Rain and Hail Hit County

Rain and hail came to Terrell County Monday of this week, but there was no damage reported from the hail.

Hearing On Proposed Dams Gets Approval of State Men

The hearing on the proposed dams on the Sanderson Canyon watershed was last Wednesday in the high school auditorium with about 300 people present.

County Judge R. S. Wilkinson called the meeting to order and introduced the visiting officials from the State Soil and Water Conservation Board: Harry Davis, executive director of the Board, Temple; E. W. Wehman, board member from Boerne; A. F. Leash, board member from this area, of Pleasanton; Bud Norton, engineer for the Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Temple; and L. F. Stewart, on the staff of the State Board, San Saba.

Officials from neighboring counties who are helping Terrell County by participating in the sponsorship of the project are: C. F. Cox, Soil Conservation District in Brewster County; Brewster County Judge Felix McGaughey and Commissioner Rex Ivey; Lamar Kay, with the Soil Conservation Service in Alpine; from Pecos County: Judge Walter Buenger; commissioners C. C. Mitchell, Ollie Garland, Bill Moody, and Leslie Bowman, and Glen Dodson, Soil Conservation

Service; Bill Gilliland, manager of Southwestern Bell's district office, Fort Stockton; E. F. Fisher, representative of the Southern Pacific Railroad, Houston; Archie J. Sherrod, district engineer of the Texas Highway Department, Midland; local commissioners, soil conservation district directors and Soil Conservation Service employees.

Presenting testimony to support the need for the proposed dams on Sanderson Canyon were Jimmy Caroline, manager of the local Community Public Service Co.'s utility; Gilliland, Sherrod, Fisher, M. G. Northcut, Carlton White, Commissioner Sid Harkins, and Sheriff Bill Cooksey.

Following the presentation of the testimony, the members of the State Soil and Water Conservation Board stated that they had received, prior to the hearing, more information than they usually had following a hearing on all other proposals. They added that they were well impressed with what they had seen and heard and gave the crowd their assurance they would press immediately for the approval of the project for the Sanderson Canyon watershed.

They also expressed gratitude for the courtesies shown them during their trip to Terrell County and the hospitality extended by all they had met.

All of the visitors took a tour of the watershed and of the town to see the results of the damage of the flood that are yet visible. At noon the visitors met at the Fellowship Hall of the Presbyterian Church where they were served a luncheon consisting of barbecued beef, ham, potatoes, salad, green beans, coffee, pecan pie, and hot rolls. The meal was served by members of the Presbyterian Women of the Church, who also prepared the food.

Movies and slides taken during the flood were shown to those at the luncheon.

Three Absentee Ballots Cast In Local School Vote

Only three absentee ballots had been cast up to noon Tuesday for the coming school and county trustee election, according to reports from the office of A. H. Zuberbueler, tax assessor and collector.

The election will be Saturday in all voting precincts of the county with the polls to open at 8:00 a.m. and closing at 7:00 p. m.

There is no contest in the race for the two school district trustees for the Terrell County Independent School District. Carlos Dunn is seeking re-election and W. E. Ten Eyck is the other candidate.

No candidates have announced for the county trustee posts in precincts 1 and 3, the places of G. E. Babb and G. K. Mitchell.

A language development program for the educationally de-

A language development program for the educationally deprived students has been started in the Sanderson schools, according to Ken McAllister, superintendent.

The program is financed entirely by federal funds, according to McAllister, who stated \$19,000 had already been received and the program makes possible the expenditure of \$24,000 for material and equipment.

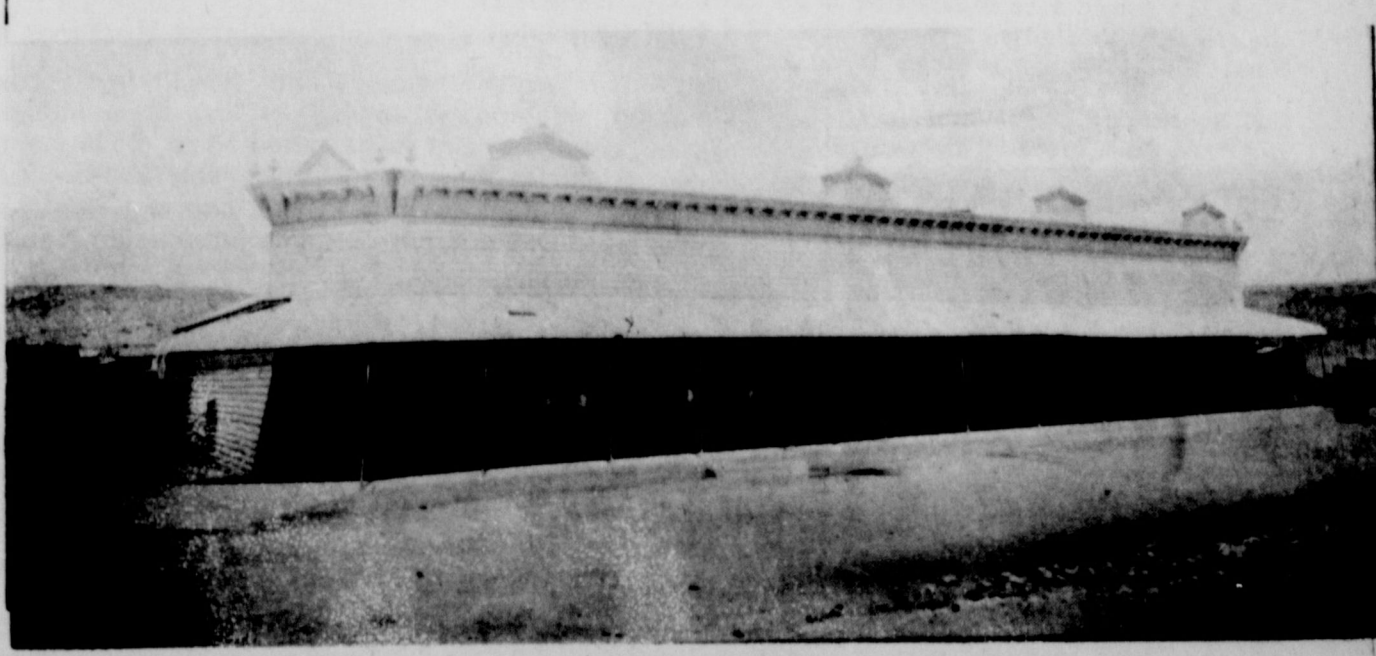
Under the program, there will be one teacher aid for each of the elementary grades and one in the high school and junior high school. The aids will work directly under the guidance and supervision of the teachers in the language arts field in the elementary school and will have a reading laboratory in the junior high school and high school for referral cases and be available for those who desire to use the facilities.

The facilities available under the program, besides the teacher aids, includes training aids, visual aids, books, controlled reading, vocabulary and spelling aids.

Besides the teacher aids, the program includes the financing of a school nurse, Mrs. E. J. Hanson, who will work on a part time basis, but be subject to call at any time. She will give eye and hearing tests and other similar tests to the students.

The teacher aids who have been hired for the balance of the school year include: Mrs. Clay Barrow, Mrs. F. M. Wood, Mrs. Jack Cosby, Mrs. A. J. Riess, Mrs. W. J. Murrah, Mrs. T. R. McClellan, J. A. Soto.

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Increase Noted In Services Of Postal Offices

Increases in money orders, insurance, registry, certified mail and C.O.D. rates became effective March 26, according to J. R. Hodgkins, postmaster.

It is hoped that the fee increases will narrow the cost-revenue gap by \$36-million, based on business handled in 1965.

Specific amounts of increases may be obtained from the local post office.

Losses incurred in the operation of the special services are paid from funds drawn from the federal treasury. The fee increase will shift a substantial portion of the special service cost borne by the public to the users of these services, it was explained.

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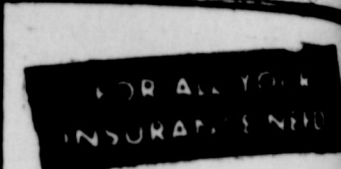

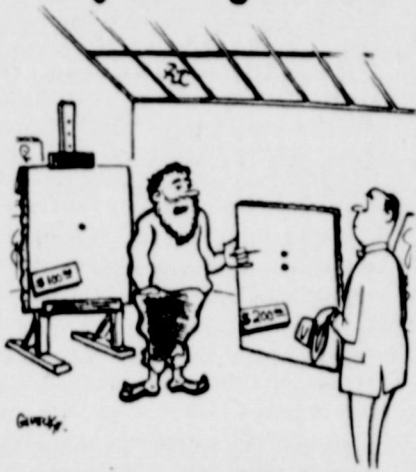

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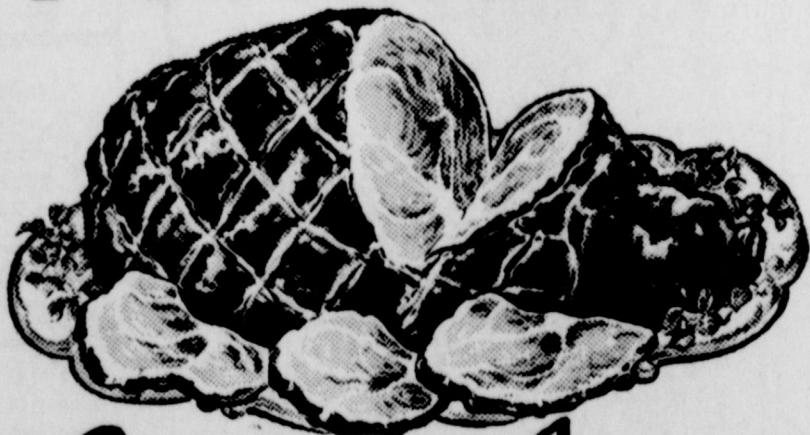
