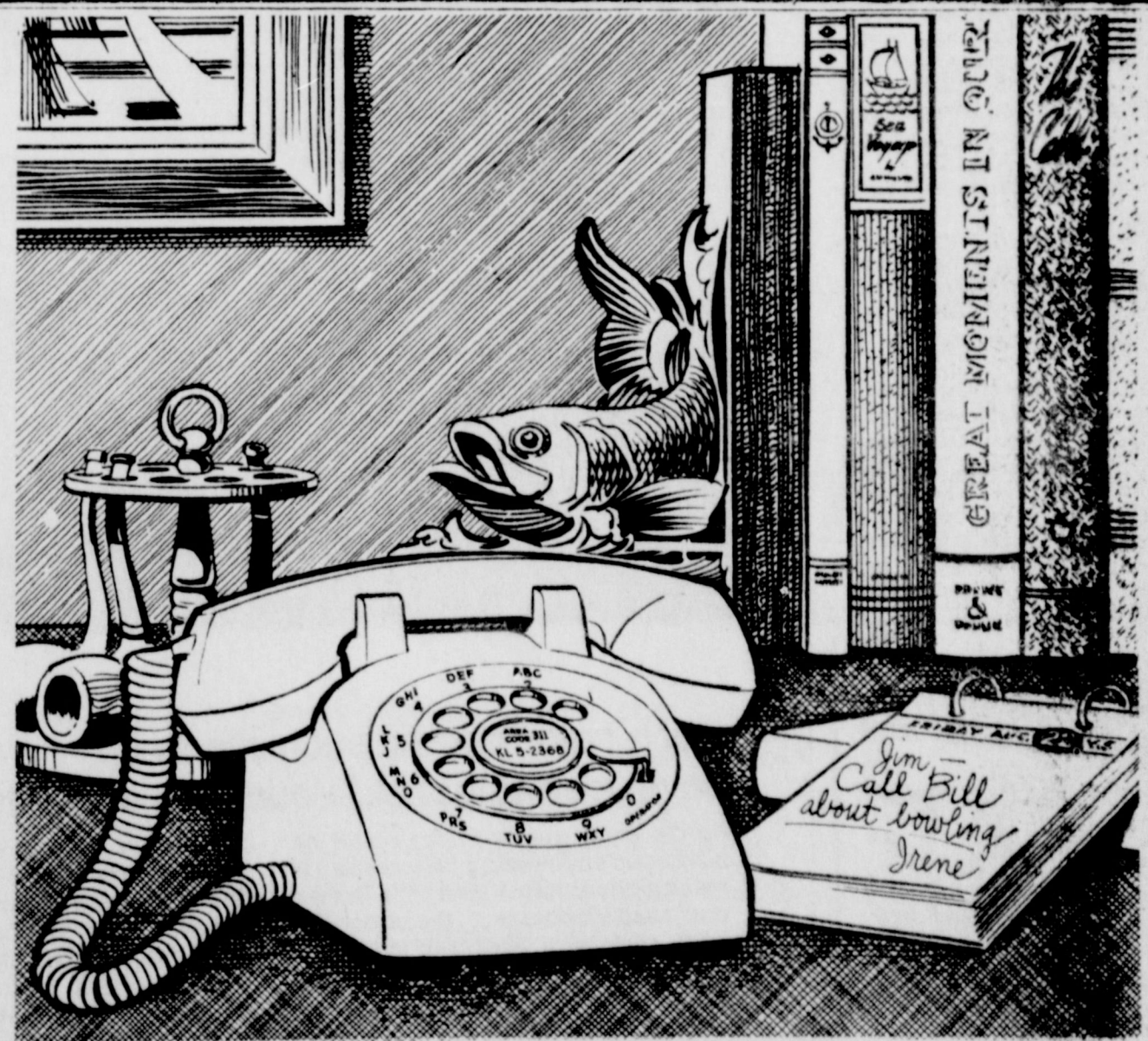
