There is not much talk of anything at all around town this week but the proposed Medical Center.

And this is good!
The men who drew up all the plans for the drive did a bang-up job. An excellent job has been done by the solicitors in carrying out the plans of the executive committee and the fund raising committee, and the office workers have been faithful in their efforts to maintain an accurate and detailed set of books. Everyone has been busy, and it has taken the cooperation of everyone to get the project as far along as it is.

There is some more work to be done, and it is going to take a continued effort if the project becomes a reality.

We are not going to become involved in any name-calling, but we thought it worthy to note that the Marathon Chamber of Commerce sent an unsolicited \$25 to the fund.

The picture that we have at the top of the page pretty well typifies what is a reality. Those who have given a contribution may have to dig down a little deeper - after examining their consciences and pocket books and see if they can do a little more.

Since the executive committee is over all of the other committees, and since all of them were named by a cross-section of people representing all of the county, it is difficult to see how there could be anything but good come out of all of their plans.

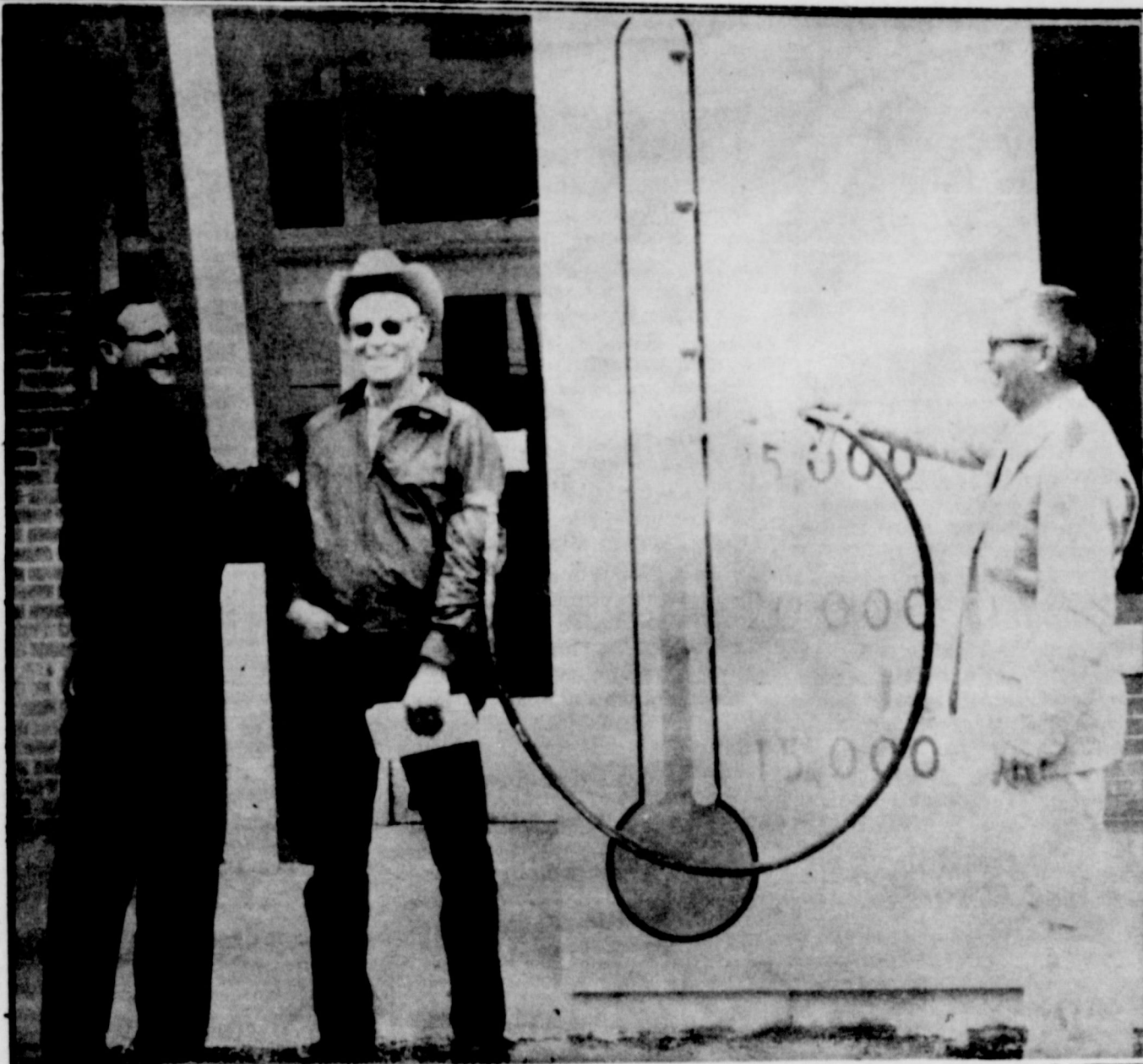
The committees are handling public funds and have a public trust. All of the business of the committees will be subject to the scrutiny of all of the public and subject to their approval or condemnation from now on. It would seem to me that this fact alone, if there was any question of honesty or integrity, would govern the acts of all who are on any of the committees.

The executive committee has asked us to emphasize that there has not been one dime spent in the project so far - that everything has been donated - and no plans exist for spending any of the money on anything except on the purpose for which it was given.

What with our work on the Medical Center and the normal business of trying to make a living putting out a newspaper shorthandedly, we probably will not get around to asking all of the voters for their support. So we are taking this means of asking all who will not be personally contacted for your support in my race for Justice of Peace of Precinct 1.

I feel truly there is an obligation involved in doing the job to the absolute best of my ability. That is what I have tried to do and that is what I will continue to try to do if I warrant your support and confidence in the race.

\$25,000 Raised Toward Medical Center

\$26,259.06 has been received in cash and \$4,282.50 pledged toward the Trans-Terrell Medical Center as of Wednesday noon.

The solicitors, who stayed at the meeting last Friday night until after 10:00 o'clock, were up early Saturday morning to begin working their list of local citizens.

The meeting Friday night was to give instructions to the solicitors on details of the proposed medical center so that they could answer questions put to them by potential contributors or lenders.

A crew of office workers has been on hand every day, including Sunday afternoon, taking

care of the details of record keeping, and answering questions of solicitors or contributors.

Many out-of-town land-owners have not been solicited and letters are being mailed to the suppliers of local commodities and to non-resident taxpayers who cannot be contacted otherwise.

Those working closely with the fund drive are well pleased with the response that has been shown by donors and feel confident that the goal of \$40,000 will be met.

Flood Danger Signal Announced

Fire Chief W. W. Sudduth announced Monday that a signal had been devised to warn local residents of the danger of high water coming down the canyon.

He said the warning would be: A ONE-MINUTE BLAST OF THE SIREN FOLLOWED BY THE RINGING OF CHURCH BELLS.

Ranchmen on the Sanderson Canyon and 3-Mile watershed have been asked to alert local officials of cloudbursts in their areas so that a watch may be kept on the height of water in the canyon.

This signal will give local firemen time to warn and assist in evacuating areas of town subject to inundation.

The business office of the Trans-Terrell Medical Center will move to the courthouse this week end for operation after Monday.

Judge R. S. Wilkinson, treasurer of the organization, will have what help is needed in his office to carry on the work of record keeping, collecting from the solicitors.



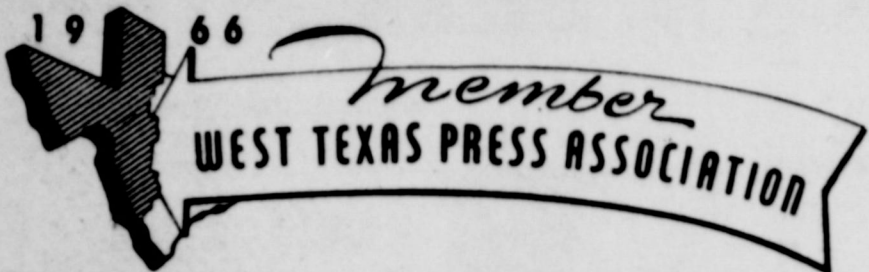

Renovation of Morrison Store Is Under Way

The complete renovation of the C. G. Morrison Co. store in Sanderson is underway.

The store has been lengthened to include what used to be the storeroom in the back. The storeroom has been moved to the building which was to the rear of the Morrison store and the partition removed between the two buildings for accessibility.

The old fixtures are being reworked and some new fixtures will be added, the ceiling will be lowered and acoustical tile installed, a new floor covering installed, and the interior painted.

The store is remaining open during the remodeling and renovating.

Carlos Dunn is manager of the store and the remodeling is under the direction of Ray Morrison of Alpine.

Pre-School Round-up To Be May 18th

A pre-school round-up will be in the morning of May 18 at the Sanderson Elementary School, according to J. E. Spann, principal. The purpose of the meeting will be to register the children and to give information to parents.

The round-up will be for the following:

Children entering school for the first time in September of this year. The child must be six years of age before September 1, 1966;

Children who plan to enroll in the non-English speaking program this summer and who will be six before September 1;

Children who plan to enter the pre-school program this summer for the educationally deprived and will be five years old on or before September 1, 1966.

Parents or guardians are asked to accompany the children to the round-up and bring a birth certificate for the child, a record of small pox vaccination, and immunization for polio is recommended.

The summer program is voluntary, according to Mr. Spann. No transportation will be provided.

The non-English speaking program will begin June 1 and end August 10. The pre-school summer program will begin June 1 and close August 31.

Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Wilson have returned from Houston where he was hospitalized for several weeks for medical treatment. He is not working and will return in June for a check-up.

Nursing Course Starts In July For Area Women

Beginning classes in vocational nursing will start in July at the Brewster County Memorial Hospital. Persons interested in enrolling in the classes may receive information about the program by contacting the instructor, Mrs. Roberta Shortt, in her office in the hospital, or appointments can be made by calling TE 6-4447 or writing her at Box 150 in Alpine.

Enrollment is limited to 15 students. The program is 12 months long and upon successful completion of the course, students are qualified to take the state examinations for Licensed Vocational Nurse.

The classes are open to high school graduates and mature women who have completed at least two years of high school.

The polls will be open for the Democratic Primary from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. and for the Republican Primary from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

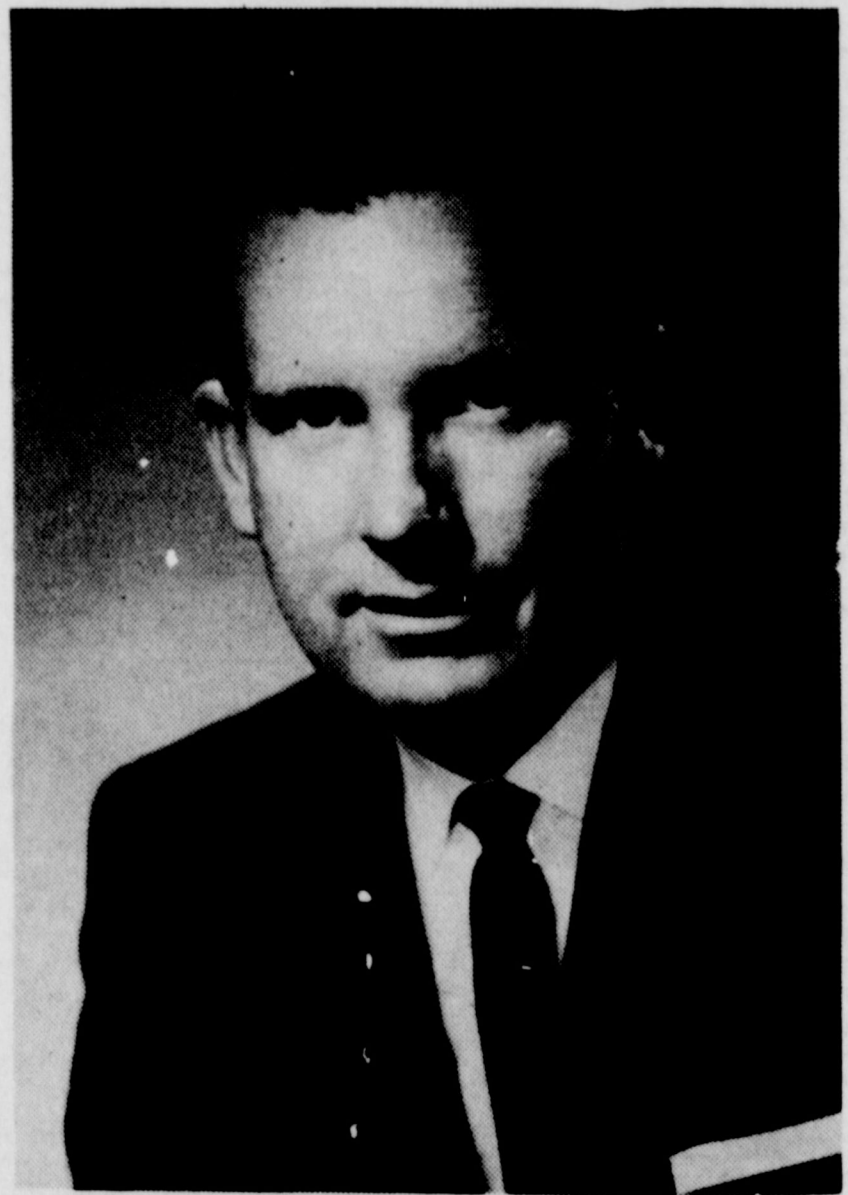

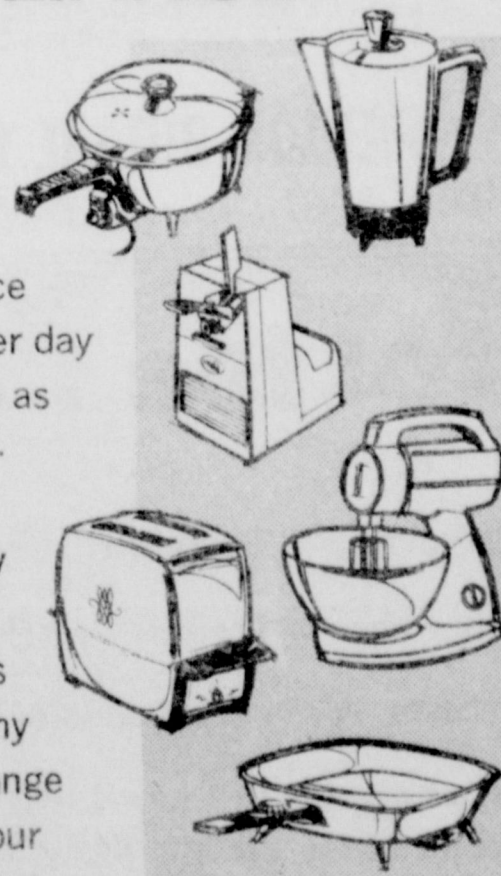
