Week of May 23 Is Round-Up For Boys' Ranch

N. M. Mitchell, wagon boss for Terrell County for the 1966 West Texas Boys Ranch annual round-up, announced this week that the week of May 23 has been designated as "West Texas Boys Ranch Week" in Terrell County with a concentrated effort being put forth to obtain as many sheep and goat contributions as possible.

"Due to recent rains and market conditions, and the fact that the Ranch needs help now, we have asked for this help during this special week", Mitchell said.

The annual round-up is one of the major fund-raising drives conducted by the Ranch each year. The Ranch is supported solely by the free-will cash or livestock contributions of West Texans. West Texas Boys Ranch has served over 750 boys since 1947, currently has 64 boys in residence, and is opening additional space for 32 more boys May 28.

"Sheep and goat donations will be accepted any time during the round-up, we are just trying to get as many contributed at one time as possible during the week of May 23 to show Boys Ranch that Terrell County is behind them", said Mitchell.

Livestock Survey To Be Made Soon

Postmaster J. R. Hodgkins reminds rural patrons of the Sanderson post office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week survey cards will be placed in a sample of boxes belonging to farmers and ranchmen.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Hodgkins explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the letter-drop. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important decisions, it was stated.

It is the duty of each citizen to respect the countryside as Creation's wondrous temple; to guard it against desecration; to make certain that rural America continues to serve its high purpose as a source of spiritual as well as material strength in the nation.

With such stewardship, we may be confident of the continued blessings of the great land, for we will have assured it with our cooperation.



Postal Savings Are Discontinued

Postmaster Ray Hodgkins today urged local citizens who have funds on deposit in the abolished Postal Savings System to convert their holding into United States Savings Bonds.

Postmaster General Lawrence O'Brien, who is Chairman of the Federal Savings Bonds Campaign, has appealed to the 30,000 Americans who have \$285,000,000 on deposit with the Post Office Department to convert their investments into United States Savings Bonds.

Mr. Hodgkins said details about the procedure for conversion can be obtained from the postmaster of any Postal Savings Depository Post Office (which includes Del Rio and Alpine).

The Postal Savings System in operation since January 1, 1911, was discontinued on April 27, 1966, by Act of Congress. The Post Office Department presently is liquidating its accounts and in July, 1967, will transfer all unclaimed assets of the System to the Treasury Department.



LOCAL PRESBYTERIANS TO ATTEND TEXAS SYNOD

Rev. Bob R. Moon and C. C. Mitchell, ruling elder from the First Presbyterian Church here, have been commissioned as delegates to the 111th annual meeting of the Presbyterian U. S. Synod of Texas.

The Synod, state-wide organization of Presbyterian Church U. S., will meet May 17-19 in Houston.

A major question facing the 500 ministers and laymen will be the proposal to change Austin College, a four-year liberal arts school in Sherman to a church-related, rather than a church-controlled college as it is now.

Other issues to come before the state-wide organization will be the consideration of a statement on sexual morality, a budget asking of \$1,680,000 for 1967, and suggested measures for increasing the church's membership growth rate.

At the pre-Synod conference on Tuesday in Houston, ministers and laymen will study some of the most crucial problems in Christian relations now facing the church: alcoholism, mental health, religion and schools, birth control, race relations, sexual morality, and leisure.
